

#### Auditor's Report.

I have examined the books and accounts of the Selectmen and Treasurer for the past year, and find them correctly kept, and agreeing with their statement, as published elsewhere in this report.

The Taxes assessed in 1892, were 26,433.49 and Dog Tax of \$137.00, making \$26,570.49, of which, including the discount, there were paid to the Treasurer, \$18,909.90. The balance, \$7.579.59 Cash tax, and \$81.00 Dog tax, was committed to W. A. Kay, Collector, who has collected and paid to the Treasurer, \$3,480.17. There have also been collected by W. A. Kay, Collector and paid to the Treasurer, \$21.00, Supplementary Tax, and \$63.46 for Interest on Taxes.

#### Report of Supervisor of Schools.

The schools of the town have been in session thirty-four weeks, during the school year, ending March 27th, 1893, except where interruptions from sickness made it impossible.

The village schools have been held thirty-three weeks. This is an increase of two weeks during the past two years; the increase has been brought about without additional appropriations. In fact the appropriations for the past year were less than for several years previous, while the number of schools in the town has been increasing each year.

The pupils have done good work and made commendable progress during the year. In most cases the schools have had the services of the same teachers for the entire year.

An outbreak of scarlet fever made it necessary to close the village schools during the month of June.

The North street schools have been especially unfortunate.— In addition to a second interruption from scarlet fever during September, on Oct. 25th a fire destroyed the west end of the building and the schools were closed five weeks.

The town suffered no loss from this fire, as the building and furniture were fully insured.

The old school-house on the White Settlement road has been replaced by a new one, according to the vote of the town; also a new house built near the Callaghan farm. The upper story of the North street building has been finished and is now occupied by the larger pupils. This was done according to vote of the town, at a special town meeting held August 10th, 1891.

The town is well supplied with school accommodations. However, additional school room will soon be a necessity for the Central village schools. This can best be given by the erection of two or three small school-houses in the different parts of the village for the primary classes.

It has been gratifying to observe a higher average of attendance in the schools during the year. This increase has been

gradually taking place since the erection of the new school buildings.

Since 1889 this town has creeted six new buildings for school purposes, at an expense of \$27,000. Few towns in the State of the size of Houlton afford equal school facilities.

Tuition has been furnished to Free High School scholars, at Ricker Classical Institute according to the terms arranged by vote of the town at the last annual meeting.

The tuition for the year past reached \$1,225.20, and costs the town \$975.20.

All the school bills of the town are paid to date. The number of schools is now larger than ever before. They have been open more weeks during the year, and without impairment of efficiency. There is a balance of \$1,224.09 of school money on hand. (This amount includes \$700.00 that the town received in settlement of damage to the North St. School building by fire. It will be used in repairing the building during the coming summer.) The Supervisor is pleased to report the above condition of our schools, yet the amount appropriated for school purposes should on no account be decreased.

There should be at least thirty-six weeks in the school year. The amount necessary to supply all the public schools of the

town with free text books for the coming year is \$500.00. This amount is small when it is considered that there are nearly 900 scholars in our schools. It is an expense of about 55 cents per scholar, for the entire year and clearly demonstrates the success of the free-text-book law.

Books cost less and better care has been taken of them than formerly.

It is wiser and better to keep the schools in good condition by a liberal policy and judicious expenditure of money now than to strangle and stunt their growth by adopting a too economic policy and by a much larger appropriation in the future endeavor to elevate them to a correct standard.

All children should have equal school advantages from year to year.

#### Report of the Board of Health,

(For the year ending March 10th.)

The Board of Health has official knowledge and records of contagious diseases as follows: Diphtheria—eleven cases, with one death; Scarlet Fever—thirty-eight cases and Typhoid Fever—eleven cases, all of which recovered.

The number of cases of Scarlet Fever reported, however, we are convinced, represent only a portion of the cases which have actually occurred within the town limits. This is explained by the fact that the epidemic has been, fortunately, on the whole, a mild one, and in many cases no physician was employed. This very fact contributed to the wide prevalence of the disease, as parents and others in responsibility, in many cases, in blind confidence that the disease was mild, neglected to use precautions against its spread.

