## Report of the Superintending School Committee.

To the Citizens of Guilford:

Your committee organized at the beginning of the year with R. C. Tobey as chairman. Early in the fall Mr. Tobey resigned from the committee and J. H. Hudson was appointed chairman. Frank Pease was elected by the committee as Mr. Tobey's successor for the remainder of the year.

Meetings have been held at the oall of the chairman or secretary at which the routine work has been attended to and such other matters as have been referred to the committee. The repairs for this year have been almost entirely upon the rural schoolhouses. A new shed was built at the Brown schoolhouse at an expense of about \$159, and the Grover schoolhouse was plastered at an expense of about \$30.

Some slight repairs were also made on the floor timbers at the Low's Bridge schoolhouse.

These repairs with such incidentals as have been necessary on the other buildings and the renewals of insurance expiring during the past year have more than used up the appropriation in this department. We believe that the coming year will demand considerable repair on our village buildings. First of all the water supply for the basement of the High school building is entirely unsatisfactory. We believe also that the present toilet arrangements are entirely unsanitary, and that the time has come when we must make improvements on them.

The windmill which furnishes the water for the building is badly worn and at any time is likely to go out of service. During the past year several duplicate parts have been kept on hand to provide against any emergency. If the same system of furnishing water is retained, a new windmill is absolutely necessary. This method of supply is so irregular that after considerable investigation we believe an engine should be installed for pumping. There are very many days when no water is pumped because there is no wind to pump. At such a time the reserve supply in one tank is soon used and then the basements are practically without water. It is conservative to say that two thirds of the time the odor in the basements is almost unbearable and much of the time this odor pervades the corridors and school rooms so that it is exceedingly disagreeable to both teachers and pupils. We would not tolerate such a condition in our homes for a day and we believe the time has come to make such changes at the High school building as will remedy these existing unhealthful conditions there.

First of all new and modern plumbing should be installed. This would mean a slate urinal with perforated supply pipe to provide for the constant rinsing of the slate. Slate is absolutely non corrosive and with proper care by the janitor can be kept perfectly odorless and sanitary as long as the building stands. New closets should replace the old ones in both basements. They should be automatically flushed and supplied with separate tanks.

The plumbing would cost altogether about \$300. A new windmill or hot air engine—either would cost about \$150. The advantage of the engine is that our water supply would be constant every day. If we continue to use the windmill a much larger storage tank must be provided.

Provisions should be made for a recitation room adjoining the laboratory for the use of the 2nd assistant of the High school. To finish this room will cost about \$80. The desks throughout all the rooms should be now thoroughly repaired to preserve their life. As is well known, as soon as the varnish and filler wears off from the desk the joints quickly open up and the desk goes to pieces rapidly. The desks should be scraped, refilled and varnished for the sake of economy, at once.

This will cost about 30 cents per desk and will make them practically as good as new.

And while we are enumerating repairs we cannot overlook the fact that fifteen years of wear has made the soft wood floors in our buildings very rough and unsightly. They are splintering badly and in some places nearly worn through. The town must soon make provisions for replacing these with hardwood floors and some should be replaced the coming summer. During the past year we have been obliged to use an oil spray on these old floors to keep down the dust and help preserve them and they will be a constant bill of expense until replaced.

We recommend the following appropriations for school purposes.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

To the Superintending School Committee of Guilford:

Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit to you my second annual report of the condition and progress of our schools for the year closing March 1, 1907.

I first desire to call your attention to the closing of the Municipal year on March 1, instead of March 10, as heretofore. This does not allow the last two weeks of the present term to appear either in our record of expenditures or the tabular report at the end of this report.

Our school year is as usual:

High school, 36 weeks
Village grades, 34 "
Rural, 33 "

## LENGTH OF TERMS.

It will be noticed from the tabular report appended that the school at North Guilford has been in session but thirty weeks. Two weeks were lost in the fall because of the illness of the teacher and the school was closed one week early in the winter because after the extremely cold weather set in the little children who came from some distance were unable to attend. This school should be started earlier this spring than has been the usual custom and some of this time made up in the summer term.

It will also be noted that the Grover school is short one week. German measles broke out in this school near the close of the winter term and it was deemed wise to close at the end of the ninth week.

In the first Grammar school one week was lost during the spring term because of the illness of the teacher. All the other schools have kept the required number of weeks.

