Report of Supervisor of Schools.

The schools have progressed during the past year without any interruption. Length of school year, thirty-five weeks. In most cases the teachers of the previous year have been employed, and as a result still better work has been accomplished.

Instruction in vocal music was given to the pupils throughout the town during the summer and fall.

A school-house has been erected on the Foxcroft road, about three and one-half miles from the village, on land purchased from John Campbell.

The school building on North St., damaged by fire, has been thoroughly repaired and is now in good condition.

Tuition has been furnished to Free High School scholars, at Ricker Classical Institute, according to the terms previously arranged by vote of the town.

The new school laws, in so far as they now effect this town, are contained in the following abstract therefrom, viz :—

SEC. 8. The management of the schools and the custody and care of all school property in every town shall devolve upon a superintending school committee consisting of three, five or seven members in each town, as the town may elect, who shall be chosen by ballot at the annual meeting of the town, and shall hold office for three years ; provided, however, that in towns not having such committees when this act becomes a law, the committee then chosen, at their first meeting shall designate by lot a member or members to hold office for one, two and three years respectively, in manner as follows : If consisting of three, one for one year,

one for two years, and one for three years ; if consisting of five, one for one year, two for two years, and two for three years; if consisting of seven, two for one year, two for two years, and three for three years, and they shall certify such designation to the Town Clerk, to be by him recorded. Said committee shall have power to fill vacancies occurring during the interim between annual meetings, and shall annually elect one of its members Supervisor of Schools, who shall be, ex-officio, secretary of the committee, shall make the annual enumeration of scholars required by law, and shall examine the schools and inquire into the regulations and discipline thereof and the proficiency of the scholars, for which purpose he shall visit each school at least twice each term. He shall make all reports and returns relating to the schools of the town which are now or may be required by law to be made by superintending school committees, and perform such other duties as said committee shall direct. Provided, further, that in case the town so authorize, in lieu of the supervisor herein provided for, a superintendent may be elected who may or may not be a member of the committee. Said committee shall serve without pay, but the supervisor, or superintendent by them elected, shall receive for his services such sum as the town shall annually vote therefor, which sum shall in no case be less than two dollars per day for every day of actual service.

Chief Engineer's Report.

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Houlton :

I respectfully submit my report as Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, for the past year.

The department is in as good condition as possible from the disadvantages which it labors under. It consists of Chief Engineer, Engineer of Steamer and Assistant, Foreman, First and Second Assistants and 22 men. Also Hook and Ladder Company of 15 men, under Captain James Gillin, which has rendered valuable assistance.

The apparatus is all in good condition and is located as follows :—

Engine House No. 1, Water St. : 1 steamer, 3 hose-carts, 1 sled, 1 hook and ladder truck, 9 ladders, 1 Bangor extension ladder, 1 chemical engine ; rubber hose, 2,000 ft. ; cotton hose, 1,500 ft. ; play pipes, 9.

Engine House No. 2, Military St., above C. P. R'y Station: Hand tub, hose-cart, 500 feet hose, 1 play pipe, 4 ladders.

The alarms have been as follows :

April 2d, 1893, alarm rung about 6 A. M.,—fire on roof of the Lyman Houlton house, (on the hill). Slight damage.

May 12th, 1893, alarm rung about 1 A. M.,—fire in the old Rukan house, north side Main St., near Catholic church. Destroyed.

May 24th, 1893, alarm rung 11.40 A. M.,—chimney burning out in Feely house on North St.

June 9th, 1893, alarm rung 3.10 P. M.,—fire in Esty's woolen mill, on North St. The department responded and got to work very promptly, thereby saving a bad fire.

June 24th, 1893, alarm rung at 12.20 P. M.,—fire in Titcomb's dry house, adjoining mill. The department responded promptly and did good work saving mill and lumber.

October 16th, 1893, alarm rung at 12.10 A. M.,—fire in Union Block, Main St. The department responded very promptly, but the fire had been burning in the attic, undiscovered, for hours, and owing to the smoke and hot air being confined, it soon raised the roof and the result was we had a bad fire to contend with, as it was all through the entire block. The firemen worked nobly and after a long, hard fight succeeded in confining the fire to that block.

October 23d, 1893, alarm rung at 10 P. M.,—chimney on fire in Putnam & Rice Block.

January 25th, 1894, alarm rung at 6 P. M.,—fire in Merritt's potato house, at C. P. R'y station. The department responded, but for lack of water were unable to do much.

February 24th, 1894, alarm rung at 2.30 P. M.,—chimney burning in Snell House.

