The total Liabilities have only been decreased \$2,698.19, while our excess of Liabilities have been decreased \$6,011.89, this being accounted for by our increase in Resources, of which \$3,826.61 is Cash in the Treasury.

Two Bonds, No. 95 and 162, for \$1,000 each, have been paid, being the last of the floating indebtedness of the Town, leaving nothing to be provided for but our current expenses, excepting the Houlton Branch R. R. Bonds, which are all due in 1890, amounting to \$30,000.

The Taxes assessed in 1888 amounted to \$27,236.85. Suply Tax added—\$25.25, making \$27,262.10. Amount paid to the Treasurer, on or before August 1st. \$20,860.43, subject to a discount of 10 per cent; and there was paid to the Treasurer on or before Nov. 1st. \$1.731.18, subject to a discount of 5 per cent., leaving a balance of \$4,670.49, which was committed to W. A. Kay. In addition to the above amount there has been collected \$83.97 Interest and \$33.80 Supplementary Tax.

I have carefully examined all the accounts and have found them correct. There are receipted vouchers on file for all the money that has been paid out.

You have a full and correct statement of all the receipts and expenditures, in the report of your Selectmen and Treasurer, and any further repetition from me is needless.

The discrepancy between the Selectmen, School account and Supervisor is of long standing, and an article has been inserted in the Warrant for its settlement. This should be reconciled.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF SCHOOLS.

Schools.

The schools of the town, during the past year, have been run with very little friction. Parents and teachers have seemed to work in almost perfect harmony. There was not a single instance, during the year, where the Supervisor was called upon to assist in maintaining discipline, and but few cases of complaint against the teachers. On the whole the pupils have seemed to make very commendable progress. The schools have all been held twenty-nine weeks except No. 2, where the teacher closed one week early, and the school for the Johnson and Jordan families, which was ten weeks. In the last named, there were only four pupils, and the expense was \$50.00.

Miss Anna Maxwell, who is a very conscientious, hard-working teacher, resigned her place in the intermediate department, at the close of the summer term to accept a position of higher grade at Fort Fairfield, where I hope she met with the success she deserves. Her place was taken by Miss Alice M. Porter, a graduate of Ricker Classical Institute.

On account of sickness, Mrs. Martha A. Putnam, after a very long and successful term of service, was obliged to resign the charge of the 2dd Primary in the middle of the fall term. She has our sympathy in her illness and gratitude for work so well done. After some delay her place was taken by Miss Marie Morse, a teacher of tact and experience, who gave perfect satisfaction.

FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

The Free High School money has been expended (as for a number of years past) by paying tuition at Ricker Classical Institute. The attendance for the summer term was 31; for the fall term, 54; for the winter term, 53; and for the present spring term, 60. The amount paid was \$986.25. Deducting \$250.00, paid by the State, and this school costs the town \$736.25. It is needless for me to say that the town cannot, in any other way, obtain the same instruction at so low a cost. I would recommend the appropriation of \$750.00 for this purpose.

SCHOOL HOUSES.

More repairs will be necessary the coming year than were made during that just past. Although some houses are in good condition, extensive repairs are necessary upon others, especially No. 2, No. 6 and No. 8. That in No. 7 is not worth repairing and it is to be hoped that the town will appropriate money to erect a new house to take the place of the shabby apology that now does duty as a village school house. The appropriation of \$2500.00 is recommended for that purpose.

Something should be done to avoid the necessity of packing nearly a hundred pupils into a room scarcely large enough for one-half that number as has been done, for a number of years, in the lowest grade in No. 1. There were 104 pupils registered during the last summer term. It is impossible for a teacher to do justice to her school under such conditions, and were it not that sickness keeps a large proportion of them out, the crowded condition would

be, perhaps, worse than it is.

In fact, all the rooms in No. 1 except the Grammar School are over-crowded. A structure less suitable to its intended use could hardly be devised. The three rooms in the lower story are better adapted to the contraction and spread of disease than to the diffusion of education. The appropriation of a sum of money sufficient to erect a new house is recommended.

