WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING, MARCH 22, 1892

To S. H. Stevens, constable of the town of Guilford, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Guilford qualified to vote in town affairs to assemble at the Guilford hall, in the village of Guilford on Monday, the twenty-second day of March, A. D. 1897, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1.—To choose a moderator to

preside at said meeting.

Art. 2.—To choose a town clerk.

Art. 3.—To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.

Art. 4.—To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.

Art. 5.—To choose a town treasurer. Art. 6.—To choose a superintending.

school committee.

Art. 7.—To see if the town will authorize the school committee to elect a superintendent.

Art. 8.—To choose one or more road

commissioners.

Art. 9.—To choose a town agent.
Art. 10—To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes paid before certain date or dates, said date or dates and discount to be fixed at said meeting; or whether they will vote to add a penalty or interest to be fixed at said meeting to taxes not paid before certain date or dates.

Art. 11—To choose a collector of taxes and see what method the town will adopt for collecting taxes.

Art. 12.—To choose one or more

auditors of accounts.

Art. 13.—To choose one or more constables.

Art. 14.—To choose truant officers

for the ensuing year.

Art. 15.—To choose surveyors of wood and bark and lumber and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 16.—To see what sum the town will vote to pay the supervisor of schools for each day of actual service or

to pay a stated salary.

Art. 17.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the sup-

port of schools.

Art. 18.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair schoolhouses and for insurance on the same.

Art. 19—To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of Free High school at the village:

Art. 20.—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of

poor and other town charges.

Art. 21.—To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay outstanding interest bearing debts and interest on the same.

Art. 22.—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of roads and bridges and how the same

shall be expended.

Art. 23.—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of electric lights for the bridge at the village.

Art. 24.—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purchasing

of school books.

Art. 25.—To see if the town will vote to raise twenty-five dollars to help pay the expenses of Memorial day and pay the same to John H. Morgan Post.

Art. 26.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of water pipe and to lay the same for the better protection of property from fire in Guilford village. Also for the purchase of pails for fire purposes and authorize the selectmen to expend the same.

Art. 27.—To see if the town will vote to have printed town reports for next annual town meeting and pay for the

same.

Art. 28.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the support of the Kindergarten school.

Art. 29.—To see if the town will vote to raise money for the purpose of grading the school lot in the Lows Bridge district, so-called, and how the same shall be expended.

Art. 30.—To see if the town will vote to buy a farm for a town farm and how the same shall be bought; also to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire money to pay for the same.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters at Guilford Hall association at (9) nine o'clock a. m., on the day of said meeting.

There has been the past school-year the usual length of school throughout the town, at expenditures along the same lines as in former years, without increase, except as has arisen through pressing demands.

In the matter of repairs the rural school-houses have been kept in good condition, interior and exterior. The houses at the Centre and at Low's Bridge have been painted. One of the chimneys in the new building at the village, when built, through some defect has caused much trouble in smoking, and having little if any draft. We have, at some expense, topped the same out to a height where much better results are had, at a great saving in fuel used.

The pupils of the village have by earnest and untiring work, supplemented by the teachers, succeeded in raising funds sufficient to purchase a fine bell, through entertainments, and some small subscriptions, which we have had set in position, adding much to the appearance and use of the building. Much praise is to be given the pupils and their teachers in their untiring efforts in this matter.

To them is also due much commendation in the furnishing of the several rooms by pictures, prints, cases, collections, that make the rooms much tastier, while adding greatly to the benefits of the work done therein. To accommodate some collections in botany, nature studies, and kindred subjects we have made some small cabinets at a small expense.

In purchase of school supplies being able to buy crayon and ink in

quantities at a large discount, we have purchased in this way, at a material saving to the town, and have a quantity now on hand.

The rapid increase in the pupils necessitated the maintenance of another grade at the beginning of the spring term, and a consequent rateing of the grade of study, as to at present embrace six distinct grades: High, 1st and 2d Grammar, Intermediate, and 1st and 2d Frimary. This will necessitate an increase in the appropriation which we recommend. We have furnished the new school with odds and ends of desks as we had, in the old High School room, and hope to be able to secure some appropriation to renovate and repair both rooms now used by these Primaries. These rooms (in the Hall building) are sadly in want of some repairs and improvements, to make them tasty and comfortable, and we respectfully refer their needs to your consideration.

The usual amount of insurance is necessary to protect the school property, and a sufficient appropriation should be made for such purpose.

The buildings at the village should be painted the ensuing season in good economy, and such should be voted by our citizens.

Small sums have been paid as in past years to carry scholars from localities where it would be foolish, from lack of scholars, to maintain schools, to the nearest adjoining schools.

The expenditure of the money, raised in the last annual meeting, on the lot at Low's Bridge while well expended, is in our estimation insufficient, and we recommend some further action to be taken in regard to further improving the lot.

The text-books have been furnished in conformity with the law.

Extreme care has been exercised in regard to infectious disease, and anything like an appearance of such among any of the pupils has been guarded, and isolated, with the aid from the Board of Health.

The year, we feel, has been one of prosperity to the town and citizens, in school matters, and proper support, has encouraged the best effort on part of the pupil and his teachers.

We recommend the following appropriations for the coming year:

Report of Superintendent.

