# State of Maine STATE DEPARTMENT OF AUDIT Augusta

Gentlemen:

In accordance with Chapter 91, Section 142 of the Revised Statutes of 1954, an audit has been conducted of the financial records of the Town of Monson for the fiscal year ended February 4, 1955.

The examination was in the form of a limited general audit as recommended by the National Committee on Governmental Accounting and was conducted by Auditor P. H. Allen of the State Department of Audit. Audit analysis was on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, and included all procedures which were considered necessary.

Insofar as could be ascertained within the scope of the examination, the financial transactions of the town appear to have been appropriately handled, with such exceptions as may be noted in the accompanying comments.

The financial and statistical sections, incorporated in this report, present the result of the town's financial operations for the period designated. Recommendations are also offered which are believed worthy of consideration.

#### COMMENTS

February 2, 1954 to February 4, 1955

An audit of the financial records of the Town of Monson has been completed for the municipal year ended February 4, 1955. The audit included an examination of the financial records maintained by the town officers. The examination consisted of a review of cash transactions as well as an analysis of available funds and expenditures and the results are incorporated in the following text, exhibits and schedules pertaining to the fiscal affairs of the town.

The fiscal years operations showed that available funds exceeded expenditures by \$1,406.72, per the following summary:

The Department of Attorney General has advised that overdrafts are not permitted by statute except in certain instances where emergencies arise in highway activities and then only to the extent of 15% of the highway appropriation.

The audit also revealed that certain phases of municipal operations may be strengthened by favorable consideration of the following suggestions:

Transfer between departmental accounts should be recorded by use of journal entries rather than to clear through the treasurer's cash account by use of selectmen's warrants and treasurer's receipts.

It was ascertained that in several instances unpaid real estate taxes were not secured by tax liens. In this respect, it is suggested that the tax collector follow the required procedure as provided by the statutes to secure payment of all unpaid real estate taxes legally assessed.

Supplemental taxes amounted to \$97.65 for the year. It is believed that such taxes should be committed to the collector in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 91, Section 30 of the Revised Statutes of 1954.

#### ASSETS

The cash balance of \$8,497.73 was reconciled with a bank statement furnished by the Guilford Trust Company, Guilford, Maine. A count of cash was made at date of audit and reconciled with the closing balance February 4, 1955.

Other assets including accounts receivable, taxes receivable and tax lien accounts were reviewed. Unpaid accounts were reconciled with the balances shown on the town officers' records.

#### LIABILITIES

The general fund liabilities of the town totaled \$5,330.00 as reflected on the records. Included were the following items:

#### RESERVES AND SURPLUS

The appropriation accounts reflect unexpended balances of \$5.410.99 (Exhibit D) at the year end, this amount representing various operating account balances which are carried forward to the ensuing year in accordance with legal requirements or customary practice.

The unappropriated surplus of the town amounted to \$2,543.69, an increase of \$515.72 for the year. This change was occasioned principally by the excess of available funds over expenditures less appropriations from surplus to various operating accounts.

#### DEBT FUND

The debt fund, incorporated in the balance sheet as

a separate fund, reflects the outstanding gymnasium and highway equipment notes of \$1,000.00 and \$1,600.00 respectively. These notes mature in the ensuing year with interest at 4%.

#### TRUST FUNDS

The total amount of trust fund principals was \$15,-174.00 at the year end and unexpended income amounted to \$1,291.55. With the exception of \$3,265.55 due from the general fund, these funds were invested in U. S. Savings Bonds. The investments were verified by physical inspection. An appropriation of \$500.00 was made available by vote of the townspeople to aid in the liquidation of monies due the trust funds from the general fund.

#### AVAILABLE FUNDS AND EXPENDITURES

An analysis of the comparative statement of available funds revealed a decrease of \$4.137.07 as compared with the preceding year. This decrease was occasioned principally by changes in carrying balances and proceeds from notes issued. A reduction in donations for the payment of the gymnasium note was also a contributing factor.

Expenditures for the same period decreased by \$3,594.61 which was reflected for the most part in the highway equipment and gymnasium accounts.

A method of effectively cancling paid invoices should be adopted. This may be accomplished either by perforation or a rubber stamp device.

#### GENERAL

An examination of the town clerk's records revealed that the townspeople voted at the annual town meeting to authorize the transfer of excise tax monies to highways and bridges account.

The voters also authorized the transfer of unappropriated surplus funds to state aid road, new fence on canal and honor roll accounts.

New trust funds accepted during the year by vote of the townspeople amounted to \$800.00. New trust funds pending acceptance by the voters at the close of the current year amounted to \$1,400.00.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Count of cash was made and records checked to determine the accuracy of recording cash transactions. The system of internal control was reviewed as pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. Receipts, vouchers and canceled checks were examined for a selected period and major increases or decreases in revenues or expenditures over previous years were explored. Excise tax collections were verified by examination of the copies of the receipts retained by the collector. Insurance and bond coverages were reviewed. Trust fund transactions were reviewed. The securiteies were verified by physical inspection.

Various laws pertaining to the fiscal operations of the municipality were reviewed to determine that related financial transactions had been properly administered.

Included in this report are exhibits and schedules pertaining to the financial status of the town. Audit procedures were followed to the extent deemed necessary to develop these statements.

It is believed that the accompanying balance sheet and supporting information fairly present the financial position of the town at February 4, 1955, and the result of its operations for the year then ended.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO: The Superintending School Committee and citizens of Monson.

Your schools are operating on a high level of performance in the areas of formal education. Discipline is excellent. There are no outstanding problems of either group or individual nature. Control is maintained at all times by the teachers.

