BRIDGES.

At a special Town Meeting held June 30, 1893. to consider what should be done in relation to certain Bridges.

It was

Voted, "That the Selectmen be directed to replace Deguio's Bridge (so called) by an Iron Truss Bridge."

Voted, "That the Selectmen be directed to replace Harding's Bridge with an Iron or Wooden Truss Bridge."

Voted, "That the Town Treasurer be directed to hire such sum of money as may be required, not exceeding Twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500.) One-half to be paid in one year, the remaining half in two years, and on such terms as he may consider for the best interests of the Town. To pay such bills as may be required to carry out the direction of the above votes."

In accordance with the above, the Treasurer has hired the sum of Twenty-four hundred dollars (\$2400.).

Owing to the severity of the Winter of 1892-92, a larger number than usual of the watercourses and small Bridges required to be rebuilt the past season. At So. Gorham, the severe storm of May 16th, washed away one abutment and damaged the other. The stone and covering were swept down stream. A temporary bridge was built and is now standing. We expected to rebuild in August, but it was found that Diguio's and Harding's Bridges were unsafe. Some repairs were made, and a Town Meeting called June 30th, to consider the subject.

In accordance with the votes there passed, the Selectmen called for bids for two Iron Truss Bridges.

We received bids and plans from eight responsible parties, the lowest bid being \$2,325, and the highest \$2,684, average \$2,497.93.

We contracted with the Vermont Construction Co., (the lowest bidders) \$2,325 for the two bridges.

The Company has erected two Rivited Iron Truss Bridges, in a satisfactory manner to us, which we consider a credit to the Town.

By the death of Hon. John A. Waterman which occurred within a few hours after the close of the last March meeting, the town is without a Financial Committee regularly chosen to prepare the Financial Report.

The town reports from February 1870 contain the name of John A. Waterman as a member of the Finance Committee: from 1878 to 1893 he was the sole member.

He ever maintained the deepest interest in the financial affairs of this town: and in the preparation of his reports, exercised the utmost care as to fullness and accuracy of statement. A devoted and liberal citizen, an impartial counsellor, absolutely upright, wise in judgment conservative in action, he was in all Town affairs looking to the highest good for the Town. Our loss by his death is irreparable. In preparing for the town this first financial report since his death, it has seemed fitting thus to preface the same by some reference to him who for so many years has prepared similar reports.

School Report.

To the Citizens of Gorham:

The School Committee are pleased to report that the schools of the town have, during the past year, been generally profitable to those attending them, though they may not have attained that perfection which affords entire satisfaction.

Our High School has been most fortunate in being able to retain the same teachers for another year. By their long years of conscientious, painstaking service, they have gained the confidence and respect of the whole community. The success of the past has not, however, caused any self-satisfied relaxation in their efforts, but, on the other hand, each success has only aroused them to the possibility of still higher achievement. The study of our English language and literature has been given constantly increasing prominence, and our scholars are learning to appreciate the beauties of classic English so that the study becomes a pleasure instead of an irksome task. One trouble found in the school is the lack of sufficient elementary work in English grammar before entering the High School. It is essential that the Grammar School shall afford a sufficient knowledge of the technical principles of English grammar so that the pupils may profitably undertake the studies of the High School course.

The graduation exercises of the class of '93 brought out a very large audience and were highly satisfactory. The following are the names of the class :

While our town takes pride in its schools and boasts of their entire freedom to every citizen so that there is no excuse for any one to grow up in ignorance, there is a tendency to a constant increase in the incidental expenses connected with the graduation season. Class-rings, class-pictures, expensive music and elaborate graduating-suits make an expense which is liable to become burdensome to some families. Our well-to-do citizens ought to take care that they do not become a stumbling-block to their less-favored neighbors by allowing these self-imposed expenses to debar any of our youth from the enjoyment of all our school privileges. Especially is this true at this time when our citizens are more than ever alive to the advantage of giving their children the benefit of the entire course provided for them.

During the summer vacation, the agent in District No. 1 performed a very necessary work. A new floor, smooth and tight, was laid in place of the old shrunken one, worn by years of service and practically impossible to keep clean even with the greatest care. The replacing of the old desks, cut and hacked, by new single desks of the latest style, afforded a great pleasure to teachers and pupils. The care exercised by the scholars in the use of these improvements shows that they are appreciated. There can be no doubt that these expenditures will be well repaid both by their salutary influence upon the health and comfort of the scholars and by the refining influence of improved surroundings.

For the new school law, we bespeak the hearty support of all. So radical a change as is thus enforced cannot fail to meet criticism and some opposition. It is necessary, if the new system is to be a success, for all to exercise that spirit of charity which will lead them to lay aside any private, personal interests and unite upon such measures as may seem to be for the interest of the whole of our citizens. The number and location of our schools will be one of the most delicate questions to be decided the coming year, and one of vital importance, not only to the education of our youth, but also to the financial interests of the town. The equalization of the length of the schools required by the law will render necessary a reduction of the number of schools, unless the town raises an increased amount of money. The greater interest and efficiency in schools of sufficient size to afford some emulation between the different scholars will more than counterbalance the inconvenience caused by a slight increase in the distance of some families from the school building.

