Warrant for Town Meeting.

MARCH 2, 1885.

*To Frederick D. Scamman, a Constable in the Town of Gorham, in
the County of Cumberland, Greeting:*

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Gorham, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Monday, the Second day of March, 1885, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose all town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To receive the selectmen's settlement with the town treasurer, and act on same.

ART. 4. To receive and act upon the report of the several town officers.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of poor.

ART. 6. To see what plan the town will adopt to repair their highways, and what sum of money they will raise and assess for the same.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of bridges.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of schools.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for contingent expenses.

ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise two hundred and twenty-eight dollars and fifty-eight cents, to pay interest on Huston fund.

ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to allow such accounts as may be presented against the town, and raise money to pay such as may be allowed.

ART. 12. To see if the town will vote to allow C. W. Shaw, to draw his proportion of school money for the year 1885, from school district No. 15, and allow him to pay the same to district No. 18, with right to send his scholars to said district No. 18, during the year 1885.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of free high schools.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Selectmen upon the location of a road beginning at a point on the southerly side of Flaggy Meadow road near Mrs. Devine's house and extending across said Devine's field to the easterly line of the Osborne road.

ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to discontinue so much of the old Osborne road as is comprised between the location of the new road, and Flaggy Meadow road.

ART. 16. To see if the town will vote for school district No. 6, to raise by a tax more than thirty dollars, to repair the school house in said district, agreeable to an application.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make an alteration in the road at Great Falls, so far as to straighten the same, where it crosses the Canal, also to make any other alterations or improvements in said road, that may be deemed necessary for the convenience and safety of the public travel, agreeable to an application.

ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise twelve hundred and ninety-six dollars to pay outstanding note and interest which was given on account of town farm buildings, and becomes due Aug. 1885.

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to tax dogs for the ensuing year.

ART. 20. To see if the town will fix upon a valuation for a term of years, of the property of the Presumpscot Pulp Ware Co., or, take any other action as the town may see fit, in regard to the taxation of said property.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise fifty dollars, to repair the hearse at Gorham Village.

ART. 22, To see if the town will vote to set off J. J. G. Hannaford, and his estate from school district No. 17, and annex the same to school district No. 1.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to sell to D. H. McKenney, a piece of land in the north-eastern corner of the Cemetery at Gorham village, agreeable to an application.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the selectmen's office, at Gorham, at two o'clock in the afternoon, on Saturday, the twenty-eighth day of February, 1885.

We should have been glad to employ them for a term of years, as recommended in last year's report, but were unable to induce them to remain even another year.

It is very important that there be as full a record as possible of the Marriages, Births and Deaths in the town. It might be very much fuller and more accurate than it is, if all would carefully obey the law, given in Revised Statutes Chapt. 59, as follows, viz :

SECTION, 20. The Clerk of every town shall record in a suitable book the Marriages, Births and Deaths occurring therein, and by the second Monday of May, annually, shall make certified returns thereof to the Secretary of state for the year ending on the last day of March, and said Secretary shall receive and file them in his office.

SECTION, 21. The assessors, while taking the inventory of the polls and estates, annually, shall ascertain by inquiry the births and deaths during the year ending on the last day of March, and make return thereof to the town clerk by the last day of April; and parents, house-holders, masters of work-houses, alms-houses, prisons and vessels, shall give notice to the clerk of their town of the births and deaths which take place in their families, houses, or vessels, and the elder person next of kin shall give notice of the death of his kindred.

SECTION, 22. *Whoever neglects to perform the duties required of him in the three preceeding sections, forfeits not exceeding ten dollars for each offence, to be recovered by complaint, half to the town and half to the prosecutor.*

It is the custom of some towns to publish a list of Marriages, Births and Deaths in their annual report, and it is suggested that if the law is reasonably complied with the coming year, such lists be published in our next annual report.

Although our schools for the past year compare very favorably with those of former years, and many of them stand far in advance of what they have in past times, yet we feel sure that you are not receiving all the advantages from the expenditure of your school funds that you should.

Many of the teachers employed, have proved themselves to be possessed of the requisit qualifications to successfully govern and instruct; and such, when properly sustained by the co-operation of parents and scholars, have invariably succeeded in adapting their labor to the peculiar wants of their pupils.

Among the attendant evils of the district system is the too frequent change of teachers; it being a rare occurrence that the same teacher is retained for even two consecutive terms.

When a competent teacher is employed, if he could be retained from year to year in the same school, and the parents would manifest such an interest as would awaken in, and impress upon the minds of their children the importance of education and the personal

benefits to be derived therefrom, we should speedily witness such a change in the character of our schools, as could not fail of producing beneficial and lasting results.

We repeat the suggestion made last year, that the town should reduce the number of its districts.

There are six districts (one third of the whole number in town) which have an aggregate average attendance of only fifty seven scholars. The cost of teaching these scholars, exclusive of repairs on school-houses and heating the same, is thirty-five dollars and sixty-two cents per week, or sixty-two and one-half cents per week for each scholar.

We think that no one upon looking over the returns from the different schools, can fail to see that the interests of education would be promoted by the consolidation of some of our smaller schools. This would enable them to secure longer schools and better teachers. The interest in a school of respectable size is always greater, under good management, than it can be where but ten or twelve attend school.

The High School in District No. 1. graduated its second class July 3, 1884.

Our High Schools are of decided benefit, especially to those scholars who intend teaching, and, also to those preparing to enter the Normal School. We heartily recommend the continuance of the appropriations.

We are pleased to report that the inhabitants of school District No. 13, have, during the past year, built a convenient, attractive and commodious school-house, which supplies a want long felt by this district.

We hope to see other districts which fail to have such houses as their wants demand, speedily follow the example thus set before them.