Instruction is provided by a staff with which you all are familiar with the possible exception of Bernice Robinson who teaches the sub-primary and grade two. Instruction is of the formal type and yields results equal or better than some of the informal types.

Your teachers are striving to improve themselves and their teaching. Three of the elementary teachers have either taken correspondence courses or attended summer sessions at post-secondary, schools. Two of the Academy teachers attended the summer sessions at the University of Maine.

Miss Vivienne Bray has accumulated enough credits to receive a degree which was conferred last year.

The teaching staff was invited to participate in a two-day workshop for teachers at Milo. The areas studied were reading and arithmetic. Three of the elementary teachers, all of the teachers in the Academy, and the superintendent of schools were able to attend. Needless to say the exposure to and contact with new ideas was stimulating and helpful to those participating.

A course in science has been set up in the first six

grades. Pupil reaction is excellent. It is hoped that the course may be continued through grades seven and eight sometime.

A new and late basic reading system has been installed in the first four grades. The course will be extended through grades five and six at an opportune time. Comments of teachers and my observations indicate that the system will yield the results which were anticipated.

Overcrowding in the elementary school makes it necessary to discontinue the sub-primary grade. A time analysis shows that pupils entering school in the first grade rather than the sub-primary will receive 450 more hours of instruction than they would receive had they entered the sub-primary.

This fall only those children who are six years of age on or before October 15 may enter school for the first time. They will enter grade one.

Closing the sub-primary may be only a stop-gap arrangement. Should the enrollment increase and continue to increase during the next few years the solution will have to be more housing and more teachers. Cognizant of this possibility, the superintending school committee has an article in the warrant asking for an appropriation for a sinking fund to help cover this or other emergencies.

Repairs have been made as necessary. The walls of the gymnasium have been painted and new lighting fixtures have been installed where the old ones were obsolete.

The ceilings in the Academy have been lowered and the walls and woodwork redecorated until the rooms have an up to date appearance. The Moosehead Mfg. Co. generously gave us the necessary stringers and strapping to make the alterations in the Academy.

To the citizens and selectmen of Monson, I present the report of the activities of the Piscataquis County Tuberculosis and Health Association for the period from Jan. 1, to Dec. 31, 1955: School Health.

The school health program in Monson has two purposes—(1 to help the children in the schools be as free from correctable defects as possible, and 2) to give the pupils a health education background that will carry over into their adult lives and make these men and women of tomorrow healthy, well adjusted individuals.

The first part of the program is done by working in the schools - with the pupils, the teachers, the school physician and with the families. We try to improve conditions that foster health and erradicate those that are detrimental to healthy living. We assist parents in planning corrections, and interpret the physicians findings.

The second we do in several ways. Health education consists in the application of the principles of good health. For example the yearly health examinations, the follow-up of the findings. Health education also consists in the the use of the visual aids that teach health - the posters, pamphlets and movies that we use in our schools.

Audiometer testing was done in the spring to detect hearing losses among the pupils in Monson.

The Salk polio vaccine was offered to the first and second graders this past year. This spring it will be offered to all those age five to fifteen. The triple immunizations against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus will also be done this spring, as usual.

Tuberculosis Control

Tuberculosis continues to be the number one health problem in communicable disease.

Early diagnosis and treatment of the disease could prevent the spread of the infection and shorten the length of time needed for a cure to be effected. The Piscataquis County Tuberculosis and Health Association continues to work with the State Dept. of Tuberculosis Control and the local physicians to find those unknown cases of tuberculosis.

Public Health is People. And this Association works that all persons in our area may have better health.

We are ready to help with your health problems at all times.

## ANNUAL REPORT FOR MONSON

Division of Public Health Nursing Department of Health and Welfare January 1 to December 31, 1955

"Public Health is a working partnership of citizens and departmental professional staff."

Your public health nurse has been in contact with the Town Officials local service groups and key people in order to give public health nursing service wherever needed.

Home visits are made to counsel families regarding their nursing and health problems according to the apparent need. Clinics for hard of hearing, cardiac, pediatric, and crippled children cases are held regularly at Bangor. These are sponsored by the Department of Health and Welfare and are for any child referred by their family doctor.

Due to the continued interest of young mothers in child health conferences, the Women's Club sponsored a series of 3 during the early summer with a total attendance of 62 infant and preschool children. A local doctor gave 40 complete physical examinations; counseled the mothers individually regarding their health problems; immunized 25 children against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, and gave 19 smallpox vaccinations. The purpose of the child health conference is to keep the well child well and promote his best possible state of health. This free health protection service is invaluable as the conference not only offers a thorough physical examination but also immunizations against smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

If any public health nursing service is desired please contact the office of the Town Manager.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize

the Selectmen to work those receiving town aid, the same work to be credited to their indebtedness to the town.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to withhold sums of money due from the town until such time as indebtedness shall have been paid.

Art. 21. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for high school purposes.

Art. 22. To see if the town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to contract with the Trustees of Monson Academy for the tuition of the high school students of the town.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for schools and education, as follow:

- A. Elementary maintenance
- B. Repairs
- C. Equipment

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000, the same to be set aside and earmarked as a fund to be ultimately used for school building or heating purposes.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the State law relative to the construction of State Aid Roads, and raise and appropriate a sum of money for roads, highways and bridges as follows:

- A. Highways, general
- B. Surface treatment
- C. Sidewalks

- E. Snow removal
- F. Sanding

- Art. 34. To see what amount of money the town will appropriate to pay its share of the cost of the Social Security Plan as provided for in the preceding article.
