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



Report of Annual March Meeting,

AND ALL SUBSEQUENT MEETINGS PERTAINING TO TOWN AFFAIRS FOR THE YEAR 1887, IN ACCORDANCE TO A VOTE PASSED AT SAID ANNUAL MEETING.

VOTED to accept the reports of the several town officers. VOTED to raise \$1,000 for support of poor. VOTED to raise \$4,000 to be expended under the direction of surveyors, appointed by selectmen.

VOTED to raise \$800 for bridges.

VOTED to raise \$3,300 for schools.

VOTED to raise \$750 for Free High Schools.

VOTED to raise \$1,200 for contingent.

VOTED to raise \$228.58, interest on Huston fund.

VOTED to allow a discount of three (3) per cent on all taxes assessed for 1887 and paid to the collector before Oct. 1, 1887, and the collector be allowed one (1) per cent. on all money collected before Oct. 1, 1887, and two (2) per cent. on all money collected after Oct. 1, 1887.

VOTED that the same time be given to the collector to collect the taxes as last year.

VOTED to enlarge the cemetery near Williams Hill and raise \$50 for the same.

VOTED to raise \$25 for Memorial purposes.

VOTED that the selectmen be authorized to adjust the Aldrich suit if they can do so upon terms which they think for the best interest of the town; otherwise that they be instructed to insist upon a speedy trial of the case.

VOTED that all questions in regard to the Portland Water Co. be referred to the selectmen.

At a subsequent meeting held May 16th,

VOTED to accept the report of the selectmen upon the location of a road leading from the new Portland road to Depot street.

VOTED that the selectmen be instructed to have the road built so it will be safe for travel.

VOTED to raise \$200 to aid in fencing the fair ground near Gorham village.

STATE OF MAINE. Warrant for Annual Town Meeting,

MARCH 5, 1888.

To Walter C. Clement, a Constable in the Town of Gorham, in
the County of Cumberland,Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Gorham, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Monday, the fifth day of March, 1888, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting. ART. 2. To choose all town officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To receive the selectmen's settlement with the town treasurer and act upon the same.

ART. 4. To receive and act upon the report of the several town officers.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of poor.

ART. 6. To see what plan the town will adopt to repair their highways, and what sum of money they will raise and assess for the same.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of bridges.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of schools.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for contingent expenses.

ARF. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise two hundred

and twenty-eight dollars and fifty-eight cents, to pay interest on Huston fund.

ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to allow such accounts as may be presented against the town, and raise money to pay the same.

ART. 12. To see what action the town will take in relation to Free High Schools, and what sums of money they will raise for the same.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the suitable observance of Memorial Day, agreeable to an application.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to abolish the school districts in said town, agreeable to an application.

ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to change the road leading from West Gorham to Fort Hill by cutting off the south east corner of the land of Charles H. Lowell, so as to avoid a dangerous and expensive ledge of rocks in the road as now traveled, agreeable to an application.

ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to set off George L. Day and his estate from school district No. 4, and annex the same to school district No. 1, agreeable to an application.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise thirty dollars to finish painting fence and remove the debris from the cemetery at West Gorham, agreeable to an application.

ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to shingle and repair the buildings on Town Farm, and raise money for the same.

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid within a certain limited time from the commitment of the same to the collector, and also the time and amount of discount, agreeable to an application.

ART. 20. To see what rate per cent. the town will pay for collecting, and what time they will give the collector for collecting the same, agreeable to an application.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to buy a beach wagon for the Town Farm, and raise money for the same.

ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to tax dogs for the ensuing year.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to allow Chas. H. Osborne to draw his proportion of school money for the year 1888 from district No. 2, and allow him to pay the same to district No. 1, with the right to send his scholars to said district No. 1, during the year 1888, agreeable to an application.

ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to build and paint the fence at Williams Hill cemetery, and raise money for the same.

ART. 25. To see what action the town will take in relation to building the bridge at Mallison Falls.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the lists of voters, at the selectmen's office, in Gorham, at two o'clock in the afternoon, on Saturday, the third day of March, 1888.

REPORT

OF THE

Superintending School Committee.

To the Citizens of Gorham :

Your Superintending School Committee take pleasure in presenting the following report.

The School Census showed the number of scholars in town to be 887, divided among 18 districts. The census of 1859, as given in the Town Report, showed 1,326 scholars and the same number of districts. It would seem that, if we have now only two thirds as many scholars as at that time, there ought to be at least some change in the number of districts. This loss of scholars has fallen most heavily upon the smaller districts, caused in some degree by the setting off families from their old districts on to the larger ones, so that now some districts present hardly a respectable number It cannot be called a judicious expenditure of public of scholars. money to maintain schools in districts containing 20 scholars as No. 2, or 15 as No. 7, or only 14, the number returned by Districts Nos. 11 and 14. Especially is this true when the number actually attending school dwindles to five and four as in Districts Nos. 2 and 14. The following shows the cost of instruction, per week, for each scholar attending school in a few districts and the cost in the West Gorham district is also given for comparison :- District No. 2,\$1.00; District No. 7, \$.97; District No. 11, \$.78 for Summer term and \$.86 for the Fall term; District No. 14, \$1.25 for Summer term and \$.83 for the Winterterm. In District No. 5 the expense was 25 and 35 cents, per scholar, for the Spring and Fall terms respectively.