That this fact is realized by our citizens is shown by the attendance in the Village High School. During the year there have been forty-two scholars in attendance, for a longer or shorter period, from other districts than No. 1. Of these South Gorham furnished twelve; West Gorham, ten; Little Falls, nine; Allen, Blake and Fort Hill, three each; and Flagg Meadow, two.

It is to be hoped that a careful consideration of the welfare of the scholars and of the town as a whole, rather than any selfish, personal interest, will characterize the introduction of the new system.

A word at the conclusion of the district system may not be inappropriate in relation to the much abused district agent. It is customary to represent him as the personification of selfishness and nepotism. It is, however, a pleasure to say that some of our agents have taken an active,

energetic interest in their schools, and have served their districts faithfully and impartially without any hope of personal gain or advantage.

Some of our schools, too, show plainly the result of the faithful work of the teachers who have been retained term after term. The Fogg district is one of these, and the painstaking labor of the teacher, Miss Maria C. Hamblen, cannot fail to yield satisfaction to herself as well as to the district. The school at Great Falls has also made commendable progress in spite of numerous disadvantages under which it has labored. If the present depression in business does not result in a considerable decrease in the number of scholars in this district, it may be necessary to grade this school and divide it into two as soon as suitable accommodations for the same can be arranged.

The unfurling of a flag over the White Rock school-house on the 10th of June was an occasion of notable interest. Appropriate exercises by the scholars, joined to an able address by the Hon. J. H. Fogg of Portland, together secured the interest of the entire community. The practice of making the school the custodian of our national flag cannot be too highly commended. Let our youth learn that they have a country of whose history they may be justly proud, whose present affords them advantages not to be enjoyed in any other section, and whose future they must themselves guard from any semblance of tarnish. Our schools are the foundation of our national greatness and the guardian of our national honor — as such we commend them to your fostering care, hoping that they will receive your usual generous support.

We recommend the appropriation of four thousand dollars for common schools, and one thousand dollars for Free High Schools. It is necessary to continue the practice of dividing the appropriation and making a part for the support of Free High Schools, in order that we may secure

from the State its stipend of two hundred and fifty dollars granted in repayment of the appropriation.

We recommend the appropriation of two hundred and fifty dollars for free text books. The purchases of books have been made as economically as possible, though it has often caused the committee some inconvenience in transferring books from one district to another. Many of the first and second readers are so worn by the constant handling of little fingers that they need to be replaced by new ones at an early date.

ART. 5, To receive and act upon the report of the several Town Officers.

ART. 6, To see if the Town will vote to allow such accounts as may be presented against the Town, and raise money to pay the same.

ART. 7, To see if the Town will vote to raise \$228.58 to pay interest on Houston Fund.

ART. 8, To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Contingent Expenses.

ART. 9, To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Poor.

ART. 10, To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Bridges.

ART. 11, To see what plan the Town will adopt to repair their highways, and what sum of money they will

raise and assess for the same.

ART. 12, To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Free High Schools, and what action, if any, they will take on the same.

ART. 13, To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Common Schools.

ART. 14 To see what sum of money the Town will raise for repair of School Houses, and supplies of Fuel, and other expenses.

ART. 15, To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the suitable observance of Memorial Day.

ART. 16, To see what sum of money the Town will raise to provide School Books for the use in the Public Schools.

ART. 17, To see if the Town will raise \$15.00 for the support of a meeting at Little Falls, for the benefit of the Town Farm inmates.

ART. 18, To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Treasurer to extend, where due, for a term of years, the notes given to raise money to pay for the iron Bridges, built during the past year.

ART. 19, To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,200 to one of the bridge notes, which will fall due September 1st, 1894.

ART. 20, To see if the Town will raise \$120 to pay interest on Town note.

ART. 21, To see if the Town will raise \$500 to pay interest on outstanding orders.

ART. 22, To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to paint the hearse and Cemetery fence, near Waite Rock Station.

ART. 23, To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to paint the Cemetery fence, at Gorham Village.

ART. 24, To see if the Town will vote to allow the Waterhouse Bros. to build a shop on the Town Farm pasture land, opposite the house of A. N. Waterhouse, And upon what terms.

ART. 25, To see if the Town will allow residents of other towns, to purchase lots, in Cemeteries in this Town, and to fix the terms, if the Town so vote.

ART. 26, To see if the Town will take any action in relation to filling the old Cumberland & Oxford Canal, at Little Falls Village.

ART. 27, To if the Town will vote to discontinue the old town road, commencing at a point on the Burnham County road, opposite the road leading to Benjamin Milliken's house, and leading past C. W. Deering's road.

ART. 28, To upon what conditions, and what per cent, the Town will vote to pay for collecting the taxes for the year 1894,

ART. 29, To see if the Town will take any action in regard to purchase of the manuscript relating to the history of the town of Gorham, and now owned by the heirs of the late Col. H. D. McLellan, and do what is necessary to carry the same into effect.
