

AUDITOR'S REPORT.

In entering upon the duties of Auditor, it was not necessary to examine the affairs of the Town, prior to March 10th, 1884, as the same had been ably audited by my predecessor. Therefore, I have confined my labors to the municipal year ending March 10th, 1885, with the following results:

The Resources of the Town, as given in the Selectmen's Report of same date, were \$7,446.71. This amount consisted mostly of unpaid tax bills, tax deeds, and other claims, subject to a shrinkage; and those mentioned in the present report are of a like character, and are subject to a similar shrinkage.

During the year there have been examinations made; and the vouchers compared with the orders drawn; and the same found to agree.

The Selectmen have vouchers for all orders drawn by them; and the same are carefully filed, and numbered to correspond with each order. The temporary loans to the Town have been reduced from \$4,000, March 10th, 1884, to \$2,000, March 10th, 1885, and the bonded debt has been reduced \$1,000 during the past year. The interest account is somewhat less than last year. There has been paid interest on only three of last year's orders, the interest amounting to \$19.43. Also \$1,121.57 have been paid for outstanding accounts against the Town, not mentioned in the Report of the previous year, showing conclusively that the finances of the Town have been judiciously managed.

The Treasurer has been systematic in keeping his account. He has made a separate entry on his book for all moneys received, and also for each order and other money's paid.

The balance in the Treasury, as per report, March 10th, 1884, was \$278.95. The balance claimed to be in Treasury by Auditor, was \$1,094.70: the latter amount having been found correct, through errors in making up the report, which (errors) are explained in the Treasurer's account in the present Town Report.

During the year 318 town orders, amounting to \$17.005.62, have been drawn; of which 316 orders, amounting to \$15,155.62, have been paid; leaving two orders, amounting to \$1,850, unpaid. The first, No. 166, for \$1,000, given Annie McHugh Scribner, for money loaned Town. The second, No. 191, for \$850, given A. P. Heywood, in payment of School-house in District No. 1, to be paid from the tax assessed in said District. In addition two old orders have been paid, amounting to \$33, which leaves but one outstanding, dated March 10th, 1880.

The four town bonds falling due during the past year and amounting to \$4,000, have been paid, and three new bonds, amounting to \$3,000, have been issued during the same period.

There has been a reduction in the indebtedness of the town (for the past year) of \$4,347.41, as shown by the following statement:

Certain tax deeds, held by Treasurer, March 10th, 1884, amount-to \$89.60. Those held by him, at the close of the past year, joint to \$119.66; showing an increase in same of \$30.06 during past year. Said increase belongs to transactions of previous ars.

In concluding, I would respectfully call the attention of the town a change that would be beneficial, viz: a Day Book and Ledger uld be kept by the town, which should show its financial standing, any time; and in which accounts should be opened with the various partments; so that when an account against the town is paid, each partment should be charged, then and there, with its portion of a payment. This of course would occasion more labor, on the t of the officers; and pay for keeping same should be adjusted accadingly. Trusting to bills and receipts is neither safe nor business-

SCHOOL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The Superintending School Committee submit the following report:

In District No. One, (Village centre), the advanced scholars, according to custom, have been sent to the Academy, through arrangements made by the Agent with the authorities of that institution. In a like way, other village districts have pursued the same course. Your Committee heartily endorse the course of the Agent in District No. One, who has required a regular examination of all such scholars, and would recommend it to Agents of other districts. By this means not only a higher standard of scholarship, but also a more economical and less indiscriminate expenditure of school funds has been attained.

We are pleased to state that a summer term of school has been added in this district, the lack of which has long been felt.

The Grammar and Primary Schools continue under the charge of Miss Patie E. Hussey and Mrs. Martha A. Putnam respectively.—In previous reports we have expressed our high satisfaction with their work, and we only deem it necessary to testify to the continuance of their faithful and excellent services.

The summer term of the Intermediate School was taught by Miss Grace Donworth, who afterwards left this for another field of labor. For the fall term the services of Miss Flora S. Parkman were engaged, who has since continued in charge of the school. We are glad to have noticed a steady improvement, under her management, both in discipline and thoroughness of teaching.

In District No. Two, (Hill), the summer and winter terms were taught by Mr. P. H. Gillin, to the satisfaction of the district. The school is overcrowded, a fact which stands in the way of the usefulness of the teacher and advancement of scholars. The fall term was taught by Miss Luella J. Seely, a teacher of excellent attainments.

In District No. Three, (Cary's Mills), the summer and fall terms were taught by Miss Sarah E. Mulherrin, who possesses many good qualifications as a teacher. The winter term was taught by Mr. Frank M. Donnell, a thorough scholar, but with hardly sufficient energy and decision for the requirements of this school.

In District No. Four, (Foxcroft), the summer term was taught by Miss Mary E. Hiscock with fair success, and the winter term by Mr. John J. Auber, to the acceptance of the district and the profit of the scholars.

In District No. Five, (Town Farm), both summer and winter

erms were taught by Miss Mary A. Mulherrin. This school is small a numbers but the scholars show good progress in their studies.

In District No. Six, (Horseback), the summer term was taught by liss Susie I. Mulherrin, and the fall term by her sister Josephine.—
uring the winter term, the school has been under the charge of Mr. ames Doherty, a young man whose work has been attended with pod success.

In District No. Seven, (Village north side), the spring and fall arms were taught by Miss Mary E. McGinley, an energetic and kilful teacher. We regret that the condition of her health precludes he advisability, for her, of teaching for the present. The winter term as been taught by Miss Sarah E. Mulherrin.

In District No. Eight, (White Settlement), both the summer and rinter terms were taught by Miss Martha E. Atherton, to the acceptance of the district.

In District No. Nine, (Niles Settlement), the summer term was successfully taught by Mrs. Christina Davidson, and the fall term by Iiss S. Isa Day, with the exception of the last four weeks, during hich time Miss Anna S. Maxwell was employed. The winter term as taught by Mr. John Betts, an experienced and energetic teacher. Comparing the schools of the town with what they should and ight be, we are free to state that they are decidedly open to critism. The condition of many of the school buildings is unsuitable, he accommodations of that in District No. One, are insufficient for a number of scholars in regular attendance. The building in District No. Seven is a discredit to our wealthy and flourishing town.—he black-board conveniencies, or rather inconveniences, are insufficient in the majority of the buildings and the lack of maps, globes and other apparatus seriously stands in the way of the progress and access which would otherwise be attainable.

We take this means to emphasize the advisability of parents permally visiting the schools attended by their children. We believe nat their co-operation would tend to increase the efficiency and thorughness of the work both of teachers and scholars, and that thus a timulus and inspiration would be imparted to all.

In the examination of teachers and the granting of certificates to andidates, it has been the policy of your Committee to endeavor to aise the standard of scholarship, with the object of gaining thereby n advance in the qualifications of teachers and placing the schools pon a higher level.
