Report of Superintendent of Schools.

TO THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF GUILFORD;
GENTLEMEN:

In accordance with the usual custom, I have the honor to submit herewith my third annual report of the progress and condition of your schools for the year just closing. In many respects this has been a year of unusual changes and yet the work of the schools has progressed well and good results have been the outcome of hard work on the part of both teachers and pupils.

CHANGES IN TEACHERS.

During the vacation between the winter and spring terms, 1904, we received the resignation of Miss Rebecca Moore. After four weeks of the spring term Prin. E. L. Palmer was elected Supt. of Schools in Dexter and Sangerville and we were called upon to accept the resignation of a teacher who, in a short time, had made an excellent record as principal of the High School.

Mr. E. A. Case, a senior in Bates College, substituted in Mr. Palmer's place for the remainder of the spring term and all things considered did very good work.

Miss Aurella M. Wheeler, another senior from Bates, substituted as assistant in the High School for six weeks and Miss Sadie Brown of Bangor finished the term. Both these teachers did excellent work, but the salary paid was not sufficient to retain either for the fall term.

At the close of the spring term came two more resignations, that of Miss Bearce, who soon became Mrs. Hamilton, and also that of Miss Lowell, who was already Mrs. Stewart. These teachers, especially Miss Bearce, had served in the schools of Guilford long enough to demonstrate what I need not record here.

During the summer the following teachers were elected to fill the several vacancies: Mr. R. H. Stewart of Norway, Me., Bates, 1901, principal of the High School, Miss Edna M. North of Turner, Me., Bates, 1905, assistant in the High School, Miss Isa Jackson of Sangerville to Mrs. Stewart's place and Bertha Small to the place made vacant by Miss Bearce's resignation.

Miss Weaver was retained in the grammar school, and the primary teachers all returned.

The present corps of teachers in the large building has succeeded in bringing about a decided change in the discipline of the school in and around the building. This reform was begun last year when Mr. Palmer was in charge, but the changes in the spring term retarded the improvement somewhat. In the fall all joined their efforts to improve the situation and the results have been very pleasing and satisfactory.

The children take a great deal of pride in doing all they can to please the teachers and are gentlemanly and ladylike in their conduct in school and out. This condition of things almost invariably insures good work in all other ways.

In the primary schools the same good feeling and good work so manifest in the past have been even more in evidence during the year just closing.

GRADE OF THE SCHOOLS.

I wish to note some of the definite results that have followed the regrading of the schools and the addition of a teacher in the primary grades.

In the first grade under Miss Pearson, the children will have read during this year five primers and done more other work than it was ever possible to do when one teacher had two grades and from fifty to sixty children. These results have been obtained in spite of the fact that the attendance has not averaged over two-third of the number registered for the entire year. The school has been continually hindered by one disease or another.

In Miss Smith's room, the second grade will have read eight or ten books at the close of the present year and the other work is being done better than ever before. The third grade in Miss Ross' room are now doing what the fourth grade did two years ago and are doing it easier and better.

The work these primary children are doing and the way they are doing it is laying a foundation that will make all later work easy and at the same time vastly more valuable to them.

We have also been able to reduce the number of grades below the high school from ten to nine, the standard throughout the State, and add to the ninth year work algebra and an elementary work on English history. This brings the high and grammar schools nearer together and bridges the gap that has too long existed between them.

The experiment made during a part of the winter term by placing an extra teacher between the high and grammar schools proved beyond a doubt that, at least while there are nearly fifty pupils in the grammar school, such a teacher is necessary to do justice by all. Individual help is what many pupils need to keep them along with their classes, but this help cannot be given by the teacher who has two grades and nearly fifty pupils. For the coming year, at least, your superintendent would earnestly recommend this extra teacher. The classes coming along through the grades are not as large as those now in the grammar school and this arrangement may not be needed more than a year, or two at the most.