#### TEACHERS.

As you are well aware the past year has been of marked difficulty in the matter of securing teachers. The same scarcity of teachers exists as of all other kinds of labor both skilled and unskilled. The loss of a good teacher is nothing short of a calamity and of any experienced teacher a misfortune to be avoided. Several resignations during the past year have necessitated several changes in our teaching force and few probably realize the difficulty that has been experienced in filling these vacant places.

Long continued service of the same teacher in the same school—if the teacher be a good teacher—is the condition to be striven for in the administration of our schools.

Teachers on their part should be very careful that the security of their positions does not permit them to lower their standards of work. You as teachers must have a professional spirit that may prompt you to demand better pay for your services but never to lower the quality of your work. The teacher who interprets the present scarcity of teachers as an opportunity to hold her job by inferior work is not a teacher in any true sense but rather a common laborer of the commonest sort. That there are some such teaching to-day everywhere, there is no doubt, for in times of scarcity there are hangers-on in every line of work, but they are only hangers-on and in no tense teachers. You as teachers have better days ahead in the profession and the better you do your work, the nearer you live up to your opportunities in your school, the sooner those better times will come.

### WHAT HAS BEEN DONE IN THE SCHOOLS.

A sub-primary grade has been started in Miss Pearson's room which will enable a much more satisfactory grading in those lower grades and provide against too early advancement of very young children. Our primary schools are among the best in the State. It is a great misfortune that they have to be housed under the town hall.

The surroundings here are not conducive to good schools—rather, I believe most pernicious for young children; they have no suitable playground, the entrance to their building is very often littered with cigar and cigarette stubs, befouled with tobacco juice and adorned with bill boards covered with the glaring posters of all sorts of traveling shows.

And all the trouble is not outside the building, for on show days the clatter and din in the hall over the children's heads interrupts and disturbs the work. Little children are uncomplaining, but because they enter no protest it is no less the business of the fathers and mothers to see to it that something is done to secure for their little children opportunity for them to attend school with better surroundings than they now have under our town hall.

Whatever is done to the town hall—the first consideration should be to move the schools out. No plan that will provide for the continuance of schools there should be entertained as feasible for a moment by the citizens of this town.

In the higher grades there was a complete change of teachers at the beginning of the fall term. Not withstanding the temporary disadvantages arising from such a change, several distinct advances have been made this year. We are teaching arithmetic better than ever before. We are in general getting better re-

sults in reading. In English grammar we are still deficient.

Several changes have been made in the Grammar school course of study to make it more in harmony with the standard Grammar school course of to-day.

Beginning with the fall term the music teacher who had been doing assistant's work in this room and 2nd assistant's work in the High school, was given all her time for the music and High school work.

This arrangement has given much better results both in music and the High school. The placing of all the Grammar school work in the hands of the regular teacher has also been of a distinct advantage there.

#### RURAL SCHOOLS.

Four of our five rural schools have been under the instruction of the same teachers as last year. This fact alone assures work above the average.

Several of these schools are doing as good work as are the village schools, and their grading is very nearly the same. Some outside classes have made greater progress in some studies than have any corresponding classes in the village; particularly is this true in the Intermediate grades of the rural schools. It is true that with all the advantages that village schools are supposed to have, the good country schools have better advantages.

It is growing to be a practice, however, for boys of the Grammar school age to be sent to the village schools and the custom seems to be a good one. It is a condition of youth for the boy or girl when he or she gets to be the biggest in school, or about the biggest, to begin to think the top has been reached and to shirk. Then is the time that new surroundings are needed and associations with larger boys and girls absolutely necessary. As a rule pupils coming from the country into our upper grades stand well in their classes and average younger than do the village children of the same grade.

It is very much to be regretted that we are unable to have music and drawing in our rural schools.

#### HIGH SCHOOL.

Our High school under the efficient management of Pin. Stuart has had a prosperous year.

We have been most unfortunate in having so many changes in the position of first assistant this year.

Miss North resigned at the close of the spring term after filling the position for two years very successfully. Her successor, Miss Jenuison, resigned at the close of the fall term to the great disappointment of all. The present teacher is Miss Edith Knight of Richmond. Maine.

# Guilford Free Public Library.

The Trustees of Guilford Free Public Library respectfully submit their fourth annual report.

The library contained 2,188 books and pamphlets March 1st, 1906, to which have been added during the year by purchase 333 volumes; by gifts 83, and bound magazines 11; making an increase of 327 volumes, and a total number of 2515 volumes March 1st, 1907.

