SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of Gorham:—

In accordance with the vote passed at the annual town meeting your committee united with the school committee of the City of Westbrook and formed a union for the purpose of employing a joint superintendent of schools who should devote his entire time to the interests of the schools of the two places.

After thoroughly canvassing the situation and an untiring investigation of the many candidates your committee elected Mr. Prescott Keyes, of Bangor, superintendent of schools, and Mr. Keyes' work has demonstrated beyond a doubt that we did not

err in judgment.

During the past year we have renovated the interior of the Babb school building, varnished and whitened the interior of the Elmwood school building, shingled a portion of the roof of the Frederick Robie school building, besides making minor repairs on nearly all of the school buildings. During the coming year other repairs will, of course, be necessary. The interior of the Frederick Robie building will require considerable attention and if possible its grounds should be put in better condition. The interior of the White Rock building should be thoroughly painted and tinted. The tin roof on the Levi Hall building should be removed and its roof should be newly shingled. The exterior of the High school building will require painting and minor improvements will be generally needed. As the Mosher school building has not been used for several years and as the prospects of its future use for school purposes are very minute your committee would recommend that the town dispose of both building and lot for its condition is such that immediate repairs will be necessary if it is retained.

The recommendation of your superintendent concerning the High school, as given in his report, is in our judgment, an absolute necessity for we all desire to put the school in such condition as to make it compare favorably with similar schools

throughout the state.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Gorham:-

The following report of the condition of the schools of your town, together with some recommendations concerning them, is

herewith presented for your consideration.

During the time that I have served as superintendent of the schools of Gorham, I have endeavored to make a careful study of each school, its equipment, the various conditions effecting it, to determine the character of the work done by the teacher and pupil, and the standard of work being maintained. To do this I have made several visits to each school, examined the text books now in use, observed the school in its daily work, and inspected all the buildings and apparatus.

The schools of Gorham, as a whole, are in very good condition. Some of them can well be called excellent, while others

are not so good. None can be classed as poor.

TEXT BOOKS.

The text books used, for the most part, are well selected and well adapted to the needs of the pupils. The books are up to date, and such as are being used in many of the best schools of New England. Some books are badly worn, and should soon be replaced by new ones.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

The school buildings are comfortable and quite convenient. I know of no case where the school room cannot be heated even on coldest days. Many of the rooms, especially in the rural sections, have been made attractive at some previous time by well selected pictures for wall adornment. Some of these rooms, too, have recently been improved by new paint and kalsomine. The rooms are clean and generally well kept, and most of them are a credit to the tax payers of the town.

DISCIPLINE.

I find that the discipline maintained is good and is of the right kind. Good discipline is an important factor in school work. It is an essential means to a desired end. No school can achieve satisfactory results where discipline is lax.

TEACHERS.

Nearly all of the teachers employed had had some experience in teaching before entering upon their duties this year. They are well qualified for their chosen profession, and have demonstrated by their work in the class room that they are worthy of their hire. A few teachers are beginners this year in the school room. They have been thus far quite successful, and some of them can already be classed with the best teachers employed by this town. It is impossible to have good schools without good teachers. The teacher, as a rule, makes the school what it is. In order to secure satisfactory teachers, it requires that good wages be paid them. Poor teachers are dear at any price.

ATTENDANCE.

There have been no epidemics to interfere with regular attendance, and the interest manifested in the work of these schools by most parents and pupils has been such as to give high averages of attendance at the close of each term. There are, however, some cases, I regret to report, and these cases are readily traced on the teacher's register, which plainly show that the proper interest in school and regular attendance has not been taken. Generally speaking, such pupils as I have referred to are those who need schooling most. One cannot well understand how parents can be so unmindful of their children's interests.

REPAIRS.

In the summer vacation several school buildings were repaired, and thereby made more attractive and comfortable. The Frederick Robie building was reshingled, the Babb school house supplied with new seats, and the interior and exterior put in good

condition. The Longfellow and Fort Hill school houses were repaired. Other buildings also received some attention. For the coming year there should be provision made for repairs on the High school building, and there should be new seats placed in the school room at Fort Hill. The room at West Gorham should be painted and whitened. There are several other buildings that will need some repairs.

THE HIGH SCHOOL.