The law of the State is as follows:

"Whenever any householder knows or has reason to believe that any person within his family or household has small-pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, cholera, typhus or typhoid fever, he shall within twenty-four hours give notice thereof to the health officer of the town in which he resides.

"And again, persons recovering from small-pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria, or cholera, and nurses who have been in attendance on any person suffering from any such disease, shall not leave the premises till they have received from the attending physician, board of health or health officer, a certificate that they have taken such precautions, as to their persons, clothing, and all other things which they propose bringing from the premises as are necessary to insure the immunity from infection of other persons with whom they may come in contact."

The maximum fine for violation of this law is fifty dollars.

When we recall the fact that scarlet fever is one of the most fatal diseases with which childhood is afflicted, we can but congratulate the citizens of Houlton that they have passed through such an epidemic without a large mortality.

The appropriation made at last town meeting to be expended on the Bailey Brook was well used in enclosing 485 feet, at the lower end. We recommend an appropriation for the continuance of the work.

#### Chief Engineer's Report.

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Houlton:

I respectfully submit my report as Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, for the past year.

The department is in as good condition as possible from the disadvantages which it labors under. It consists of Chief Engineer, Engineer of Steamer and Assistant, Foreman, First and Second Assistants and 22 men. Also Hook and Ladder Company of 15 men, under Captain James Gillin, which has rendered valuable assistance.

The apparatus is all in good condition and is located as follows:—

Engine House No. 1, Water St: 1 steamer, 3 hose-carts, 1 sled, 1 hook and ladder truck, 9 ladders, 1 Bangor extension ladder, 1 chemical engine; rubber hose, 2,000 ft.; cotton hose, 1,500 ft.; play pipes, 9.

Engine House No. 2, Military St., above C. P. R. Station: Hand tub, hose-cart, 500 ft. hose, 1 play pipe, 4 ladders.

The alarms have been as follows:-

April 15th, 1892, alarm rung at 1 o'clock, A. M.,—house on Elm St. Destroyed.

May 8th, alarm at 8 A. M., - Fire on roof of Kennedy block. Slight damage.

August 28th, alarm rung at 1 A. M.,—fire in Clough's livery stable, on Mechanic St. The fire had made such headway that it was impossible to save the stable. The men worked well, and saved the house closely connected, and many adjoining buildings.

October 3d, alarm rung at 2.30 A. M.,—fire in John Watson's dry house, on west side of the Meduxnekeag. The firemen re-

sponded very promptly, but it was impossible to save the building on account of the combustible nature, but other buildings, one of which was a large store-house, in which was stored many tons of starch, and other valuable property was saved.

October 8th, alarm rung at 1 A. M.,—Leighton store, (so called), on Military St., near old railroad station. Owing to the delay in getting horses, and the bad condition of the roads, the fire was beyond control before the company got there. Good work was done in saving other buildings. The Hook and Ladder Company worked well in pulling down burning walls.

October 18th, alarm rung at 1.30 A. M.,—fire in second story in Merritt's portion of brick block. Fire caught near a large oil tank, and but for the promptness and very excellent work of the men it would have been a very bad fire.

October 25th, alarm at 12.15 P. M.,—the new school building on North St. This was a hard fire to control, owing to the fire having caught in the basement and worked up between the walls, and the anxiety of some of the spectators to take matters into their own hands. Hook and Ladder Company worked well.—Building saved in a damaged condition.

December 25th, alarm rung at 6 P. M.,—fire in store occupied by W. S. Perks, druggist. Department responded promptly and did good work, tearing away wood-work from burning chimney. No water thrown.

January 6th, 1893, alarm rung at 6 A. M.,—Rice house, on Main St., occupied by Jeff Bradbury, caught from defective chimney; extinguished with a few pails of water.

January 14th, alarm rung at 12 m.,—fire on roof of the Houlton cheese factory building, (so-called). Was used as a tenement house. The steamer, 3 hose carts and hook and ladder truck promptly responded, but fire was extinguishd with a few pails of water.

January 23d, an unnecessary alarm at 9 p. m.,—burning chimney on Charles St.

