SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TOWN REPORT, GREENVILLE, ME.

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Greenville, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

High School

There have been three changes in our high school faculty since my last report, Mr. Robert M. Diehl succeeding Mr. Smith as principal, Miss Mansfield, Miss MacDonal as teacher of Latin and French and Mrs. Bement, Miss Thompson as head of the Commercial Department. Mr. Diehl has proved himself a strong, efficient principal in all respects, while the superior qualifications of Miss Mansfield and Mrs. Bement are well known to all. Miss Masterman who has rendered faithful, conscientious service as head of the English Department during the past year, being the only member of last year's faculty to return. Taking everything into consideration I feel that our present teaching force is one of the best it has been my privilege to work with. Every effort is being made to secure and maintain high standards of scholarship in all departments. We realize that our schools are maintained at a considerable expense to the taxpayers and desire to render the utmost service possible to the young people of our town. Any student who chooses his course wisely, and secures a rank of 85% or better will have no difficulty in gaining admission to college, or in carrying on college work successfully, as the records of many of our former students show. For a more detailed account of the work of the year I refer you to Mr. Diehl's report.

Grades

There have been four changes in our grade teachers during the past year as follows: Miss Jackson, Grade VII, Mrs. Dickinson, Grade IV, Miss Armstrong, Grade III, and Miss Harris, Grade II, Village Primary. All are Normal graduates, and all are working faithfully in the interests of their pupils. I feel however that we have a more difficult problem in the grades than in the high school. With efficient teachers there is no acceptable reason why we should not have as good a high school as one of equal size and similar equipment elsewhere, but in the grades we have some handicaps which not even skilled teaching can wholly overcome.

While the results are most apparent in the Grammar grades they are simply an accumulation of the same disadvantages from the start. First, the majority of children enter school too young. In an eight grade system six years is young enough for a child to enter school especially where the classes are large, and only a minimum of time is available for individual work. Consequently we are faced with the alternative of either overcrowding our lower grades to a point beyond which efficient work is impossible, or promoting some children who are either too immature, or have not made sufficient progress to enable them to carry on the work of the next grade advantageously. A kindergarten or sub-primary room for beginners, or a ninth grade in which a thorough review of the work of previous years could be given would be one solution, except that it would be quite expensive, and I am still of the opinion that the work of the elementary school can be done in eight years provided that the pupils are old enough to carry on first grade work successfully at the time of entering. Another handicap is the fact that many of our grades are too large for best results. Educational experts have said that 25 to 30 pupils are as many as should be in charge of a teacher, and that when this number is exceeded there is a proportionate falling off in efficiency. Inasmuch as several of our grades number from forty to forty-five pupils it is easy to see that our teachers do not have as much time for individual work with the slower pupils as is desirable. Under present conditions it is not easy to suggest the best remedy. I can only assure you that both teachers and school officials will do all within their power to render the work of the schools as effective as possible.

Music

Mrs. Anna Dymond, who was elected Supervisor of Music for the school year 1929-30 was forced to resign at the close of the winter term on account of illness, consequently but little was done in Music during the spring term. Although Mrs. Dymond worked faithfully I am convinced that a full time Music Supervisor is impractical in Greenville, as it requires only about two and one half days to visit our schools, allowing half an hour to each grade once a week. As we are too

far from other towns to make some joint arrangement possible it seemed best to employ a Music Supervisor on the basis of actual service. Mrs. W. G. Squiers was elected to this position and has done excellent work, although her duties were unfortunately interrupted for a time by illness.

Text-books and Equipment

Our expenses for these purposes seem large in the aggregate, but considered on a per capita basis are not excessive. It is not only necessary to replace worn out equipment, but is equally important that it be kept up to date, obsolete texts and antiquated methods have no place in modern education. Our greatest expense is for teaching service, it is therefore important that we provide our teachers with everything that will assist in making their work of greater value. At present our greatest need is additional reference books, especially in the high school, consequently it will be advisable to apportion a reasonable sum from our appropriation to this purpose.

Repairs

During the past year considerable repair work has been done. The desks in the high school and several grade rooms have been repaired, refinished and varnished, a large case for reference books has been built, also many general repairs made. As to equipment, an improved system of lighting has been installed throughout the high school building, new desks and typewriter tables have been installed in the Commercial room, and new recitation seats in the English room, while all worn window shades have been replaced.

For next year the toilet facilities in the girls basement should be increased, and if we are to continue the use of the third floor indefinitely some provision for more heat should be made. If space and funds were available, a special room for retarded pupils under a teacher skilled in working with pupils of this type would afford at least a partial solution of some of our present problems in keeping pupils up to grade.