Gorham High school has registered this year nearly one hundred pupils. It offers to its students three courses of study, viz., College Preparatory, Latin English, and English Scientific. To do the required work, there are three teachers employed. The school day is divided into seven periods for recitations. Each teacher conducts seven recitations daily; so there are in the school twenty-one recitations each day. From the time school opens in the morning till its close in the afternoon, each teacher is constantly conducting recitations. Some of the senior Latin is taken in the junior year, and some junior work is taken with the seniors. Such arrangement is necessary in order to have all the classes do the work in the four years of the school course, since there are not periods enough in the day to have all classes recite separately. What has been said of the arrangement for the junior and senior Latin is true of several other studies. teachers now have no opportunity whatever to offer assistance to those who may need help outside the classroom. If they find it necessary to assist a pupil, that pupil must remain after school has closed, as there are no spare periods during the day. I do not consider this crowded condition of school work satisfactory, and I recommend that another teacher be employed.

I will say of this school that I find it well disciplined, the pupils industrious and interested in their work, and the general character of the institution good. While the grade of this school is not quite high enough to be accepted on the approved list of preparatory schools by the colleges, this fact is certain, it is not far below their standard. I can see no reason why the Gorham

High school cannot become one of the best.

A committee, consisting of Messrs. Roscoe G. Harding, Lewis McLellan, Van W. Carll, Miss Mary L. McLellan, Mrs. Mary F. McQuillan and Mrs. Fannie O. Moulton, was chosen to solicit and install relics and similar articles in the old Baxter house.

The formal presentation to the Town of the new Library building, the former residence of Dr. Elihu Baxter, and the lot of land where those buildings stand, together with the books belonging to the Gorham Library Association, took place on the 23rd of September, 1908, the dedicatory exercises being held at the Congregational Church. Ex-Gov. Robie presided. How James P. Baxter formally presented the buildings and land to the Town, the speech of acceptance being made by Mr. William F. Pillsbury, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, and Prof. Henry L. Chapman of Bowdoin College gave an admirable address. A great many of our own residents and numerous friends from out of town attended these exercises, and afterwards availed themselves of the opportunity to inspect the newly presented buildings.

The Library was first opened for the circulation of books on September 26th, since which time it has been open for use regularly on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays from 2 o'clock till 5 in the afternoon, and from 7 o'clock till 8.30 in the evening.

The Trustees lost from their number Mr. Howard A. McKenney, who died on November 2d, 1908. His intelligent interest in all that related to the Library is fresh in the minds of his associates. The vacancy thus occasioned was filled by the choice of Mr. Edward W. Guptill as a Trustee, who also takes the place formerly held by Mr. McKenney on various committees.

We take this opportunity to thank all who have rendered assistance or in any way shown their friendliness in the work of establishing and supporting the Library. We acknowledge grate-

fully numerous gifts of books received during the past year. The few months during which the Library has been open are too short a time in which to form final conclusions regarding many matters which necessarily require attention. The Trustees are giving their best efforts to make the Library all that it should be to the Town, and ask for continued help and encouragement in those efforts.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

On September 26, 1908, the Baxter Memorial Library was opened to the public for the circulation of books. Between that date, and February 10, the library has been open sixty afternoons and evenings, with a total circulation of 6126 books and magazines. Of these, 4325 volumes were fiction, 1318 non-fiction, and 483 were magazines.

There are 602 registered borrowers. The accession books represent to date 5251 volumes, of which 5048 were given by the Gorham Library Association; 96 were gifts to the Baxter Memorial Library from other sources, and 107 volumes have been purchased for the new library. The donors of books are as

follows: Hon. James P. Baxter, Hon. Amos L. Allen, Hon. Eugene Hale, Hon. William P. Frye, Mrs. Kate Miles Smith, Misses E. B. and L. A. Emery, Miss Lucy D. Waterman, Mrs. Oscar R. Wish, Miss Margaret Smith, Miss Sara B. Webb, Mrs. W. H. Briant, Mrs. Mary E. Waterman, Mr. Arthur H. Harding, Mr. William E. Gould, an unknown friend, The Smithsonian Institution, Library of Congress, State of Maine, U. S. Government, and the Maine Historical Society, from which the library has lately received a valuable collection of Smithsonian documents—180 volumes, more or less. There are 1000 or more of State and U. S. Government books which are not yet entered on the accession book, and a large collection of miscellaneous pamphlets, nearly all of which came from the Gorham Library Association.

An Indian arrow-head, found on the shores of Sebago Lake, has been presented by Mr. Albert E. Harmon, and a bullet which was found by Mr. John L. Chase about one-half mile from the site of the old fort.
