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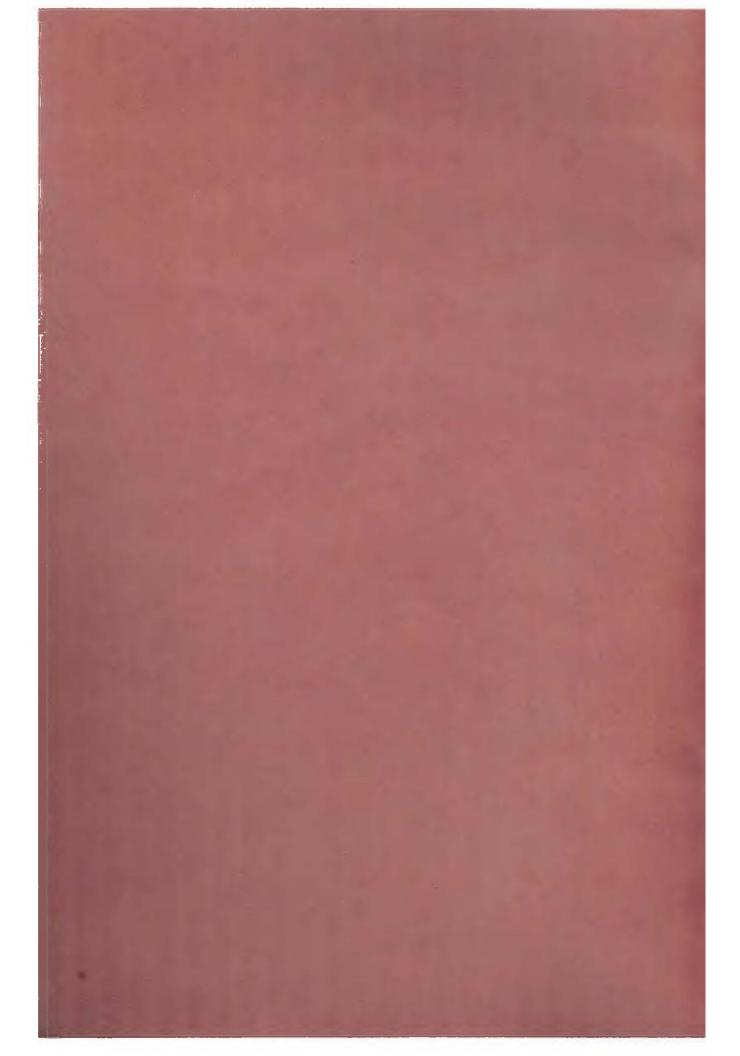

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT 1962

Monson Public Library was represented at the Round Table session in Pittsfield in 1962. The American Library Association urges attendance at these meetings, especially by small town libraries, as the subjects discussed contain many of the problems confronting the smaller organizations. Librarians, trustees, officers and friends of the library are all welcome.

Library Week was observed by a display of new books and story hours at the grade school.

Book Week was observed by story hour at the grade school featuring some of the older well-loved classics for children as well as new books. The first grade visited the library for instruction in its use.

The fifth and sixth grades visited during the year to practice the Dewey decimal System.

A great deal of work is done thru the year in connection with research papers written by students at the Academy. The Readers Guide for the year 1962 and 1963 was purchased by Monson Public Library and placed in the school for the benefit of these students.

Patronage by young people continues at a high level but adult readers during 1962 have dropped. It is hoped that 1963 will bring more adult readers into the library.

The Farm Bureau Extension Group voted to take Book Repair for the library as a project this year. The State Library was contacted and agreed to send their book binder, Mr. Richard Hurtubise, to Monson to give demonstration and teach the art of book repair to a small group. Those who attended the meeting report that the demonstration and the instruction received was thorough and should be extremely valuable to the group who work on this project. At present the library is discussing ways and means of starting a fund to buy encyclopedias.

Monson Public Library extends it's gratitude and appreciation to the many friends of the library who have contributed so generously of their time, their books and their money during the past year.

Monson Public Library wishes at this time to renew it's invitation to the members of this community to visit and browse or to ask for special help or information. Your librarian will be glad to serve you in any way she is able.

In accordance with Chapter 90-A, Revised Statutes of 1954, an audit has been conducted of the financial records of the Town of Monson for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1962.

The examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards that pertain to governmental accounting.

The audit analysis was on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, and included such tests of the accounting records and other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

The financial and statistical sections, incorporated in this report, subject to the accompanying comments, presents the results of the Town's financial operations for the period indicated.

## COMMENTS

## February 2, 1961 to January 31, 1962

An audit of the financial records of the Town of Monson has been completed for the year ended January 31, 1962. The audit consisted of an examination of the records maintained under the supervision of the Town Manager and municipal officials.

The operations for the year showed that the net unexpended departmental balance lapsed amounted to \$1,247.42, per the following summary:

Departmental Operations: Unexpended Balances Overdrafts	$$2,578.05\ 1,330.63$
Net Unexpended Balance	\$1,247.42

The overlay and an unexpended balance in the welfare account were the major factors contributing to the amount lapsed to surplus. The larger overdrafts occurred in the tax abatement and discount accounts.

* * * *

The following comments pertain to the accompanying financial statements and to the scope of audit.

ASSETS.....The general fund cash balance of \$12,202.09 was on deposit in the Guilford Trust Company, Guilford, Maine at January 31, 1962.

The Academy Fund cash balance of \$60.47 was on deposit in the Piscataquis Savings Bank, Dover-Foxcroft, Maine. Accounts receivable of \$214.50 were comprised principally of reimbursable expenditures made for State welfare cases.

Taxes receivable totaling \$5,449.77 represented for the most part current year accounts of \$4,826.52. The remaining balance of \$623.25 was for prior accounts dating from 1949.

Matured and unmatured tax liens amounted to \$623.37 and \$1,830.76 respectively.

LIABILITIES, RESERVES AND SURPLUS....The Monson Academy loans of \$1,525.00 at the start of the year were reduced to \$925.00. The payment of \$600.00 was financed by a current year appropriation.

The appropriation accounts showed an unexpended balance of \$5,507.51, representing various operating account balances carried forward to the ensuing year in accordance with legal requirements and or customary practice.

Other reserces totaling \$3,647.92 included amounts due various trust funds and a fund for the payment of the academy loan.

The unappropriated surplus amounted to \$10,053.50, an increase of \$2,433.59 for the year. This change was occasioned principally by the net unexpended departmental balance lapsed, the State reimbursement for veterans' tax exemptions and reduction of debt.

TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS.....Trust fund principals totaled \$25,674.00 and unexpended income amounted to \$1,224.85. With the exception of \$3,587.45 due from the general fund, the funds are invested in U. S. Government Bonds and bank deposits.

## ANNUAL REPORT

The special funds for school purposes totaled \$4,858.97 and are on deposit in the Piscataquis Savings Bank, Dover-Foxcroft, Maine.

DEPARTMENTAL ACCOUNTS......The departmental operating accounts showed a decrease of \$8,388.75 in funds raised by taxation, as compared with the preceding year. A smaller assessment for education was the major factor contributing to the decrease.

The departmental balances carried forward to the ensuing year decreased \$1,982.41, as compared with the balances at the start of the year. The change occured for the most part in the highway and education accounts.

GENERAL......The townspeople authorized the use of excise tax revenue for general highway purposes.

**RECOMMENDATIONS......The following recommenda**tions are worthy of consideration:

> The treasurer should use prenumbered triplicate receipts for all monies received.

> Monthly trial balances of the general ledger should be taken and retained.

## SCOPE OF AUDIT

The system of internal control was reviewed as pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern. Count of cash was made and records checked to determine the accuracy of recording cash transactions. Cash accounts were verified by reconciliation of bank statements furnished by the depositories or by direct bank confirmation. An analysis was made of receipts and deposits as well as expenditures and negotiated checks. Vouchers, payrolls and canceled checks were examined for a selected period.

Excise tax collections were verified with copies of receipts retained by the collector. Education account balances were verified with the Superintendent of Schools. Trust and special fund transactions were examined. Investments were verified by actual inspection. Surety bond coverage was reviewed.

In our opinion, subject to the foregoing comments, the accompanying statements and supporting information present fairly the financial position of the Town at January 31, 1962, and the results of its operations for the year then ended.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

### February 19,1963

The present school year at Monson Academy began on September 4, 1962 with an enrollment of sixty-one students. Since the beginning of school seven students have transferred or dropped out while one special student has enrolled. The breakdown of classes is now nine seniors, twelve juniors, thirteen sophomores, and twenty freshmen with one special student enrolled in grade eleven.

