## IN MEMORIAM



#### BERENICE ABBOTT 1898-1991

Berenice Abbott began her work as a photographer in the heyday of Paris as the art capital of the world. There, she assisted surrealist artist Man Ray in his darkroom in 1921. By 1925, she was taking portrait photographs of avant-garde literary figures including James Joyce, Andre Gide, and Jean Cocteau. These images have served to define these authors and that period in the public mind.

Returning to New York in the 1930's, Abbott pioneered modernist photographs of the city, with its burgeoning skyscrapers and gleaming bridges juxtaposed with everyday storefronts and newsstands. In the 1940s and 1950s, she became preoccupied with science, which she considered the most important intellectual pursuit of the age.

Her career testified to Berenice Abbott's achievements as a visual artist and a photographer, but she was a teacher, writer, inventor, and historian as well. She helped found the New School for Social Research, where she taught for more than twenty years.

Berenice Abbott lived initially in Blanchard, then retired to her cabin on the shores of Lake Hebron. Many of her photographs capture the changing face of the eastern seaboard, and are included in her book "Portrait of Maine", a photographic study she began upon moving here in 1966.

## **REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER**

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Monson:

It is my pleasure to submit to you, the Citizens of Monson, your Town Report for 1991.

The past year was one that tested us all in regards to where we would be financially with all the state cuts in aid to the towns, as well as the drop in inhouse revenues that we collect at the town office. I am pleased to report that we finished the year in a sound financial condition in spite of the cuts and decrease in revenues. The main reason is that you, the taxpayer, paid your taxes early. We collected 60% of our tax commitment in July. By the time the books closed on January 31, 1992, we had collected 91% of our total tax commitment. Again, our heartfelt thanks to you all. Our estimates in regards to excise taxes, interest from investments, and registrations were all less than anticipated, but because of the volume of tax money paid early, we were able to do business as usual and once again did not have to borrow money to meet our obligations.

What did we do in 1991? We started a recycling program which is going well. We anticipated at least a 25% reduction in our solid waste. We installed blinking lights near the school. The results being that finally the trucks are slowing down during the time schools are letting out. We put siding on one side of the municipal building, leaving only the rear of the building to do. We purchased a new bucket loader after considerable discussion and thought. The gym roof was redone as well as refinishing the gym floor. Flags were installed on Main Street for Memorial Day and the Fourth of July. A computer was purchased for the town office. Trees were planted at the Lakeroad Cemetery. The most notable improvement was the work done on the Elliotsville Road and the Willimantic Road. Considerable ditching was done and will continue in the spring of '92. In most cases the work done was paid by balances in the accounts which we have been building up for a number of years. We have started the licensing process to keep the dump open. A name was chosen for our new housing project. Lake Hebron Heights certainly seems appropriate. The gold headed cane now belongs to Mrs. Carolyn Durham.

What are we going to do in 1992? The Board of Selectmen, after considerable thought in regards to the uncertainty of the State's financial condition, have done the following: The 1992 budget is not based on anticipated revenues from the State. Whatever we receive will be used to cut our tax commitment in the year 1993. Accordingly, we have made cuts in our proposed 1992 budget that reflects those losses in revenues both from the State and our own inhouse revenues. One cut that I proposed was a three day work week for myself. Let me clarify why this is possible. I'm sixty-five and can draw social security and could retire. I did not want to retire completely. I agreed to work the three days for the maximum amount allowed to earn and still draw social security. The Board agreed to try this on a six month trial basis to see if it would work and then take it from there. After making allowances, increasing Julie's hours and Gina's responsibilities, this will cut administrative costs \$5,000. Other cuts were made in the gym improvement fund, the resurfacing account, the snowplowing carrying balance, the Fire Department, the Insurance account, and the miscellaneous money accounts. Our total budget shows cuts of \$85,524.00. Our proposed municipal appropriations have been reduced by \$24,144.63. This means a 12% cut in appropriations in the Municipal Budget. Your Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee have done their job. I commend them for their efforts, especially during these difficult times. Our total dollar costs for 1992 rest squarely on the shoulders of S.A.D. No. 68. We at the municipal level have done our job with you, the taxpayer, in mind.

