#### ASSESSORS' SPECIAL REPORT

To the Citizens of Monson:

How can we be sure every taxpayer in Monson is paying his fair share of the cost of town services - schools, parks, police and fire protection, highways, and many other services?

To provide the answer this letter is being printed in the Town Report with the hope that it will be read and circulated among all citizens of Monson.

The answer is in fair assessments. If every property is assessed by the same uniform rules, then no one pays more or less than his fair share of taxes.

Because of changing market value of property over the years, many assessments have gotten out of line. Some properties have been assessed too high. Still others have been assessed too low.

Why We Are Carrying Out a Town-Wide Equalization Program: It was decided that the time was overdue for updating all assessments to current market values. To do this job, the Town Selectmen have selected Patten Appraisal Associates of Portland, after receiving competitive proposals.

Their job will be to make certain that every property, large or small, is appraised by the same fair standards, with no exceptions to this rule.

As a result of this town-wide project, Monson's assessment system will be as fair and as up to date as any town, anywhere. It will also meet the State of Maine's standards for local assessment practices.

A Full and Fair Review: The job of appraising nearly 1,000 properties will have taken one year. Some-

time this spring, assessment notices will be mailed out. Those who have questions regarding their assessments will have a chance to review them with the appraisers at informal hearings.

What Will Happen to Your Tax Bill? Normally, some tax bills go up, some go down, some stay the same. Remember, the equalization program was undertaken only to make sure all assessments are fair - not to increase the individual tax bill. If your tax bill does increase, it means one of two things, or both:

- 1. Your property was assessed too low in preceding years.
  - 2. The 1976 Town budget increased over 1975's.

It should also be pointed out that the 1976 tax rate will be considerably lower than 1975's in spite of a possible increased budget. The rate will drop in proportion to the valuation increase experienced by Monson.

Do You Know What Your Property is Actually Worth? It is worth a great deal more than the present assessment. When you receive your notice, you will know the actual market value of your property. Whether you are interested in selling it or not, you will have a good idea of how valuable your real estate really is. And now, if you ever want to sell it, it should be easier to do so because the assessment is not a low figure that has little relationship to present day value.

# REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER

To the Board of Selectmen, Citizens and Taxpayers of the Town of Monson:

It is my pleasure to present this, the Town's 154th Annual Report, on our nation's 200th anniversary.

Despite several changes in Managers the past two years, the Town has suffered very little lapse in service. Credit for this is due largely to the efforts of a very dedicated and able staff.

While we are all affected by that two-headed monster, "inflation-recession", the Town remains in very good financial condition. Two audits of the Town were again performed this past year by Mr. Bryant Brown of Brunswick, a Monson native.

The property revaluation is now being conducted by Patten Appraisal Associates of Portland is expected to be completed soon and taxpayers will have the opportunity to have their new valuations reviewed before taxes are assessed.

Highways: Another section of the Barrows Falls Road was completed in 1975 with more planned for this summer. When we complete this road the State will assume summer maintenance responsibility.

Commercial Paving Co. of South Portland paved Monson streets in 1975 with more planned this year.

For the 29th year, Farrin Bros. & Smith of Brighton, plowed our streets, doing their usual excellent job. The Town should begin to consider alternatives as the Company is not sure how long they will continue with this service in the future.

This has been a very difficult winter for our highway crew and I would like to thank all of you for your patience and support.

Cemeteries: Weldon Conner was appointed Sexton of Monson Cemeteries and would like to thank the citizens of Monson for their cooperation and support. Weldon takes great pride in his work, as reflected in our beautiful cemeteries. Lots not in Perpetual Care are subject to a mowing fee, to be paid to Mr. Conner.

On behalf of the Board of Selectmen and the Town of Monson I would like to thank Weldon for his fine service.

Recreation: Whitings Cove Beach was enhanced this past summer with the addition of a boathouse. The beach is staffed by College Work Study lifeguards. The Monson Recreation Committee and S.A.D No. 68 have been cooperating to make the Monson Gymnasium available to all Monson citizens, the S.A.D. providing the facility free of charge and the Committee providing a regular schedule of supervision. Volleyball equipment is is being purchased by the Town and should enable more people to enjoy the Gymnasium. I would like to see some public access to Monson Pond where there is presently none.

The town office now offers re-registration on autos and pickups up to 6,000 G.V.W.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and Monson's citizens for all the patience and support I have received during my initial months.

#### FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

To the citizens of the Town of Monson. Fire calls answered by the Monson Fire Department.

January 1, 1975 - December 31, 1975. Six of these calls were for out of town fires.

- 2 vehicle fires
- 8 chimney fires
- 3 dwelling fires
- 1 woods fire
- 4 calls to the Town Dump.

Equipment purchases for the past year include 1 Diamond T Pumper with a thirty five foot pole ladder purchased from the Town of Guilford. This will replace our Ford Pumper, which we are retiring to be used for parades and special occasions. We purchased a new radio for our base station, also six coats with boots and helmets. We purchased two hundred feet of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inch hose and three hundred feet of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inch hose, which we were able to buy at last year's price.

We painted and lettered our four inch hose truck. We have some more work to be done on this truck and we also plan to paint and letter our Diamond T Pumper during the next year.

Drills were held twice a month from May through October and two men were on duty Sundays from 2 to 5 P. M. through the summer months.

Our Junior Firemen are now regular firemen after working with us for two years.

We do not contemplate any major purchases for the next year, however, I feel that we should consider purchasing a generator and smoke ejector in the near future. We were checked by Insurance Underwriters in September and the inspector recommended that the above mentioned items would improve our capabilities in fire fighting.

Money raising projects for the past year were the usual: Rabies Clinic, Baked Bean Supper, and the Calendar Program. Money from these programs is used for donations for worthy causes, dues to the Maine Federation of Fire Fighters, also for special equipment for the Department.

On behalf of the Monson Fire Department, I wish to thank you for your cooperation in our programs and fire fighting activities of the past year.

# AUDITOR'S REPORT

February 10, 1976

## COMMENTS

## ASSETS:

The assets of the Town were accounted for either by physical inspection or direct confirmation. The liquid assets were accounted for to a greater degree during the year than is required in standard audit procedure due to the interim audits. During the interim audits we proved cash transactions one hundred percent (100%).

#### TRUST FUNDS:

Those funds reflected the usual activity of principal and interest. We physically examined all passbooks as well as communicating with the depository banks.

#### NOTES PAYABLE:

Reduction in the two notes were made as required.

# GENERAL:

All Treasurer's receipts were analyzed in detail, a similar procedure was followed for warrants. All balances were reconciled with the cash balance which was confirmed by the bank.

Internal control was as prevelant as it could be expected in a two employee office.

We would like again to thank the Manager, book-keeper and all other Town employees who very courte-ously assisted in our engagement.

## RECOMMENDATION:

We hereby recommend that any transfer from surplus, of any consequence, be authorized by a vote of the Townspeople. This is not only our request, but a statutory requirement of the State. Any transfer previously made, not so authorized, should be corrected by a vote at the next regular or special Town Meeting.
