The trustees of Guilford Memorial Library respectfully submit their report for the year ending February 1, 1916-

The library contains 5,058 volumes. It has been open to the public 104 days during the year. Number of books issued for home use 11,906 volumes. Average output in one day, 114.

# Report of Superintendent and Superintending School Committee

#### To the Citizens of Guilford:

It is with pleasure that we submit to you our second annual school report. In this report we have tried to place before you clearly and briefly the progress, changes and general conditions of our schools, together with a statement of their future needs.

There are many problems connected with education and the successful maintenance of schools, and no one person can solve them, but by the earnest co-operation of school officials, teachers, parents and pupils much can be accomplished. In general the schools have had another prosperous year, altho at times conditions have not been as favorable for their best interests as we should liked to have had them.

The standards of a community depend to a tremendous degree upon the efficiency and success of its schools. The problem of making them more efficient increases in magnitude each year. At the beginning of another year we believe that some changes should be made in our curriculum in order that the boy and girl, whose school career ends with their graduation from High school or too often at the expiration of the compulsory school age, may receive greater benefit and better preparation for their life work.

In the financial phase of our work it has been our endeavor to expend wisely the funds appropriated for school purposes. The overdraft in the repair account

is largely due, 1st, to increase in the insurance rate, thus making the premiums on policies which expired during the year more than we estimated; 2nd, to more extensive repairs on the rural buildings than we expected would be necessary. Any changes in other accounts are self-evident upon examination.

We have tried to bring about greater uniformity between the village and rural school. Hereafter it will be necessary for all schools to have an equal number of weeks of schooling. Do you want more in the rural schools or less in the village? We strongly urge that the number of weeks in the rural schools be increased to thirty-six and we will make our recommendations accordingly.

HIGH SCHOOL: The work accomplished in our High school we believe compares very well with the similar work in schools of other towns. However the time has come when it seems advisable to extend our courses in order that we may offer greater opportunities to our young people. Mr. Holman, Miss Webb and Mrs. Carter make a very able faculty. They are loyal and hard working teachers and should have the support of all connected with the school. We are pleased to submit to you the principal's report.

COMMON SCHOOLS: The schools in general have been under the direction of trained and efficient teachers, who have been untiring in their efforts and ever ready to co-operate in all things that pertain to the success and advancement of our schools. At the close of the spring term we were sorry to lose by resignation several of our most competent teachers but the teachers whom we have elected to fill these vacancies have proven themselves well prepared to continue the good standards set by their predecessors. Good work is being accomplished in all the grades of the village and in all the rural schools. Much credit is due to the teachers for the interest that they have taken in outside work. By different methods considerable money has

been raised by the schools with which useful and ornamental articles have been purchased. This work has been carried on to some extent in the rural schools and special credit is due Miss Ames in the Brown district for her work in this direction.

The work in music and drawing has been under the supervision of Miss Marsh and good progress has been made. A good start has been made in the rural schools in these courses.

BUILDINGS, EQUIPMENT, GROUNDS: In the High school building nearly all the rooms and corridors were calsomined, desks scraped and varnished; woodwork of one recitation room varnished; roof, steps and furnace repaired; and other work done as needs have arisen. At the new building the desks were scraped and varnished; the ventilator repaired and minor repairs made on the furnaces.

Some work of filling in and grading along the concrete walk has been done. The grounds in front of the buildings should be drained or graded during the coming summer vacation.

The Grover and Center buildings were shingled; painted outside; painted, patched and calsomined inside; steps and foundations repaired. These two buildings are in very good condition. The Low's Bridge house was painted and calsomined inside. It will be necessary to paint this building and make some repairs on the foundation. Minor repairs will be needed at the Brown schoolhouse

ATTENDANCE: During the fall and winter terms the average attendance has been considerably lowered due largely to epidemics of whooping cough, chicken pox and grippe. A large majority of absences have been unavoidable but there have been several cases when pupils have remained away from school without any reasonable excuse. By examining the statistics which we submit you may readily see that most of the tardiness is in the upper grades and High school. Why should not these pupils be as prompt as the little folks?

