

REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Monson:

It is my pleasure to submit to you, the Citizens of Monson, your Town Report of 1989.

Monson continues to be in a solid position financially. Tax collections continue to be at above 90% by the time the books close January 31. Our investments continue to help decrease our total tax commitment. Our surplus account will show some decrease because of our dump problem this past year. We still are able to operate without purchasing tax anticipated notes which is due mainly to the prompt payment of taxes. We appreciate your efforts in this regard.

What has happened in Monson this past year? The bandstand has been repaired, rewired and painted and is now ready for use. The highway department purchased a new dump truck. The Fire Dept. has a new fire truck which arrived January 27, 1990. Seven new septic systems were installed which completes the project to clean up the Little Pond. The new Town Office Addition is now complete except for some files and equipment. All of the above is helping our small town keep pace without growing pains.

What is going to happen in 1990? Finally the paperwork, the needed permits and the like have been completed so that the Monson Senior Citizen Housing Project can become a reality. The well has been drilled, the land purchased, material brought in and come March 15, 1990, the project will be in full swing. Completion date hopefully in late fall or early winter. A public launching ramp and docks will be constructed early as possible this spring behind the old Masonic Hall. All permits needed have been approved. Other projects include building or rebuilding the sidewalk from the housing project to downtown. A survey will be taken this spring of the Elliotsville and Willimantic Roads to decide our next step in improving these roads. Completion of the improvements on the Greenville Road Cemetery also will start as soon as we can this summer. These projects with our regular summer work points again to a busy summer.

One project on the horizon that will require input from us all is recycling of all our trash. This is a state mandated program. We are in the process of determining what we have to do; how we will do it; and when we will do it. Once all the information has been compiled, a meeting will be held to discuss the options and determine the directions we will take to comply. You need to start thinking recycling. It will be here before you know it. I would be remiss if I neglected to mention the following. This past summer I was forced to take a month's sick leave. To the best of my knowledge, the operation was a complete success and for all intent purposes, I have a clean bill of health. I would like to take this opportunity to say to all of you who sent cards or visited me how much I appreciated your concern. My thanks to you all and it's something I will not forget.

It was during this time that "Gina" once again filled the breach and with the help provided by Julie, Frank, Cindi, Dwain and Socky, kept things moving along. We, I mean the Town of Monson, are indeed fortunate to have individuals of this caliber serving the town. I thank them all for a job well done.

I am now working on my 10th year as your Town Manager. I am looking forward to the challenges of 1990 and working with you to resolve those challenges.

Thanks to the generous donations, our annual auction was a great success again this year. The proceeds were used to purchase needed fire fighting equipment such as a new ventilation saw, a 400 g.p.m. floating portable pump, and a new air compressor which the Department shared half of the cost. Numerous service projects were also funded, such as various charities in memory of past friends and members, a delegate to Girls' State, Foxcroft Academy Championship Jacket Fund, Brown's Head Theater Fire Prevention Production, six (6) Monson student scholarships, the annual Christmas party for area children and the school fire prevention program which included the donation of smoke alarms and a fire extinguisher. The Department decorated the Town at Christmas and the visit of Santa Claus and Smokey the Bear was enjoyed by seventy-five (75) children and numerous adults.

In January of this year, our town took delivery of a new F.M.C. Pumper. It carries one thousand (1000) gallons of water and a one thousand (1000) g.p.m. pump. The G.M.C. chassis is powered by a Caterpillar diesel. This will replace the 1956 International and is a welcomed addition to our fleet. During the months to come, numerous members of our Department will be trained to competently operate this new engine on the fire grounds. Constant improvement in the Department and our fire fighting equipment and apparatus continues to increase our ability to protect our Town. The Ladies Auxiliary deserves many thanks for the hours of support and equipment donations. During the past year, they purchased a low level strainer and six (6) Nomex hoods for protection from fire and heat. These gifts have been put to good use. A warm thank-you also goes out to the wives and families of the firemen who put up with the numerous and sometimes long hours the men are away from home.

We, the Firemen of Monson, thank you for your support.

FROM THE ASSESSOR'S AGENT TO THE TAXPAYERS OF MONSON

A few years ago, we performed a revaluation for your town, and have been retained to continue updating the valuations annually. We continually monitor the sales activities, and periodically perform sales ratio studies in order to determine the accuracy of our valuations, and maintain the equity between taxpayers. State statutes require towns to maintain an average ratio of at least 70% and an equity rating of 20 or less. If these standards are not met, the state can require the town to re-value, at considerable expense. By annually increasing our valuations, we are able to save this expense, and also more equitably distribute the tax base to ensure that everyone is paying their fair share.

A recent study of sales from April 1, 1988 to the most recent data available, indicated that we were assessing at an average of 87% of market value, with an equity rating of 18. Although this is acceptable, and meets state mandates, it is getting into a dangerous position, and we found it necessary to increase our valuations again for the 1990 tax year. Using the same sales, and projecting our 1990 valuations, we brought our average ratio up to 97% and dropped our equity rating to 13, which is more than acceptable.