The rooms have been open on every library day during the year, with the exception of those coming on holidays.

The number of books issued shows an increase in circulation over the preceding year.

While the greatest demand by our patrons is for fiction, the high grade magazines are also very popular for home use.

The plan of sending books to the rural schools as suggested by the Supt. of schools, has been in practice for a few months only; but, we think, will prove to be satisfactory.

We can report the library to be in its usual prosperous condition, and satisfactory to the trustees with one exception.

The condition of the reading room is not what we wish it to be. The rules of the room are totally disregarded by some of our young patrons and much annoyance caused by unnecessary noise.

We would call the attention of the townspeople to the fact that the library is a town institution, and would like a large attendance of those interested in its success at the meeting of the Library Association, to be held at the Reading Room Monday evening, March 25th, 1907, at 7.30 o'clock.

We feel justified in asking for the usual appropriation from the town.

### STATE OF MAINE.

PISCATAQUIS ss.

To CHARLES E. HIGGINS, A CONSTABLE IN THE TOWN OF GUILFORD, IN SAID COUNTY:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Guilford, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town on the twenty-fifth day of March, A. D. 1907, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk.
- Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.
- Art. 4. To choose three or more selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.
- Art. 5. To choose a town treasurer.
- Art. 6. To choose a member of the S. S. committee.
- Art. 7. To choose a superintendent of schools or to see if the town will vote to authorize the S. S. committee to elect a superintendent of schools.
- Art. 8. To choose a road commissioner.
- Art. 9. To choose a town agent.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote that all taxes

shall be collected and paid to the treasurer in the following manner: One third on or before July 1, 1907; one third on or before Nov. 1, 1907; and the remaining one third on or before March 1, 1908.

- Art. 11. To choose a collector of taxes and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To choose one or more auditors of accounts.
- Art. 13. To choose one or more constables.
- Art. 14. To choose truant officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To choose surveyors of wood, bark and lumber, and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to unite with the other towns to employ a superintendent of schools in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 296 of the Public Laws for the year 1897.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the superintendent of schools for each day of actual service or pay a stated salary.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs and insurance on schoolhouses.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for a free High school at the village.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for purchase of school books.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for supplies and appliances.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will

- vote to raise for the support of poor and other town charges.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding debts and interest on the same.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of roads and bridges, and how the same shall be expended.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to comply with the requirements of State law in regard to State roads.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fire purposes and electric lights.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to pay members of fire company the amount of their poll tax for serving in the fire company for the ensuing year.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of water pipe and lay the same in Guilford Village for fire purposes and how the same shall be expended.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to pay the superintending school committee for their services.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Guilford Free Library.
- Art. 32. To choose one or more trustees for the Public Library.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for music in the schools.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to enforce the prohibitory law in town during the Municipal year 1907.
- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will

vote to raise to help pay the expenses of Memorial Day and pay the same to the committee of arrangements.

- Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended in the burying grounds in the town of Guilford.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to repair the hall, and how much money they will raise for the same, and how it shall be expended.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to extend the town water pipes to connect with those of the Guilford Manufacturing Company at the sawmill and what part of the expense the town will pay.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to drain the street water from the street near John Bates' residence, and how much money the town will raise for the same.
- Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to buy, build or rent a room for a lockup, and make arrangements for the same, and how much money they will raise for the same.
- Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to purchase a steel cage for a lockup and raise money to pay for the same.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to extend the sidewalk on south Main Street from its present terminus to the residence of Mr. Holt.
- Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to extend the sidewalk on School Street to the foot of the hill near the L. A. Small house, and also from the junction of School and Winter Streets up Winter Street to a given point, and define the terminus, and raise money to pay for the same, and how it shall be expended.

- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to renew the lease of the room now used as selectmen's office, for a term of years.
- Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to have a night watchman in Guilford Village and raise money to pay for the same.
- Art. 46. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of the old sidewalk in Guilford Village.
- Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to cut the bushes on the road-sides, and how much and how it shall be expended.
- Art. 48. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to lease a part of the selectmen's office for the use of the Free Public Library.
- Art. 49. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward the expense of an agricultural fair to be holden at Guilford Village in the fall of 1907.
- Art. 50. To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk on River Street and how much money the town will raise to pay for the same.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting and revising the list of voters at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