March 7th, 1894, alarm rung at 4.15 A. M.,—fire in Spencer house, near R. C. I. Department responded promptly and succeeded in saving main house. Ell and barn destroyed.

I would recommend that the town build a large reservoir, at the corner of Main St. and Foxcroft Road, near H. C. Bradbury's store.

Report of the Board of Health.

(For the year ending March 10th.)

About the usual number of complaints of alleged nuisances have been made to the Board of Health during the year, all of which have been looked after by one or more members. In nearly all cases our requests and recommendations have been complied with. In a number of instances in which no complaint has been made, where circumstances required, we have requested owners of property to clean up their premises and do away with nuisances, and as a rule they have cheerfully complied.

During the year ending March, 1st, there were reported one case of Diphtheria, which recovered; twelve cases of Scarlet Fever, most of which were of a mild type, and all of which recovered; and seventy cases of Typhoid Fever, with five deaths.

A certain number of cases of Typhoid Fever originated out of town, among railroad employees and men working in the woods, and were brought here, but the large proportion occurred among residents of the town. Without doubt drinking impure well water was responsible for a large number of cases. In the opinion of the board another epidemic of Typhoid Fever is imminent during the coming season and it behooves our citizens to be on their guard and take all possible precautions to protect themselves. Impure drinking water causes the great proportion of Typhoid cases and water from springs and wells against which stands the slightest suspicion should be carefully avoided.

Our efforts to properly quarantine cases of contagious dis-

eases and disinfect premises have been generally unopposed, though we feel that a large proportion of people do not appreciate the importance of such measures, and some instances have occurred, especially in case of Scarlet Fever, in which disease has been communicated, which might have been avoided by the exercise of greater precautions on the part of those most directly interested.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said Town of Houlton, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Heywood's Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the Twenty-Sixth day of March, 1894, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, (standard time), to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said Meeting.

ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor, and other necessary expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Schools.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of a Free High School for the ensuing year, and how the same shall be expended.

ART. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairs upon School-houses, and how the same shall be expended.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the purchase of School Text Books.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the services of the Supervisor of schools.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repairing and building of Roads, Bridges and Sidewalks, and how the same shall be paid and expended.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for sidewalks and roads in winter 1894-5.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to repair the Ingersoll road which runs from the North road to Woodford Ketchum's farm.

ART. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the making and opening the road located by the County Commissioners, November 27, 1891, on petition dated September 14, 1891, running southerly from the east terminus of Pearce Avenue, (so-called), in Houlton village, across Lots 28 and 29, to Hodgdon line.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following streets laid out by Cleveland, Ludwig and Kidder, and dedicated to the town without damage, viz: Columbia St., Brook St., Franklin St. and Cleveland St.; as shown on plan on file in Aroostook Registry of Deeds, said Cleveland, Ludwig and Kidder to reserve the right to dig trenches and lay down water pipes in said streets to convey water from a spring on their land.

ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following streets laid out by James Archibald, Ransford Shaw, George A. Hall and George Q. Nickerson, and dedicated to the public for streets, without damage, viz: Highland Avenue, as shown on plan of "Highland's Addition to the Village of Houlton," made by C. E. F. Stetson, Surveyor, in December, 1892, and on file in the Aroostook Registry of Deeds. Also so much of Washburn street and Maple street as shown on said plan, as extends from said Highland Avenue to North street.

ART. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for rocks for county work yard.

ART. 16. To see what instructions the Town will vote to give the Selectmen in regard to widening and grading the road at

each end of the iron bridge, and what sum of money the town will vote to raise for land damages and grading.

ART. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to build the arch-culvert on Military street, in addition to the amount raised in October, 1893.

ART. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for rent of hall and lockers for National Guards of Houlton.

ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to employ a physician to attend the poor and what sum of money the town will vote to raise for his services.

ART. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Department, and Watchmen.

ART. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for reservoir, to be located near the engine house and Foxcroft road.

ART. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for observing Memorial day.

ART. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Lighting the Streets of the Village.

ART. 25. To see what instructions the Town will vote to give the S. S. Committee and Supervisor in relation to having vocal music taught in the town schools.

ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the list of Jurors prepared by the Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Clerk.

ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a loan or loans for the purpose of paying the debts of the town.

ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to make any discount upon taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what per cent. ; also to fix a time and rate for interest to be added upon taxes remaining unpaid.

ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to abate the poll tax of all persons over sixty years of age.

ART. 30. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen, whereby they have abated the taxes published in the Town Report, March 10th, 1894.

ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Report as published by the Selectmen, March 10th, 1894.