In closing I desire to express my appreciation of the helpful co-operation I have constantly received from all interested in the welfare of the schools.

HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

The following report is respectfully submitted to the Citizens of Greenville.

Greenville High School opened on September 2, 1930 with an enrollment of one hundred students. The roll call by classes found the Seniors numbering 23, the Juniors 22, the Sophomores 29, and the Freshmen 26. The faculty included five teachers; namely—Miss Masterman, English Instructor; Miss Hennessey, History Instructor; Mrs. Bement, Commercial Instructor, and Robert Diehl, Principal and Instructor in Mathematics, Science and Athletics.

The first term of five weeks duration, established firmly the Principles of co-operation between students and faculty. Effort was greatly centered on contributing to, or developing qualities that trained for citizenship as well as to advance Intellectualism.

As a feature that conspicuously portrays an influence in public schools today, an honor system of scholastic ability was inaugurated at the end of the first term with a total of ten names thereon. The number of students qualifying for the Honor Roll increased to seventeen by the end of the second term; to twenty by the end of the third term, and to twenty-five by the end of the fourth term. The qualifications for honors necessitates that the student maintain for the ensuing term, a general average of at least 85, and in every subject a rank of at least 80. There is no doubt that competition is effective here, reinforcing the training, and necessarily a part of the "lesson."

The attendance has been decidedly good. We can trace this fact, by careful observation, to be so, on account of three reasons—a very healthful locality; a group of students appreciative and thoughtful; and a strong co-operation on the part of the parents.

In our athletics thus far this season, we have witnessed contests on the football field, and a successful season was played. Six games were engaged in, and only one defeat was chalked down against our boys, although we started with a team composed practically of green material.

The value that athletics play in the educational scheme of our school or any school should be kept be-

fore the public mind. The great character developing qualities of our sports make them tremendously worth while. One thing stressed to our athletes out on the football field last fall was fair play; to play the game hard and clean, to be uncomplaining in defeat and to be sportsmanlike in their methods at all times.

No attempt was made to develop a basketball team this year owing to the high cost of financing the sport.

This winter, boxing began as an exercise but fairly blossomed into a sport. The squad was somewhat unpromising at first. However, the boys, that turned out, worked hard, and were completely won over to the sport. There was this regrettable fact, that the season had to be shortened on account of lack of training quarters.

The dramatic talent of the school came before the public early in December when two one-act plays were presented on behalf of the Commercial Department. Later in February, the Minstrel Show was presented for the benefit of the baseball team. Both of these entertainments were successful from a dramatic, and from a financial standpoint.

This report would be incomplete without a special word of appreciation for the valuable help rendered to the High School by the citizens of Greenville, and to the splendid co-operation on the part of parents and teachers.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

To the Citizens of Greenville, Maine

It gives us pleasure to submit this record of public health nursing activities in your town for the period Jan. 1, 1930 to Jan. 1, 1931.

The work has apparently received the whole-hearted cooperation of the community and while public health nursing has an obscure beginning and an indefinite ending, one may feel that considerable has been accomplished during the year especially in the way of school health and cleanliness. There seems to have been a marked improvement in general habits of cleanliness

and healthful living among the younger generation. This is in a large measure due to the careful checking of health habits of the children in the school room and cooperation of parents in the home. The amount of dental work done is quite remarkable altho' there still remains much to be done in the way of dental corrections. There is an apparent decrease in the number of infectious skin diseases among the school children and an appreciable decrease in the number of cases of pediculosis.

During the month of April individual inspections were made of all the grade children. This inspection included the examinations by the school physicians, statistics being received from the doctors. At the end of the school year a goodly number of pupils qualified for six or seven point certificates and pins.

Early in September, the nurse assisted Dr. Pritham in his examinations of all pupils in Grade I and II of the Junction, Grades VII, VIII and High School. Since September all the pupils of the other grades have been weighed and measured and bi-monthly or weekly check-up class room inspections made for skin disease and pediculosis with notices to parents urging them to take the child to their family physician for treatment, home visits, etc. With each inspection the number of cases is less and always there is evidence of treatment. The following statistics may be of interest and serve to show that the nurse has been busy during her time in your town.

Three baby and preschool conferences for mothers have been held with Miss Ricker of the Maine Baby Saving Society. Miss Ricker has also held some clinics at which the public health nurse was not in attendance. The records of this office show 6 preschools attending and seven babies at those conferences at which the county nurse was in attendance.

SHAW LIBRARY

To the Citizens of the Town of Greenville:

The Trustees of Shaw Library submit the following report for the year ending Feb. 22, 1931.