The advantage this teacher would be to the high school is none the less apparent. Fifty to sixty pupils pursuing three courses of study make too much work for two teachers, if they are to carry on any of the many general exercises that should be found in every modern high school. The tuition received in the high school and the grades will nearly cover the salary of this extra teacher for the year.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

I wish to repeat in this report exactly what was given in the report last year on rural schools. Following is an extract from last year's report:

"To those who are to any extent acquainted with the rural schools of our town, county and state, and are at all interested in

their future usefulness, they present some problems that deserve careful consideration.

"Too long have many people thought that small schools and schools of small children could be taught by most anyone who knew the books found in the school to be taught. Happily for the children and the future of the rural communities, this mistaken idea is fast disappearing, and people are coming more and more to believe that teaching is vastly more than simply transferring from books to the heads of children a mass of isolated facts and requiring them to learn a thousand things which to them are mere meaningless jumbles of words. It is also encouraging to note that many people are beginning to believe that the teacher of no more than a dozen children even, should be a teacher in every sense of the word and should receive a salary sufficient to enable her to keep abreast of the best thought of the educational world and be a source of inspiration to the children and a help to the community in which she works. The teacher of a rural school should not only be qualified to teach any village school but she should have certain qualifications not needed in the village school. If the boys and girls of the rural communities in this town are to engage in agriculture, dairying, fruit growing or any other rural pursuit, they need some training that will tend to awaken an interest in, and fit them for such pursuits. It is very generally conceded that the schools of the past have had not a little to do with the increasing number of abandoned farms and closed rural homes. The teachers have not been wholly to blame for this condition of things. They have done what they were required to do and in most cases more than they were paid to do. The teachers employed during the past year as a rule have been faithful, conscientious and painstaking in all their work, but how can we expect them to train themselves, buy professional books and attend the various educational meetings when they receive less than \$200.00 a year for their services? Is it any wonder that the best are looking for positions elsewhere? Our rural schools need teachers trained to meet their peculiar needs and whose work is teaching as a chosen profession."

The teachers in the rural schools have been as follows for the past year:

Grover: Mary McPheters, spring term; Evelyn Gammon, fall and winter terms.

North Guilford: Ora Bates, spring term; Agnes Cousens, fall and winter terms.

Center school: Lucy J. Berry for entire year.

Brown school: Evelyn Gammon, spring term; Mildred French, fall and winter terms.

Low's Bridge: Louise Ross, Corinna, spring term; Evelyn Oakes, fall and winter terms. (This school has had an average of less than 8 for the past year and is therefore suspended by law.)

One of the greatest drawbacks to the rural schools is the irregular attendance. It is impossible to keep the classes along with a course of study or to do anything at grading when a few children are allowed to be absent for trivial reasons and continue that absence for a day or two at a time throughout the entire year. Such irregular attendance works great injustice to the children who are always found in their places, and is extremely discouraging to the teachers who have any ambition whatever to see the work of their schools maintain a good standard.

This irregular attendance, I am glad to say, is confined to a few children and if their parents could realize a little more fully the value of an education, it would be a great advantage to the children and not a little help to the school.

BOOKS AND APPLIANCES.

There have been no changes in text books during the past year. Quite an amount of supplementary reading has been added and the regular supply of books has been increased to meet the needs of the schools.

I wish to commend the teachers for their pains with and the children for their careful use of all books placed in their hands.

More supplementary books will be needed next year also some new texts in the high school and in the subject of physiology in the grades. This latter branch should be added to two more grades for at least one-third of the year.

The usual appliances have been furnished during the past year. These have been the things used in all the best schools and only what is absolutely necessary to get the best results.

There are nearly enough supplies on hand for the spring term and what we have will partly off-set the overdraft on this fund.

MUSIC.

Music in the schools is no experiment. Miss Blanchard's work, seconded by the conscientious work of the teachers, has produced excellent results. Two visits were made by Miss Blanchard to the rural schools in the fall and this plan can be carried on again in the spring term. The rural teachers have met for instruction in music and considering the disadvantages have made good advancement in this branch.

IN CONCLUSION.