My hat goes off, once more, to all the Committees who so generously give of their time for the Town of Monson. My thanks to you all.

We, as a Town, are indeed fortunate to have working for us the following people. Gina, Julie, Frank, Cindi, Socky, Kathy, Rick, Paul, Andy, and Robert. To me, they all go that extra mile for the Town of Monson. You know them all. Take time to say thank you to them. They deserve it.

Socky, our Public Works Supervisor for twenty-seven years, is retiring because of ill health. He has been a trusted, dedicated employee all these years working always for the best interest of the town. In the twelve years I have been your Manager, he became and will always be my friend. Let's all hope the best for him and his family and hope he recovers.

The Chairman of the Board, Frank Nelson, died suddenly Sunday, February 9, 1992. He will be missed by all of us who have worked with him. Here was another person whose decisions were always based on what was the best for the Town of Monson. It has been my privilege to work with and for him over the years. I extend my deepest sympathy to the family. We all will miss him.

Many challenges lie ahead. It is our decision to think positive and meet those challenges and continue the progress of the Town of Monson. We will continue our efforts to make the Town of Monson a better place in which to live.

## MONSON PLANNING BOARD REPORT 1991

This year was again a very quiet year for activity. Only 28 Building permits were processed, compared to 26 last year and 44 the previous year.

The Maine DEP issued new Shoreland Zoning Guidelines during 1990. These new Guidelines must be incorporated into the Monson Shoreland Zoning Ordinance during 1991. The Planning Board placed before the Voters of Monson, a revised Shoreland Zoning Ordinance in December of 1991. The revised Ordinance was approved by the voters. However the revisions have not been submitted to the State for approval due to a new deadline set by the State. The revised ordinance will not be submitted until the new deadline of July 1, 1992. Therefore the old Ordinance will remain in effect until such time as the revised Ordinance is submitted.

During 1992 the Comprehensive Planning Committee continued to work on the new the revised comprehensive plan. A community survey was conducted during the year and the results have been tabulated. The results are available for you at the Town Office. Again due to the State eliminating the Office of Comprehensive Planning, we have put the plan on hold. If the citizens of Monson wish to continue this Planning effort, please let use know and be prepared to give of your time to continue this plan for our Future.

Also during this past year we had a small change in the membership of the Planning Board, Diana Krauss resigned due to other commitments and Mary Ellen Pembroke was appointed to replace Diana. My thanks to both Ladies.. If you have any questions, comments, or suggestions, please contact any Planning Board member and feel free to attend one of our regular meetings. Thank you.

Any organization or group interested in renting the gym for an activity should make arrangements by contacting the Town Office during regular business hours. Monson residents wishing to use the gym for pickup basketball or volleyball may obtain a key from any gym committee member. High school students must first sign an agreement outlining responsibilities before obtaining the key. We appreciate the basic care and consideration being demonstrated, as well as the prompt reporting of any problems.

In closing, we want to thank the many people who have contributed time, energy and money to the upkeep of the gym. Please feel free to let us know if you have ideas or suggestions concerning the gym.

# Monson Comprehensive Planning Committee

Because of a state mandate which requires all towns in Maine to develop a comprehensive plan, the Monson Comprehensive Planning Committee was formed late last winter. Although the actual number of persons involved with the committee has fluctuated a good deal, a questionnaire relevant to Monson and its' concerns was drawn up by using sample surveys from other towns. Approximately 540 surveys were sent to taxpayers of Monson including resident and non-resident. Of those surveys sent, 98 responses were returned. Most people not only answered the questions on the survey, but also took the time to add their own thoughts and comments. Most people felt that a long-range plan for the town was necessary. Generally those responding were concerned about the availability of jobs and housing but were not optimistic for future growth because of the economy. Complete results of the survey are available in the Town Office.

Because of state budgets cuts, the Office of Comprehensive Planning was eliminated. Local comprehensive planning is now a voluntary program. No state funding will be available for those towns which continue the planning process. Residents of Monson will be asked to decide at the annual town meeting if they wish to continue comprehensive planning.

Independent Auditor's Report

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Monson, Maine as of January 31, 1992, and the results of its operations and changes in fund balances for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements of the Town of Monson, Maine. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.
