The number of schools in town at the beginning of the past municipal year was 12, but at the end of the summer term the Blake School was discontinued and the pupils from this district have been transported to the West Gorham School during the fall and winter terms.

The past school year has been a prosperous and successful one, generally, although the number of pupils in the schools has diminished together with the number of persons in the town, of school age. There have been few changes among the teachers and the work in the various schools has gone steadily forward as a rule.

The value of the influence of a teacher of high moral character, earnest of purpose, trained ability and a hearty interest in the welfare of his pupils can not be estimated in dollars and cents, and Gorham may well congratulate herself that so many of her teachers rise to so high a standard.

In the Gorham High School Principal Glover has striven earnestly to maintain a high standard of discipline and excellence in class work, and in both particulars has succeeded in a commendable degree, but there has seemed to persist a certain lack of that hearty sympathy and co-operation between teacher and pupils which is so essential to the best work.

The work of the school was somewhat broken up in the beginning of the fall term by the unexpected resignation of Miss Ridlon. In the emergency Mrs. Glover was chosen to fill her place and has succeeded so well that she has been retained for the rest of the year. The graduating exercises of the school were held at the Congregational church, June 20, 1902, and diplomas were granted to the following pupils:

The work of the primary department of the village school has gone on most successful under the capable and enthusiastic instruction of Miss Reed who is keeping her department fully up to the standard of efficiency formerly maintained by Miss Cloudman.

In the Frederick Robie School there has been no change of teachers during the past year. Mr. Dole, ably seconded and aided by Miss Davis, has brought about marked improvement in this school, and is raising the standard of scholarship and increasing the scholarly interest among the pupils. At the end of the summer term, 1902, the diploma of the school was granted to the following pupils:

Bertha C. Freeman, Ethel F. Field, Swett Irish.

Miss Hamblen's work in the primary and intermediate grade of this school has been of the same steady, even, faithful character as in the past, and the showing of the pupils has been excellent.

At the Levi Hall School Mr. Lubee has continued as principal, but Miss Hale was succeeded by Miss Burnell at the beginning of the Fall Term. The attendance at this school is rather small, but the character of the work done is excellent. Mr. Lubee is a faithful, conscientious teacher and has managed the school well and kept up the interest in spite of the small classes. At the end of the school year, 1902, the following pupils were granted the diploma of this school:

Florence Mae Parker, James Harvey Allen, Theo. Wilson, Perey Clifford Irish, Frank Alonzo Moses, Roland Gray. Miss Burnell in her first experience has shown ability and skill as an instructor and has worked faithfully. Miss Whipple in the primary grade has shown a steady gain in efficiency.

The White Rock School is classed as an ungraded school, but having the benefit of an assistant teacher, the school work can be better systematized and a greater amount of time given to the various classes than in the other ungraded schools, thus making it easier to keep the work up to certain grade requirements. Under the excellent management of Miss Coffin and Miss Files the character of the work done in this school is not surpassed in town.

It is not necessary to make individual mention of the work of Miss Cartland in the Fort Hill School, Miss Usher in the Wescott, Miss Harvey in the Elmwood and Miss Lowell in the Longfellow School further than to say that each has maintained the high standard shown in their years of previous service in these schools.

Miss Hale was transferred from the assistantship in the Levi Hall School to the So. Gorham School, and has done excellent work and given general satisfaction in the district.

The West Gorham School has suffered from repeated changes in its teachers in late years, and it was hoped that an improvement in this respect could be made in the past year. Miss Cobb's work during the summer and fall terms was very good but at the end of the fall term she resigned on account of her health, thus making another break in the schools work. It is to be hoped that a teacher of thorough efficiency may be secured for this school for a term of years.

The pupils of the South Gorham school have for some time been saving money to purchase a flag, and at the end of the fall term a flag raising was held, when interesting and appropriate exercises were given by the school and talks to the school were made by Miss Jennie Whitney, Rev. E. H. Harmon, Mr. Charles W. Deering and others. Great interest is shown by nearly all of the schools in town to keep the rooms tidy, to brighten the walls with pictures and drawings, to enliven the school exercises by

talks on subjects pertaining to natural history and events of the day, or by committing and reciting quotations, and generally to employ all the modern methods of stimulating mental and moral growth in the pupils and arousing an intellectual interest in the world about them. Flag drills, exercises for the development of patriotism, readings on the meaning, purpose and duty of true citizenship are in many instances made prominent parts of the school work

During the past year extensive repairs and improvements have been made on the Gorham High School building. The exterior has been painted: the outhouses in the rear of the building have been removed, and modern flush-basin water closets nave been put into the basement, connecting with a capacious cesspool dug in the northeast corner of the school grounds.

These closets have been separated from the rest of the basement by a brick partition and the floors thoroughly cemented. On the lower floor the partition has been moved back, thus making space for primary school in the front room and giving access to this room by the entrances originally designed for this purpose. The smaller room at the rear of the first floor has been devoted to the use of the assistant in the High School as a recitation room, and to give access to this room a staircase was built at the back of the High School building.

This arrangement is much more convenient and satisfactory than the former one and, moreover, has entirely done away with the nuisance of the former outhouses. In this connection it may be well to call attention to the imperative necessity for some improvements in the outhouses at the Frederick Robie school. The most suitable plan would seem to be the purchase of a sufficient amount of land at the rear of the building and the construction of outhouses similar to those at North Gorham

During the summer vacation the sloping floor and oldfashioned backed desks were removed from the Fort Hill School building, a new floor laid, the seats from the Mosher district put in and the building otherwise repaired and painted inside. Somewhat extensive repairs were made on the assistants' room at

the White Rock school. Many of the schoolhouses need painting badly and the appropriation for the ensuing year should be liberal enough to enable this to be done at once. At the South Gorham school land enough for a suitable school yard should be purchased and the yard properly enclosed. This schoolhouse needs painting and certain other repairs badly.

The proper care of free text books by the pupils is a matter that has caused considerable concern to teachers and superintendent. Except in the case of new books it is very difficult to estimate the injury inflicted by the last user and adjudge damages.

There is no doubt in my mind that in the majority of instances the text books are abused and heedlessly destroyed. Some of the teachers have taken great pains to form habits of carefulness in the use of text books and the value of this care is plainly apparent. Parents should interest themselves in this matter and do all in their power to have their children use their books carefully.

The fact that the text book account was overdrawn this year is due mainly to the introduction of new geographies and arithmetics.
