AUDITOR'S REPORT.

Having examined the books and accounts of the Town, for the past year, as often as was thought necessary, I have found the accounts of the Selectmen and Treasurer, correctly kept, and to agree with their statements as published in this report.

The financial standing of the Town is shown by the Selectmen's Report of the Town's Resources and Liabilities.

The Taxes assessed in 1890, were \$26,935.87, and Supplementary Tax of \$36.00, making \$26,971.87, of which, including the discount, there was paid to the Treasurer, \$20,455.32. The balance, \$6,516.55, was committed to W. A. Kay, Collector, who has collected and paid to the Treasurer, \$3,300.00. The Town has issued New Bonds during the year, to the amount of \$40,000.00, to pay the \$30,000.00, Railroad Bonds, which matured in 1890, and \$10,000.00 on School-house Loan. These new bonds are dated Dec. 15, 1890, run twenty years and bear four per cent. interest payable semi-annually. Only three of these, however, have been sold, the others being still in the hands of the Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

The Board of Health is pleased to report an unusual freedom during the past year from contagious and infectious diseases. Seven cases of Scarlet Fever and one each of Diphtheria and Typhoid Fever have occurred, all ending in recovery. The small number of cases of these diseases and the fact that no death has occurred therefrom should be a source of gratification to everyone.

We are confident that the sanitary conditions of the village have been much bettered within the past few years, although a great opportunity for improvement still exists. The establishment of the water and sewerage systems, the increased attention of citizens to the subject of sanitation, and the work of the Health Board, in a very humble way, we doubt not, have contributed a great deal, to the improved state of things.

The Board has investigated about 50 nuisances during the year and removed them so far as was practicable. Systematic tours of inspection have been made and the attention of property owners called to any conditions which were dangerous to health. We are pleased to state that our recommendations have, as a rule, met with prompt acquiescence.

We feel that the attention of the Town should again be called to the condition of the Bailey Brook, especially that part between Court Street and its mouth. Its present state is one of filth and a menace to the health of the village.

The dumping of filth and refuse into the river above the dam is another practice which every citizen should condemn, and one which this Board, so far as is in its power, tries vigorously to prevent.

The Board wishes to record its appreciation of the co-operation of the property owners in its efforts, feeling, as it does, that its work has thereby been made much easier and pleasanter.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF SCHOOLS.

Owing to my absence during the winter, it will be impossible to make so full and complete report as I would like.

As last year, the discipline of the schools has been maintained without recourse to me except in a very few cases.

It seems to me after considering the matter, that it would be more economical to build a new school-house in the White Settlement than to repair. One about like that built last year in the Lowrey District would answer the purpose. For that reason no repairs were made last year. The house on the Ludlow road should be re-seated.

The Free High School money has been expended, as usual, at Ricker Classical Institute. The attendance at the spring term was 52; at the summer term, 43; at the fall term, 60; at the winter term, 58. Cost to the town, \$750.00.

The free text book !aw went into effect August 1st, 1890. So far as can be judged in the time, it is a success. Books cost very much less than formerly, and so far, better care has been taken of them.

Not being at home at present. I could not make a detailed financial statement that would be reliable, but no doubt the necessary information can be found in the Selectmen's report, except that some more bills than usual may be outstanding.

CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

To the Selectmen of Houlton:

In presenting my report as Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, I would say that this has been the most fortunate year I have known in the past twelve years, the damage by fire being very slight.

The department has never been in better condition. It consists of the Chief Engineer, Engineer of the Steamer, Assistant, Forman, First and Second Assistants, 22 Hose men—in all, 28 men.

The apparatus, except hose-sled, is in good condition and located as follows:—Central Station, 1 steamer, 3 hose-carts, 1 sled, 1 ladder truck, 9 ladders, 1 Bangor extension ladder, 1 chemical engine, rubber hose, 2,000 feet; cotton hose, 600 feet; play-pipes, 9.

Engine House on the Hill: Hand-tub, hose-cart; cotton hose, 500 feet; 1 play-pipe, 4 ladders.

The fires and alarms for the past year, were as follows: May 3d, alarm, chimney burned out in Gray House, Kendall St.— No damage.

July 23d, fire in Carroll stable, Main St. Destroyed.

Nov. 8th, fire in Mrs. Lougee's house, High St. Destroyed.

Dec. 13th, car burned at Station.

March 4th, 1891, fire around pipe in Putnam and White Block.—Slight damage.

In case of two fires coming within a few hours of each other, we would be unable to cope with the second for lack of hose, especially in cold weather, therefore I would recommend that 1,000 feet of new hose be purchased this spring.

I will take this opportunity to thank all who have rendered assistance to the department in any way during the past year.

- ART. 33. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to rent the Lock-up in County Jail, and if so, how much money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.
- ART. 34. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to pay Hamilton Yerxa in part for household goods lost by fire at Poor-house, if so, how much money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.
- ART. 35. To see if the Tewn will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Town bonds issued Dec. 15th, 1890, at a discount, and if so, at what discount.

- ART. 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for building and furnishing a Town H use on Town Farm.
- ART. 37. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairing the White Settlement road.
- ART. 38. To see if the Town will vote to purchase of Frank W. Titcomb, what interest he has in the J. C. Spooner lot, west side Market Square, and if so, how much money the Town will vote to raise for same.
- ART. 39. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairing roads in winter 1891-2.
- ART. 40. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for lighting the Streets of the Village.
- ART. 41. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Street laid out by the Selectmen, March 20th, 1891, over land of the Town, on petition of Geo. A. Jenkins and others.
- ART. 42. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Street laid out by the Selectmen, March 20th, 1891, over land of A. A. Burleigh and others, on petition of A. A. Burleigh and others.
- ART. 43. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the S. S. Committee or Supervisor to sell the Lowrey School Building and Lot.
- ART. 44. To see if the Town will vote to accept seven (7) Streets laid out by Frank W. Pearce in the South Division of Houlton, 28 per Plan and Survey in the Selectinen's Office.
- ART. 45. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectine to appoint some suitable Person Superintendent of the Village Cometery, who shall have charge of all interments therein, and keep a complete record of same, receiving therefor compensation at rates established by the Selectmen, from time to time.
- ART. 46. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Report as published by the Selectmen March 11th, 1891.