The work of the library has been carried on along the same lines as last year, but owing to the increase of work during the winter months we found it necessary to continue our Tuesday afternoon service into

the evening until spring. This arrangement has evenly distributed the work of supplying the demands of our patrons and has enabled us to give more time to the students for reference work. The circulation figures are, of course, the approved way of judging library success but we should not forget that much of the reference work done does not show in the circulation figures at all and yet it is a very important part of library work and requires much time, attention and service of the librarians.

From our paid shelf 42 books have been taken and put in general circulation. This represents an increase in volumes on the fiction shelf with no expenditure from other funds.

To Frank J. Smith, a constable in the Town of Greenville, in said County,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Greenville, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at Shaw Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the Sixteenth day of March, 1931, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers
- Art. 4. To choose one or more members of the Municipal Board of Mothers' Aid for a three year term.
- Art. 5. To choose Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of the Poor.
- Art. 6. To choose a Town Treasurer.
- Art. 7. To choose one or more members of the School Committee.
- Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector, vote his compensation and determine at what time he shall make his final settlement with the Town.
- Art. 9. To choose one or more Fire Wards.
- Art. 10. To choose one or more Trustees of the Board of Trustees of the Shaw Public Library for a term of five years.
- Art. 11. To choose an auditor of accounts, a Road Commissioner, Three members of the Hiram Hunt School League, a Budget Committee and all other necessary and usual Town Officers, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint them.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to allow a certain percent of discount on all taxes paid in full to the Collector on or before certain periods for Taxes assessed for the current year, or to charge interest on same after certain periods.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen and Treasurer to make temporary loans to pay current expenses of the Town until sufficient taxes are collected and paid in.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for elementary schools, including teachers wages, janitor services, conveyance, fuel, tuition and board of pupils.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the purchase of text and reference books for the schools.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the purchase of supplies for the schools.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the support of free high school.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the insurance and repairs of school buildings.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the Superintendent of Schools, for his salary.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for a School Physician, for his salary.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the services of a Public Health Nurse.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for Mothers' Aid.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for Town Improvement, and any action the Town may take thereon.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the maintenance of highways, bridges and culverts.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the maintenance of Winter Roads for automobile travel.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the building and repair of sidewalks.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the maintenance of a road patrol.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 29. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of the State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges, under the provisions of section 184, Chapter 25, R. S. amended by Chapter 258, P. L. 1917.

Art. 30 To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the maintenance of the improved sections of third class road.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the cutting and removing of bushes on the State Highway, State Aid Highways and 3rd Class roads.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the present or an additional number of street lights.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for Hydrant rental for fire protection.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise to pay the fire companies.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for fire department purposes.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the Hiram Hunt School League.

Art. 37. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the support of Town Poor.

Art. 38. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the payment of miscellaneous and incidental charges.

Art. 39. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the support of the Shaw Public Library.

Art. 40. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for Memorial services and how the same shall be expended.

Art. 41. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 42. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the support of the Charles A. Dean Hospital for current expenses.

Art. 43. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise to pay the outstanding notes, bonds and interest that will become due prior to the next annual meeting.

Art. 44. To see what action the Town will take regarding the following bequests made by the late Charles D. Shaw by virtue of items 19, 21 and 27 of his Will:—

“Nineteenth I give and bequeath to the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.), the principal to be held in trust and the net annual income thereof to be used annually by the school authorities of said Town for defraying or assisting to defray the necessary expenses of the class graduating exercises of the Greenville High School.

“Twenty-first I give and bequeath to the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.), to be known as the Shaw Playground Fund, the income only to be used annually by the superintending School Committee of said Town for the maintenance and upkeep of the Playground on Prospect street and adjacent to Primary School in said Town.

“Twenty-seventh I give and bequeath to the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville, Maine, the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) to be added to the M. G. Shaw Fund in the said Greenville, the principal and income to be administered in accordance with the provisions of the original bequest of the late Milton G. Shaw.”

Art. 45. To see what action the Town will take regarding offer of the Heirs of the Estate of the late Charles D. Shaw regarding the Grist Mill Lot located on the West Side of West Street in Greenville Village.

Art. 46. To see what action the Town will take regarding the erection of a Fish Screen for Wilson Pond Dam and to raise money for the same.

Art. 47. To see what action the Town will take regarding a 4th of July celebration and to raise money for the same.

Art. 48. To transact any other business that may properly come before this meeting, and to raise any other sums of money for Town purposes that may be proper and necessary.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising, and correcting the list of voters at Shaw Hall in said town, at NINE o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting.
