SUPERVISOR'S REPORT.

District No. 1.

PRIMARY.

Has been under the care of *MISS JULIA KEELSEY* for the entire year. Her former success in this school has been more than equalled in the past year, and her work should be highly regarded by those having children under her instruction.

INTERMEDIATE.

Has been for the year under the instruction of *MISS MINNIE GLIDDEN*. Miss G., with but short experience in teaching, took charge of this school, which, from its grade is not an easy one to govern and instruct, and has shown herself to be an efficient and promising teacher.

GRAMMAR.

The Summer and Fall terms were taught by *MRS. M. P. L. STETSON*. Mrs. Stetson is an experienced teacher and always has a profitable school. This was no exception to her usual success.

The winter term was taught by *MR. GEO. M. GAY*. This was Mr. Gay's first school, and it proved a very quiet, pleasant and profitable term. Mr. G. is to be congratulated on this successful beginning which he has made as a teacher. It is to be regretted that the attendance was not larger.

District No. 2

The Summer and Fall terms were taught by MISS LILLA CHAPMAN. Methodical and thorough in her work, the school prospered under her care.

Winter Term, MR. A. B. GILPATRICK, teacher. It is always a pleasure to visit Mr. G's schools. Some consider his discipline severe; but his school always appears well, and no sham work is tolerated. For quality of work done, this term was eminently satisfactory.

District No. 3.

The Summer and Fall terms were taught by MISS DELIA MULLIGAN. Experience and ability in the teacher made the school orderly, pleasant and profitable. Excellent work was done, and the school was kept in good discipline.

The Winter term was taught by MR. ISRAEL JORDAN. Again the school was fortunate in having a teacher of experience and first-class ability. As an instructor, Mr. Jordan has few equals, and the school was a success under his instruction, which is careful and wise.

District No. 4.

This district had but two terms. The Summer term was taught by MISS INEZ SIDELINGER. This school was small but pleasantly conducted, and as profitable as the small number in attendance allowed.

The Winter term had an excellent teacher in MR. A. E. JOHNSTON. The school was unfortunate again in the season of its occurrence, and the number registered was only ten, with an average of seven. Small districts should take the utmost care to expend the small amount of money they have to the best possible advantage.

District No. 5.

The Summer term taught by MISS INEZ SIDELINGER, was small, but pleasant and profitable to those attending.

The Winter term taught by EDWARD T. HOUSE was quite well attended. The scholars seemed to enjoy their school and were ambitious to get ahead. The quality of work done was not as thorough as is desirable. The appearance of the school in this district and its whole morale would be improved, and the teacher's work made pleasanter and easier, if the house was in decent order.

District No. 6.

Two terms. MISS NANNIE J. CHAPMAN taught the Summer term with excellent success. This was not her first term in this school; her work here has been uniformly successful and pleasant.

The Winter term was made much pleasanter by the house being put in good repair. Mr. C. W. AVERELL, Teacher. This was Mr. A's first school. He is a quiet, gentlemanly young man, and his manners had an influence on the school which was helpful. The teaching was thorough and the term pleasant and profitable.

The schools, as a whole, have been unusually pleasant and successful. Nearly all the causes that have operated against them have come from outside the school, and were needless. The teachers have been exceptionally efficient and the year a profitable one to the schools.

It is to be hoped that the houses in districts 2 and 5 will be put in good repair, that the scholars may not feel a contempt for the place and ashamed when they have callers. A reasonable amount expended in this direction will be most profitable.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING,

To SAMUEL LANE, a Constable of the Town of Damariscotta, in the
County of Lincoln, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Damariscotta, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at Lincoln Hall, in said town, on the 22d. day of March, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- “ 3. To choose a Board of Selectmen for the ensuing year.
- “ 4. To choose Assessors of Taxes and Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- “ 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- “ 6. To choose an Auditor of Accounts for the ensuing year.
- “ 7. To choose a Supervisor of Schools for the ensuing year.
- “ 8. To choose all the necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- “ 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Support of Schools for the ensuing year.
- “ 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the interest on town debt for the ensuing year.
- “ 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Sinking Fund for the ensuing year.
- “ 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Current Expenses for the ensuing year.

- “ 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Support of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- “ 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of Highways and Bridges, and what wages they will pay of the same for the ensuing year.
- “ 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Fire Department for the ensuing year.
- “ 16. To fix the compensation for Collecting Taxes for the ensuing year.
- “ 17. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- “ 18. To see if the town will vote to empower each school district to choose their own Agent for the ensuing year.
- “ 19. To see if the town will vote to tax Dogs for the ensuing year.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Selectmen's room, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