It has been the settled policy of this town for many years to allow the greatest possible individual liberty in the matter of school districts, as is shown by the facility with which families have been transferred, at their own request, from one district to another. The town does not seem to wish to force the abolition of these small districts, though it has been recommended by successive committees for many years. It is to be hoped that the persons composing these small districts will see that it is for their own advantage, and themselves take the initiative in regard to annexing their district to so ne other district or districts. Let this matter be brought up at the annual meeting of the district and some action be taken to consolidate our schools into a more symmetrical whole.

The town voted for schools \$3,300, and the town's portion of the state school money was \$1,511.89, making a total of \$4,811.89. Your Committee distributed \$4,390.65 equitably, giving \$4.95 for each scholar reported. The remaining \$421.24 was distributed among the districts, giving a portion to each, except Districts Nos. 1 and 16. The statistical table shows the amount given to each district. By this distribution, there were given to each scholar in District No. 2, \$6.50; in District No. 7, \$7.33; and \$8.24 in Nos. 11 and 14. This seems to be paying a large premium for the maintainance of small districts.

The High School, in District No. 1, has been unfortunate in having three principals during the year. The Spring term was shortened to eight weeks, as Mr. Davis would not remain longer. Mr. Horne gave great satisfaction in the Summer term, but he accepted, quite unexpectedly to the Committee, another more lucrative position. We were fortunate in securing Mr. O. D. Sewall for the year to succeed him. He was selected from a large number of applicants and there has been no reason for wishing that a different choice had been made. The school never presented a more quiet and orderly appearance and never worked more faithfully than at the present time. We hope that Mr. Sewall may long be retained over the school, believing it will be to the advantage of all who may attend. The attendance upon this school from other parts of the town seems to indicate that, ere long, it may be best to make it a town High School for the entire year, instead of having two terms under the control of the District. The residence of these attending the

High School department, during the past year, has been as follows:

The figures for the Summer term include both the Grammar and High School departments. The annual graduating exercises of the school took place in the Congregational Church, on Friday, July 1st. A class of six received the diploma of the school. Their names are as follows:

Of these, Fred E. Bragdon entered Bowdoin College, passing an examination highly creditable to himself and to the school.

Special attention, during the year, has been given to enlarging and improving the course of study in the English department of the High School. We do not wish to make of it a mere classical school, but a school where our scholars can learn what will be of practical use through life, what will make their lives better and more useful to the State and more satisfactory to themselves. The Principal has labored with this end in view and taken upon himself classes embracing the greatest number of scholars, so as to exert as great a personal influence as possible.

The attendance upon the schools has been lessened by the prevalence of contagious diseases. The school at Great Falls was closed for a time during the Summer term. The school at West Gorham was closed for one week in the Fall term and the primary school in the Village for two weeks in the same term. The scarlet fever, measles and mumps still remain unabated. The school at Fort Hill is closed by reason of the sickness of the teacher and it has been necessary to postpone the opening of the Spring term in the village. Though these diseases have been of a very mild form and have, thus far, proved fatal in no case, it is hoped that, in all cases, every possible precaution will be taken to prevent the spread of disease.

It is a matter for congratulation that a larger number are availing themselves of the advantages afforded by the model rooms at the Normal School, thus relieving the village primary school. We have also made arrangements by which the class in chemistry will receive for the next term special instruction from Prof. H. M. Estabrook of the Normal School.

The Free High School in District No. 9 has been under the same Principal as last year. The success of this school and the number in attendance prove the wisdom of its establishment and maintenance.

We would urge upon the citizens of the various districts care in the selection of the agents. Let school meetings be fully attended and that man elected who will best perform the duties. It is hoped also that the agents will be prompt and accurate in presenting their Census returns, as our school money from the State is dependent upon the prompt rendering of the required returns.

Many of our school houses are in very poor condition. We are satisfied that there would be improvement in many cases, if the parents would inform themselves of the necessities. A rearrangement of the districts would render it unnecessary to repair some buildings. Last year a day was appointed for Arbor Day. If this is continued, advantage ought to be taken of it to improve the appearance of our school houses and grounds. Even, if nothing more can be done, let trees be planted, a woodbine set so as to cover some part of the building, and a few pots of flowers cared for within the school room. In this work, however, it must be remembered that the transplanting is only a small part of the labor. Subsequent care and attention are necessary, or all will be lost.


We would urge again upon our citizens the necessity of a personal interest in our schools. We are expending much money upon them, more for a single district than was expended in the whole town in 1856, and we wish the children of the town to reap the full benefit of every dollar expended. The presence of parents in the school, not only at the close of the term but during its progress, is an incentive to teacher and scholar and highly conducive to the prosperity of the school. We know that changes in text books are not popular with those who have to purchase them, but we must call attention to the text book in Arithmetic. It is not satisfactory even to those who introduced it. A change evidently ought to be made as soon as a decision can be made in regard to the very best text book. We need a book with practical examples, instead of puzzles. The present book would do well for a class taking a finishing review of

the study, but should be preceded by a book more plain and practical.

In conclusion, we recommend for school purposes, for the ensuing year, the same appropriations as were made last year.
