TOWN WARRANT

ANDROSCOGGIN, SS. STATE OF MAINE.

To C. S. FOSS, a Constable of Town of Greene, in said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Greene qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on the 11th day of March, 1912, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will choose one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, current expenses and cost of poor, repair of road and bridges, and defray all other town charges for the ensuing year, including the snow bills for the past year.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to pay for High School tuition for ensuing year.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907 as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, also Chapter 21,

Public Laws of 1911, and Chapter 183, Public Laws of 1911, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1912.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$400, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, also Chapter 21, Public Laws of 1911, and Chapter 183, Public Laws of 1911.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to pay on the debt and interest for the ensuing year.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to repair the Wardwell barn and to make an appropriation to pay for the same.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise to clear the highway of bushes for the ensuing year.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for Memorial Day of the ensuing year.

ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the selectmen to establish a permanent water supply for the public tub at Greene Depot and to make an appropriation to pay for the same.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen, Clerk and Treasurer.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the voting list, at the Town House, a 9 o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting.

SCHOOLS

The same schools have been continued for the past year as were maintained during the previous one. The length of the spring term was eleven weeks, that of the fall and

winter twelve weeks each, giving us a school year of thirty-five weeks in all. The attendance with a few exceptions has been very good. Nearly all parents appreciate the advantages of a good education and have taken an interest in the schools and the work their children were doing.

The ladies of the W. C. T. U. started a movement for covered drinking fountains and individual cups furnishing one-half of the money to purchase the fountains. Each school now has a drinking fountain, and nearly all the pupils have their own cups. The cost of conveyance has not been large the past year and as a result of it we have been able to add three weeks to our school year.

The school books are in fair condition, a few kinds being badly worn.

Considerable work was done on the Mountain Schoolhouse. The Greene Corner schoolhouse has been put in excellent condition. The Patten schoolhouse needs painting also some work on the inside. New blackboards are needed in both the Patten and Lane schoolhouses. The stonework under nearly all of the houses needs repairing so they will be warmer in winter.

Last year we received the school fund of one hundred and twenty-five dollars, therefore it will be necessary to raise a larger sum for maintenance and support of schools. I recommend that the town raise the sum of \$500.00 for this purpose.

I recommend that the sum of \$100.00 be raised for school books and \$100.00 for supplies and repairs.

In conclusion I wish to thank the Superintending School Committee and the citizens of the town for the kindness shown to me and for their help in making this a pleasant and, I trust, a profitable year for the schools of the town.