To WILLIAM A. KAY. C'ne of the Constables of the town of Houlton, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said town of Houlton, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall, in said town, on Monday, the twenty-fifth day of March, 1889, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, (standard time), to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see if the town will vote to employ a Supervisor of Schools (for the ensuing year) instead of three S. S. Committee.
- ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Liquor Agent or Agents, for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a truant officer for the benefit of the public schools.
- ART. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor, and other necessary expenses of the town for the ensuing year.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.
- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of a Free High School for the ensuing year.
- ART. 9. To see if the town will vote to enforce Temperance Instruction in all the town schools.
- ART. 10. To see if the town will vote to provide text books for Temperance Instruction, in the different schools of the town.
- ART. 11. To see what instructions, if any, the town will give to the S. S. Committee or Supervisor as to the expenditure of High School money.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for extra repairs upon school houses, and how the same shall be expended.
- ART. 13. To see if the town will vote to locate and erect a new school house on or near the present site of school house No. 7, and what sum of money the town will vote to raise for said purpose, and how the same shall be expended.

- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for free text books for the public schools.
- ART. 18. To see what instructions the town will vote to give the Selectmen in respect to the settlement of the uncollected school taxes committed to Ira G. Hersey.
- ART. 19. To see what instructions the town will vote to give the Selectmen in respect to the settlement of the uncollected school taxes committed to Horace Chaloner.
- ART. 20. To see what instructions the town will vote to give the Selectmen in respect to the settlement of the uncollected taxes committed to Richard Sinclair.
- ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to impose a tax upon dogs, or the owner or person who has them in possession.
- ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to cause the removal of all obstructions in the public streets and sidewalks, or overhanging the same.
- ART. 23. To see whether the town will vote to grant the right of way for the building of the line of the Northern Maine Railway as surveyed through this town.
- ART. 24. To see what instructions the town will vote to give the Selectmen in respect to the establishment or a new location of the public way between the "Bellows pipe," so-called, in the Main street of the village, and running across the Meduxnekeag stream towards Presque Isle, with reference to the construction of the new bridge across the stream.
- ART. 25. To see what ordinance or ordinances the town will adopt to restrain fast driving and racing in the public streets.
- ART. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to build a road or street located by the Selectmen, February

18, 1888, on petition of G. B. Dunn & 34 others, described as follows: Beginning at the North-west corner of Lot 17, Range 6, (owned by E. M. Smith), and on the east line of the road leading from Houlton to Littleton, thence running along the North line of said lot 17, Range 6, to the West line of Lots 16 & 17, Range 5; said way to be three rods wide and the North line of Lot 17, Range 6, to be the centre line of said way.

ART. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to build a road or street located by the Selectmen, February 20, 1888, on petition of John C. Seely & 17 others, described as follows: Beginning at the center of the road leading from Houlton to Woodstock, at a point where the west line of land now or formerly owned or occupied by James Nash, being also the center of the Cary Hill farm road, so-called, in the south division of Houlton; thence running northerly on the east line of land of Robert Stephenson to the south line of Lot 7, Range 2; thence northerly in the center of said Cary road through land of said Stephenson 80 rods to John C. Seely's south line; thence northerly in the center of said Cary road 250 rods through land of John C. Seely to a point near the house of John C. Seely on Lot 18, Range 2; said way to be three rods wide, and said courses to be the center of said way.

ART. 28. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to contract with party or parties to build a bridge across the Meduxnekeag stream on or near the place where the Putnam bridge now stands, and what sum of money the town will vote to raise for same.

AKT. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairing and building of Roads, Bridges and Sidewalks, and how the same shall be paid and expended.

ART. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of laying out and grading the cemeteries.

ART. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Department, and Watchmen.

ART. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Department.

ART. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of two Watchmen.

ART. 34. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise towards the payment of the debts of the town.

ART. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in aid of the Free Public Library now maintained in this town.

ART. 36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a loan or loans for the purpose of paying the debts of the town.

ART. 37. To see if the town will vote to make any discount upon taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what per cent.; also to fix a time and rate for interest to be added upon taxes remaining unpaid.

ART. 38. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Health Committee to clear the brook which runs through land owned by E. Woodbury and others, of all filth, from a point south of said Woodbury's dwelling house to the outlet of said brook, and what sum of money the town will raise for same.

ART. 39. To see if the town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen whereby they have abated the taxes published in the town report March 11, 1889.

ART. 40. To see what instructions the town will give the Tax Collector and Town Treasurer in regard to taking province money for taxes and paying out the same.

ART, 41. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to employ a town physician.

ART. 42. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise towards the purchase of Fire Alarm apparatus.

ART. 43. To see what instructions the town will vote to give the Selectmen in regard to the settlement of the account the town has against the School Districts for money advanced for repairing school houses.

ART. 44. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as published by the Selectmen March 11, 1889.