The Academy faculty remains the same as last year. Mrs. MacPherson continues as teacher of English, Civics, French and coach of dramatics. Mr. Cole teaches Mathematics and Science while serving as junior varsity basketball coach and director of Winter Sports. The commercial subjects are taught by Mr. Doughty who coaches girls basketball. The social studies, driver education, physical education, and boys varsity athletics remain the responsibility of the principal.

Monson Academy offers three basic courses of study which are: College Preparatory, Commercial and The General Course. The daily schedule calls for an eight period day with all students participating one hundred minutes a week in a physical education program.

The girls basketball team completed an exceptional season with a record of seventeen victories and no defeats. The boys team compiled a seasons record of ten victories and eleven defeats.

A commercial club was organized under the direction of Mr. Doughty for the purpose of publishing a school newspaper. The MON-AC NEWS has had two

successful printings and has provided valuable experience for the participating students.

Monson Academy has established the policy that no student living within a mile of the Academy drive an automobile to school. This is in compliance with a State Department of Education directive. I would like to thank both the students and parents for their cooperation in this matter.

Our thanks are again extended to Mr. William McDonald of the McDonald Ford Sales for providing a 1963 Ford for our Driver Education program.

I would like to thank all the school personnel, parents and citizens of Monson that have generously contributed their time and effort in order that this year might be both enjoyable and profitable for all concerned with the education of our young people.

Discipline and instruction are satisfactory, and by this I mean that they are what we have a right to expect. Instruction would improve if we could eliminate the combining of grades beyond grade two.

Textbooks are adequate, although some are worn out. It is my intention to replace these as rapidly as possible. The new science books are popular and it would seem likely to me that continued use of them might make possible the elimination of General Science in the Academy, leaving it possible to substitute Earth Science.

The educational T.V. courses in science have been used in grades five and six and grades seven and eight this year. They prove a welcome supplement to the regular work. There is more maintenance needed this coming year. There are persistent and obscure leaks in the valleys at the elementary school. It is my considered opinion that new valleys should be installed.

New regulations of the Insurance Commission require that we install air tight boiler rooms and build air ducts to the outside of the building. This will be costly.

Leaks in the gymnasium roof indicate that the roof should be walked down and new cement applied. We have the cement.

Miss Hughes has been able to extend music instruction through the first six grades, and, with the excellent cooperation of the other teachers, is getting excellent results.

The Town should consider seriously the setting aside a significant sum each year for new buildings. Sooner than it may seem, funds for a new building would be available and better instruction could be attained.

The industries and individuals who help the school so generously, often go unmentioned, but I assure you that I and the teachers are aware of these contributions and hereby express our thanks.

I thank the teachers and friends who make each year a successful one for me and for you and your child-ren.

# **REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE**

## For the Year 1962

# Maine Department of Health and Welfare Division of Public Health Nursing

Public health nursing is a community health service. This service includes visiting an individual in his own setting, such as his home, school, or even his place of employment, to plan with him to meet health needs not only for himself but for his family. Because of her close relationship with families in home visiting the public health nurse is a health teacher and councelor to each family member. A generalized nursing service provides for home care that encompasses disability, sickness and rehabilitation.

The public health nurse participates in such community measures for prevention of disease as child health conferences, health examinations in the schools, and immunization clinics. She has a knowledge of State and community resources which she, in her key position as a member of the health team, is able to interpret to families according to their needs. She works closely with physicians and other workers in health and social agencies.

The following statistical tables show the activities sponsored by your newly organized Health Council. The public health nurse has been ably assisted by the Health Council in each of these activities.

To Anselm Swanson, or any other Constable in the Town of Monson, in the County of Piscataquis, and the State of Maine:

### GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Monson, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town hall, in said town, on Monday, the Eighteenth day of March, A. D., 1963, at seven o'clock in the evening, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year and fix his compensation.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on its behalf to sell and dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute and deliver quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to fix a time when taxes shall be due and payable.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount and, if so, what percent on taxes paid prior to June 15, 1963.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest, and if so, what percent on taxes remaining unpaid September 1, 1963 with said interest to begin on the above date.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to work those receiving town aid, the same work to be credited to their indebtedness to the town.