Tardiness and nonattendance of pupils checks the success of the school to exactly the same degree as tardiness and nonattendance of your employees does to your business. Is that not reasonable? The schools are costing the taxpayers large sums of money. Can you afford to deprive your children of the benefits that they might be receiving from the schools? We have had the help of a large majority of the parents in this phase of the work. It should be unanimous.

A NEW COURSE OF STUDY: We believe that either a Commerical or Manual Training course should be introduced into our schools, preferably the latter. A room could be fitted in the basement of the High school building for Manual Training at comparatively small expense. This course would be open to the boys of the upper grades and High school, and especially to those boys who do not intend to go to college. This would keep many of the boys in school who now drop out when they become fifteen.

In closing we wish to extend to the teachers and parents our sincere thanks for their hearty cooperation in the school work. As superintendent I extend to the superintending school committee my appreciation for their loyal support.

### REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL FOR YEAR OF 1915-16

To the Superintendent and Members of the School Board.

#### Gentlemen:-

In accordance with the request of your Superintendent I submit my fourth annual report of Guilford High The year that is closing has seen but little change in the numbers enrolled in the High school. Our total enrollment in the Spring term was 61 with an average attendance of 60 which was exceptionally good for that season of the year. In September 1915 school opened with an enrollment of 66. Average attendance for the term totals 63. The present term opened with an enrollment of 64. The average attendance will be lower than the two preceding terms owing to the fact that many of our pupils have been absent for sickness. In passing may I say that many of these absences have been uncalled for in our opinion. I do not suppose that it will be of any benefit to ring the charger on this topic again, but I sincerely wish you who are parents would be square in this matter. I have never refused to excuse a pupil for illness, but you will pardon me if I say frankly that if you consider your sons and daughters ill enough to warrant a letter to that effect to me I suggest that you ought not to consider them well enough to attend basketball games and dances the same day. Any pupil who is too ill to attend school, in my opinion is too ill to be walking the This thing is happening repeatedly with some We have too of us, and ought to receive our attention. many cases of truancy and absence for a town twice our population. It is our problem here, and will never be solved until the parents stand with the teacher in the matter.

Our courses of study remain the same with the exception of a course in General Science which has just been introduced in the Freshman and Sophomore years.

Through the generosity and attention of your Superintendent we are well supplied with textbooks and material for our work the remainder of the term now in session. Plans are under way for an interscholastic speaking contest in April in which Guilford shall play its part if all goes well. We have also organized a baseball league of the High schools in this county for the coming season in which we expect our High school to play its share.

Plans are under way for an extention of courses in the High school for next fall to give added opportunity to those students who do not go to college or technical school.

Two things are vitally needed in the High school building in my opinion, more room and better light for what we have. I do not wish to engage in any argument over the question of the need of electric lights, for in my opinion it is self evident to any thinking person, but if any one doubts let him or her come to the school building any afternoon at 2.30 from December until February, and I will guarantee to show them rooms that a book cannot be read in at that time of day. If you are willing to work in your own homes under like conditions, so are we. If you are not then you have no right to ask us to do so.

In closing, let me say that just at present all over New England the High school is the storm center, and must meet the changing conditions of our civic life. We must begin to advance here rapidly in the next few years or be left out entirely in our corner of the world. Let us as teachers and parents forget what was done last year or five years ago, and be open minded enough to plan ten years ahead if necessary.

# Report of Board of Health

The Board of Health submits the following report:— With the exception of an outbreak of whooping cough in our schools, one case of scarlet fever and one case of typhoid the town has been free from the acute contagious diseases.

Only two nuisances were reported during the year. Upon notification to the owners these were promptly remedied.

The most serious problem we are confronted with is the tuberculosis situation. However we are making rapid strides along this line of work. The local Anti-Tuberculosis association and the Public Health nurse should be much commended for their good work. Every case has been promptly investigated and everything possible done to relieve the suffering and prevent the spread of the disease.