Much has been said lately about property tax relief, and our present legislature has passed some legislation to address this. The Homestead Exemption is one program available to all Maine residents. Applications must be filled out and are available at your town office. The amount of relief admittedly is small, but perhaps can be expanded later, and we urge you to take advantage of this. With the ever increasing county budget, school costs, waste disposal etc., you can look for increases in your property tax bills despite the best efforts of your town's governing body. At best, we can say that of all tax dollars spent, you get the best return from your local property tax of any.

This year, the Monson Planning Board has been successful in reviewing and/or revising some of the municipal codes that affect our town's development, i.e., the Building Code (including our Building Permits and Applications) and our Subdivision Ordinance. As circumstances arise and the needs for the Town of Monson continue to change, we will monitor all of our ordinances closely and continue to present revisions we feel are necessary for your review.

We are still in the initial stages of revising our Comprehensive Plan. This is an overwhelming task that will take this year and the next to complete. We expect to receive State assistance on this project and will keep you informed of our progress and results. Please be aware that we, the Monson Planning Board, will be seeking your involvement in this project as the base of our Comprehensive Plan is comprised of "census" type information. We thank you in advance for your cooperation!

Lastly, during this year, forty-four (44) building permits were issued by Lloyd G. Kelley, Code Enforcement Officer. Of the total permits issued, three (3) of them were requests for demolitions. This total of forty-four (44) is almost exactly the same as the number of permits that were issued in 1988.

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TOWN OF MONSON, MAINE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JANUARY 31, 1990

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The town of Monson does not estimate its revenue but maintains the financial records by the modified accoual method. Revenue is recognized as received. The only exception is Property Tax Revenue which is recorded upon acceptance of the assessment. Expenses are considered as funds are disbursed.

A. METHOD OF PRESENTATION

The accounts are classified as to funds. Each fund consists of self balancing accounts.

GENERAL TUND

The General Fund is the regular operating accounts of the Town.

DEBT FUND

As the name implies this fund is the outstanding financial obligation of the Town and a sheedule of these obligations in on Schedule A-3.

TRUST & SPECIAL TUNDS

These accounts are basically fiduciary in nature and are carmarked for specific purposes. A complete detail is on Schudule A-4.

B. DEFERRED PROPERTY TAXES

The National Council on Governmental Accounting in interpretation No. 3 requires that Property Tax Revenue be recognized only to the extent that it will be collected within sixty days following the year end. Our audit was conducted the first week after the year end and in our opinion it would not be practical to make an adjustment.

C. INTERNAL CONTROL

According to generally accepted auditing standards a study and evaluation of the system of internal control must be made in order to determine the timing and extent of various auditing procedures. It is the responsibility of management to establish a system of internal control.

We believe that the system in Monson is as adequate as could reasonably be expected in a small Town Office.

COMMENTS

Title 30A, Section 5823 M.R.S.A. 1964 has nequired that the independent auditor furnish the State Audit Department with a Procedural Form regarding the audit. The original Procedural Form contained one hundred seventeen, 117 questions. The State has now a "revised" Procedural which takes effect for all years ending June 30, 1989 and thereafter. This new form contains a total of one hundred ninety, 190, questions. It is our opinion that many of the questions relate to large governmental units and not small towns. However, it is mandated that they all be answered, and like most State mandates there has been no consideration given as to who should absorb the extra expense for all the additional time involved. We will comply with this requirement as it relates to the Manicipalities for which we perform audits.

SELECTMEN OF THE TOWN OF MONSON

TOWN OF MONSON ORDINANCE RESTRICTING THE CONDUCT OF DOGS IN THE TOWN OF MONSON

DEFINITIONS

Terms, as used in the Ordinance, shall have the following meaning, unless the context indicates otherwise:

1. DOG shall be intended to mean both male and female canines.

2. OWNER means any person or persons, firm, association or corporation owning, keeping or harboring a dog.

BARKING OR HOWLING DOGS

It shall be unlawful for any owner of or any person harboring any dog in the Town of Monson to permit or allow such dog to engage in habitual loud howling or barking or to conduct itself in such a manner so as to disturb the peace of any person other than the owner or owners harboring such dog.

ENFORCEMENT

Any person who observes a dog acting in violation of the ordinance may file a written complaint with a Municipal Police Officer or Animal Control Officer specifying the objectionable conduct of the dog, the date and time thereof, a description of the dog, and name and residence, if known of the owner or other person harboring said dog. Upon receipt of such complaint, the Animal Control Officer shall issue a warning to said owner or other person harboring said dog. In the event that another complaint of such nature is received by the Animal Control Officer concerning the same animal within one (1) month from the date of the initial complaint, the Animal Control Officer shall cause a complaint to be filed before any District Court in the County where such owner or keeper resides. It shall be the duty of all Animal Control Officers to enforce the provisions of the Ordinance.

PENALTY

Upon complaint before any District Court in the County where such owner or keeper resides, any person found violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a civil violation and punishable by a fine of \$25.00 for each first offense, \$50.00 for a second offense and \$50.00 for each third and subsequent offense. All fines so assessed shall be recovered for the use of the Town of Monson through the District Court.