## (WARRANT.)

## To WILLIAM A. KAY, One of the Constables of the Town of Houlton, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said Town of Houlton, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Heywood's Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the Twenty-Seventh day of March, 1893, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, (standard time), to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said Meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to employ a Supervisor of Schools (for the ensuing year) instead of three S. S. Committee.
- ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Liquor Agent or Agents, for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a team to be used in the fire department, and if so, how much money the town will vote to raise for said purpose.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept as town ways, the streets laid out by James Archibald, Ransford Shaw, George A. Hall and George Q. Nickerson, and dedicated to the public for streets, without damage, viz. . Highland Avenue, as shown on plan of "Highland's Addition to the Village of Houlton," made by C. E. F. Stetson, Surveyor, in December, 1892, and on file in the Aroostook Registry of Deeds. Also so much of Washburn street and Maple street as shown on said plan, as extends from said Highland Avenue to North street.

- ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract with parties to build a bridge across the Meduxnekeag Stream, to extend from the foot of Mechanic street to the southerly end of Washburn Avenue, as shown on plan mentioned in Article 6, provided the owners of the Washburn farm will pay to the treasurer of said town, when said bridge is finished, one-third of the amount expended by the town in constructing said bridge and approaches thereto, if so, what sum of money the town will vote to raise for said purpose.
- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor, and other necessary expenses of the town for the ensuing year.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Schools.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of a Free High School for the ensuing year.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to enforce Temperance Instruction in all the Town Schools.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to provide Text Books for Temperance Instruction, in the different Schools of the town.
- ART. 13. To see what instructions, if any, the Town will give to the S. S. Committee or Supervisor, as to the expenditure of High School money.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for extra repairs upon School-houses, and how the same shall be expended.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and direct the School Committee or Supervisor to make such changes in the School Books now used in the town as they may deem expedient.
- ART. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the purchase of School Text Books.
  - ART. 17. To see what instructions the town will vote to

- give the Selectmen in regard to the purchase or establishment of an Electric Fire Alarm and Watchman Time System, and how much money the town will vote to raise for said purpose.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Superintending School Committee or Supervisor relative to furnishing schooling for the families of G. W. Moore and others in the north part of District No. 4, or to take any action whatever relative to the matter, and what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of building a School-house for said families in said District.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to cause the removal of all obstructions in the Public Streets and Sidewalks, or over-hanging the same.
- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to contract with party or parties to build a bridge across the Meduxnekeag Stream, on or near the place where the Putnam bridge now stands, and what sum of money the town will vote to raise for same.
- ART. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repairing and building of Roads, Bridges and Sidewalks, and how the same shall be paid and expended.
- ART. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries.
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Department, and Watchmen.
- ART. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in aid of the Free Public Library in town.
- ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a loan or loans for the purpose of paying the debts of the town.
- ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to make any discount upon taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what per cent.; also to fix a time and rate for interest to be added upon taxes remaining unpaid.

- ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Health Committee to clear that portion of the Bailey Brook which runs through land owned by E. Woodbury, L. B. Johnson and Sarah Gallagher and the outlet of said Brook, and make a sewer of said Brook, and what sum of money the town will raise for same.
- ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen, whereby they have abated the taxes published in the Town Report, March 11th, 1893.
- ART. 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for observing Memorial Day.
- Art. 30. To see what action the Town will take in relation to renting from the Houlton Water Company, six Fire Hydrants, not already leased by the town.
- ART. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for land damages and for the making and opening the road located on the petition of John Poppin and others, by the County Commissioners, August 26, 1891.
- ART. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairing roads in winter 1893-4.
- ART. 33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Lighting the Streets of the Village.
- ART. 34. To see what instructions the Town will vote to give the S. S. Committee or Supervisor in relation to having vocal music taught in the town schools.
- ART. 35. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to repair the Ingersoll road which runs from the North road to Woodford Ketchum's farm.
- ART. 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Weather Signals.
- ART. 37. To see if the Town will vote to allow party or parties to build wooden buildings within the fire district.
- ART. 38. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to abate the poll tax of all persons over sixty years of age.

- ART. 39. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to pay to Jabez Young the amount of money paid by him to the town, for taxes on land which he didn't own when assessed.
- ART. 40. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to build the Jenkins road, running from Military Street to the Cary farm, now owned by G. F. Slipp.
- ART. 41. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to purchase a ferry boat to be used on the Meduxnekeag Stream at Gedney's Ferry.
- ART. 42. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Report as published by the Selectmen, March 11th, 1893.