It is my privilege to testify upon the excellent work of our teachers the past year, as in former years, in the different schools, and one who will observe through his own efforts the work being done, can but be somewhat surprised at the advancement made.

Crowding of certain grades has to some degree impaired the work, but rather than allow the work to be neglected our teachers have given extra time, and extra effort to prevent loss in the work.

I can say, and say truthfully, that no class of laboring people in our town put in more hours, nor exhibit more interest, than our teachers. The hours between 9 A. M. and 4 P. M. are but portions of the actual employment they maintain. Each one has the welfare of every pupil thoroughly at heart, in mental, moral and physical standpoint, and in no way is any example taught or shown that is not fully adapted to the needs of a coming woman and a coming citizen, as now represented in our boys and girls.

And if any one of our citizens wish to criticise our work, let him first acquaint himself with what is being done, and then he will be in a position to offer suggestions that may be accepted.

None are more willing to accept suggestions as to work, and promotion of a child's welfare than our several teachers and myself, but criticisms and fault-findings that emanate and come from those who never visit a school room, and judge only of the teacher's work through some neighbor's hearsay, are no more worthy of attention, nor have more weight, than that the teacher should return the subject by criticising your occupation, and advise your daily work.

Don't throw stones unless you are prepared to give proper reasons. Everyone is welcome to any of our school-rooms, where the work will be shown you in every detail, and your suggestions, then made will be worth something, but do not feel that you can assume to be judge until you have heard the case presented by fairness on both sides.

The crowded condition of the lower school necessitated the opening of another primary at the beginning of the present spring term.

This affords better classification of the work, and a better grade than we have had before. All the grades as present maintained are well filled with pupils, and excellent work is done.

Most of the teachers employed in our village formerly have been retained the past year.

Miss Michaels, assistant, after a very successful term resigned at the end of the Spring term. She was succeeded by Miss Sanger, who has done most excellent work in her lines, and has proved very successful in the management of pupils and assistance in maintaining better grades of work.

Miss Ross was employed to succeed Miss Butterfield in the 2nd Primary at the end of the Spring term, and has been very successful.

Miss Lilla has been employed in the new Primary grade this present term. From her former work with us I expect the best work will result.

In the rural schools Miss Pearson and Mrs. Sears taught at North Guilford with good results. I had some causes for complaint on account of some children failing to attend as they should, without proper cause. If you wish your child to acquire anything from the schools do not keep him at home and then blame the teacher and the Superintendent for the child's backwardness. Miss Ora Manter taught for the year at the Centre with the most flattering success. Excellent attendance and marked improvement were prominent features of her work.

At Low's Bridge Miss Cleaves and Miss Jackson taught with what ought to have been good success in most country schools, and was indeed satisfactory to me, but inasmuch as no teacher in that school ever did satisfy everyone there, it is safe to presume that the one who can satisfy all is as yet unborn.

The school in the Brown neighborhood under Miss Colson, Mrs. Sears and Mr. Hart were each very good.

A school was maintained in the Grover neighborhood in the Spring and discontinued in the Fall. As a whole the work has been very good in every locality. Some dissatisfaction was found with me because I did not engage some teachers recommended by some citizens, but in every case I endeavor to employ those teachers whom I know to be qualified for their work, and to get the value of the money expended.

I have introduced drawing in the lower grades, with intention to continue through all grades as found practicable. Vertical writing has been taught in some of the lower grades also, as an experiment, with good results also. Probably this system will supplant the old system in all schools, eventually, as it is found successful wherever introduced.

Five pupils were graduated from the High School at the close of the Spring term, with commendable merit as to work done. Much interest was manifested in the exercise then by our people, and I can but think the exhibit of those two evenings were a grand tribute to the faithfulness of your teachers for their work, and marking another milestone in the educational progress of our town. Another class graduates the present term, with as good preparation.

As a test of the result of the advance in our schools, and the ambitions springing therefrom I will instance that when I was in College there was but three from the town attending schools away from home. At the present time Guilford has 16 young men and young women studying some specialties and general college work away.

By their fruits should you judge your schools!

The increase in the pupils as to number increases the needs of the schools, and hence our appropriations must be somewhat larger.

Money thus applied is not lost, is not buried in the earth; rather does it increase in profusion in its benefits to not alone your own town and families, but to the welfare of a common humanity, and daily do we see exemplified the truth that the fruits of education "shake like Lebanon." If economy is talked in town affairs, do not, as you value a progressive manhood and civilization, purchase it at the price of a starved intellect, a dwarfed manhood, and a shrunken soul.

Look about you, look within yourself, and if you see and realize the lack of what our common schools now are giving, seek not to deprive the child of today of that which you regret, but offer him the means whereby he may be an improvement to society, and if he then neglects the opportunities, you have the satisfaction that you have performed the part that true charity asks, and withheld not the gift that might have brought a realization of the noblest work of God—a Man.

Our report is not much different from last year. Only two cases of contagious diseases have been reported for the last year, as follows: Two cases of measles, and both patients recovered. Four nuisances have been reported and removed, as required by law. The board will offer free vaccination in May of which due notice will be given, and we respectfully ask all parents to have their children vaccinated before they go out into the world. We find the most trouble with sink drains and water closets, and we urge better care taken of same before complaint is made.