From the report of the District Nurse it will be seen that for the first time within the past eight years there has been no death from tuberculosis in town the past year. The report is for the entire district with Guilford listed separately.

SUPPOSED CAUSES of Tuberculosis among patients in District.

Immediate— Infection from parents, from houses, schools and public buildings, lack of precautions from using common utensils.

Predisposing— Contagious diseases, unsanitary conditions, (only a few), tonsils and adenoids, poor housing conditions, including (light, ventilation, temperature, space), lack of personal hygiene and environment.

Work Done Among Tuberculosis Patients

The advanced cases, to isolate as far as possible, teach precautions to prevent spread of disease, look after welfare of patient, and make as comfortable as possible.

Moderately advance cases, teach precautions, and induce patient to take all advantages of improvement.

Incipient cases, to follow up closely, induce patient to take all advantages for cure.

All cases are advised to go to sanitoria with the consent of the family physician, and when circumstances allow.

All cases who do not use proper precautions after due instructions have been given are reported to the local board of health.

Arrested cases are followed up for a certain length of time after the patient returns to work, as sometimes their old condition is apt to return.

Suspicious cases, such as ænemic children attending school, or who may be in a poor physical condition, are followed up, examination by a physician advised at intervals and general oversight of their health.

Undiagnosed cases have been taken on as patients, when either advised by the Board of Health or physician, and such work done as seemed necessary.

Cases have been referred from Board of Health, physicians, employers, teachers, superintendents of schools, clergymen, relatives or friends and from patients.

Patients under the care of a private physician cannot be visited professionally by the nurse except by cooperation of the physician unless authorized by the Board of Health, school authorities or some legal source. Friendly calls may be made however at the request of the patient.

#### Prevention and Education

This seems to be the basis on which to work for extinguishing tuberculosis as well as eliminating other diseases which tuberculosis and it's causes are so closely associated with.

Prevention and education is such a broad field that it is impossible in a short space to give details. Public meetings have been conducted by the association. Tuberculosis week successfully carried out. Mothers meetings in the interest of Baby Welfare work.

Teachers reached to urge reports of contageous diseases to the local Board of Health promptly and supplies furnished.

Vaccination of school children emphasized in protection against small-pox.

Local medical relief from association for defects to those with insufficient funds.

Distribution of reliable literature, (on different phases of health). These are only a few, but the most general lines of interpreting the principles of Better Health.

#### Co-operation

Through the co-operation of the different organizations and societies the work has progressed much more rapidly. Altho in all public health work results are exceedingly slow.

Massachusetts which has the most efficient Board of Health probably in this country is still confronting the same problems. Its preparedness is now a health officer, dispensary and nurse for every 10,000. Population has decreased its death rate remarkably.

We have the compliments of the State association that our district has done better work and made greater progress during the year than any other district in the State. Let this be conveyed to the people who have been keen to see the opportunities for "More Life and Fuller", who have put every effort forward to promote health, efficiency and integrity in the welfare of the work.

# Town Warrant

#### STATE OF MAINE

Piscataquis, ss.

To FRED A. HEATH, a constable in the Town of Guilford in said County.

#### GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Guilford, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town hall in said town on the sixth of March, A. D., 1916, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
  - Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk.
- Art. 3. To hear all reports to be made at said meeting.
- Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.
  - Art. 5. To choose a Town Treasurer.
- Art. 6. To choose a member of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to unite with any other town or towns to employ a Superintendent of Schools in accordance with the Statute law of the State.
- Art. 8. To choose a Superintendent of Schools, or to see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to elect a Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 9. To choose a Collector of Taxes and see what method the town will adopt for the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.