In closing this report I wish to thank the children in the Guilford schools for the kind, respectful and appreciative attitude they have always maintained towards the teachers and superintendent. I also wish to express here my grateful appreciation for the hearty co-operation given me by all teachers during the past year, for the advice and support of the school committee and for the encouragement of the citizens of Guilford who so liberally support their public schools.

Guilford Free Public Library.

The second annual report of the Trustees of the Guilford Free Public Library is herewith submitted for the year ending March 1st, 1905.

At the close of the second year, we are pleased to report the library in a prosperous condition. During the year there have been added 226 volumes, many of which have been given, making a total of more than 1900 volumes.

We were somewhat late in furnishing the catalogues, but they were ready for use during the fall and we hope they are appreciated. We could not make them wholly free, but sold them for less than half the cost, as we were anxious that every family interested in the library should possess one. In a few cases we received the whole cost of a catalogue for which we are very grateful. As time passes more interest is shown in the reading room, and it is much used by old and young. The tables are well filled with many of the best magazines published.

The books of reference are used more than ever before, and their value is especially appreciated by the pupils of the High school, as they learn to use them to advantage in their work.

The following is quoted from the Librarian's report:

This shows the library to be well patronized by the people in town, but we want every family in Guilford, whether residing in the village or outside of its limits to feel that the library is a free institution. We gladly accept any publication of value which may be donated, and while our expenses for the coming year will necessarily be greater than for the past year, for the reason that many books which have been handled and read for two years, must either be rebound or replaced, we ask of the town only the same appropriation which they

generously allowed us last year, that being \$300.00 and the use of the rooms which we now occupy.

TO WM. G. THOMPSON, CONSTABLE OF THE TOWN OF
GUILFORD, PISCATAQUIS COUNTY:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Guilford qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Guilford Hall, in the village of Guilford, on Monday the twentieth day of March, A. D., 1905, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk.
- Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.
- Art. 4. To choose three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.
- Art. 5. To choose a Town Treasurer.
- Art. 6. To choose a member of the S. S. Committee.
- Art. 7. To choose a Superintendent of Schools or to see if the town will vote to authorize the S. S. Committee to elect a Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 8. To choose a Road Commissioner.
- Art. 9. To choose a Town Agent.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote that all taxes shall be collected and paid to the Treasurer in the following manner: One-third on or before July 1st., 1905; one-third on or before Nov. 1st, 1905; and the remaining one-third on or before March 1st, 1906.
- Art. 11. To choose a Collector of Taxes and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.

- Art. 12. To choose one or more Auditors of accounts.
- Art. 13. To choose one or more Constables.
- Art. 14. To choose Truant Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To choose Surveyors of wood, bark and lumber, and all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to unite with the other towns to employ a Superintendent of Schools in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 296 of the Public Laws for the year 1897.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the Supt. of Schools for each day of actual service or pay a stated salary.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs and insurance on School houses.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for a Free High School at the Village.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for purchase of school books.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for supplies and appliances.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor and other town charges.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding debts and interest on the same.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of roads and bridges, and how the same shall be expended.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to comply with the requirements of State law in regard to State roads.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fire purposes and electric lights.

- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to pay members of fire company the amount of their poll tax for serving in the fire company for the ensuing year.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of water pipe and lay the same for fire purposes in Guilford Village and how the same shall be expended.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to pay the school board for their services.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Guilford Free Public Library.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease a part of the town office for the use of the Public Library.
- Art. 33. To choose one or more trustees for the Public Library.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the S. S. Committee to introduce music into the public schools and raise money to pay the same.
- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and town agent to prosecute all persons in town who violate the prohibitory law during the municipal year A. D. 1905, and to see how much money shall be raised to pay for same.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise twenty-five dollars to help pay the expenses of Memorial Day and pay the same to C. N. Rand chairman of committee of arrangements.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.
- Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended in the burying grounds in the town of Guilford.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to run a school at Lows Bridge the ensuing year, if in their judgment they deem it best.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to abate the tax of E. T. Pond for the year 1904, on account his loss by fire.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters at Guilford Association Hall at 9 o'clock on the day of said meeting.