- Art. 10. To choose one or more Auditors of Accounts.
  - Art. 11. To choose one or more Constables.
- Art. 12. To choose a Truant Officer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To choose Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay the Superintendent of Schools for each day of actual service, or to pay a stated salary, and raise money to pay for the same.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs and insurance on school houses the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Free High School at the village.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to purchase school books.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school supplies and appliances.
- Art. 20. To see what action the town will take in regard to draining or grading the grounds in front of the Village School buildings, and what sum of money shall be raised and appropriated for the same.
- Art. 21. To see what action the town will take relative to the introduction of Manual Training or a Commercial Course in the Village schools and what sum of money shall be raised to defray the expense of the same.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will raise for placing flags in each of the rural schools as required by law.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for installing electric lights in the High School building.

- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor and other town charges.
- Art. 25 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding interest bearing debt and interest on the same.
- Art. 26 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of roads and bridges.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to build new sidewalks and repair of the old sidewalks in Guilford Village.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no," on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will appropriate and raise a sum of money to be used in celebrating the 100th anniversary of the incorporation of the town of Guilford, the same to be paid to and be expended under the direction of the Centennial Executive Committee as elected by the Guilford Board of Trade.
- Art. 30. To seeif thetown will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 130. of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise to be used for patrol maintenance in accordance with chapter 272 of the Public Laws of 1915.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fire purposes and electric lights.

- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to pay the Superintending School committee for their services the ensuing year.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$575.00 for the support of the Guilford Memorial Library.
- Art. 35. To choose one or more trustees for the Guilford Memoria. Library.
- Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for music in the schools.
- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to help pay the expenses of Memorial Day, and how the same shall be expended.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to have a night watchman, in Guilford village and vote to raise money to pay for the same.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 and pay the same over to the treasurer of the Guilford Water Co. as per contract signed August 10, 1910, as per vote of said town.
- Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 and pay the same to the treasurer of the Guilford Fire Co., the same to be paid for practicing and fighting fires according to the time actually put in by each member
- Art. 41. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to cut bushes by side of town roads, and buy boards to build and repair snow fences.
- Art. 42 To see if the town will authorize the school board to appoint a school physician for making medical inspection of our schools and what sum of money shall be raised for the same.
- Art.43. To see what action the town will take to protect public and private property in the village of Guilford and stop rowdyism and disturbance of the peace and quiet of its citizens on the nights of July 3 and 4, 1916.

- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to prohibit the selling and use of fire-crackers and explosives in Guilford village until 12 p. m. July 3, 1916.
- Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to furnish free the use of water and standpipes as used in sprinkling the streets to any party that will put the same in repair and keep the pipes in repair free of expense to said town.
- Art. 46. To see what sum of money the town will raise for fuel and janitor's services in the High school.
- Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more firewards, and fix their compensation and raise money for the same.
- Art. 48 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to place new electric lights on such side streets and in such places in Guilford Village as the Selectmen in their judgment think the same should be placed to properly light the village, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 49. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be paid to the Dexter and Piscataquis Tuberculosis Association, for the services of a visiting nurse in Guilford.
- Art. 50. To see if the town will authorize some suitable person to act in accordance with the provision of chapter 97, of the Public Laws of 1915, to remove all bodies and remains of deceased persons now buried in the old cemetery in the town of Guilford on the highway leading from Guilford village to Foxcroft, removing them to Elmwood cemetery in said town.
- Art. 51. To see if the town will vote to appoint some person or persons to act as its agent or agents in making arrangements for the removal of the bodies and remains as stated in Art. 50 aforesaid, and to sell and deed the land now contained in said cemetery.

- Art. 52. To see if the town will vote to take over as its property the town clock placed this year in the tower of the Universalist church, and authorize the Selectmen to cause the same to be operated and kept up at the expense of the town.
- Art. 53. To see if the town will vote to place a hydrant at or near the residence of Henry Ward on Blaine Avenue and raise money for the same.
- Art. 54. To see if the town will vote to instruct the school committee to pay a certain sum per week, to E. P. Smith for the conveyance of scholars, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 55. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have the Town hall painted outside during the ensuing year, and to pay the same out of the unexpended in the Hall account.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting and revising the list of voters at the Selectmen's office at the Town hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
