

Auditor's Report.

I have examined the books and accounts of the Selectmen and Treasurer for the past year, and find them kept in a correct and business-like manner, and agreeing with their statements, as published elsewhere in this report.

The Taxes assessed in 1894, were \$33,512.88, and Supplementary Tax of \$19.29, making \$33,532.17, of which including the discount, there was paid to the Treasurer, \$25,414.-26. The balance, \$8,117.91 was committed to W. A. Kay, Collector, who has collected and paid to the Treasurer, \$3,-258.65. There has also been collected by W. A. Kay, Collector, and paid to the Treasurer, \$100.00, for Interest on Taxes of 1893.

Report of Supervisor of Schools.

The total number of pupils registered during the year in all the schools of the town was 979. They ranged in age from 5 to 20. The following table gives the number in each school: First Primary.....93 Third Primary 45 Junior Intermediate (2 schools)....92 Free High School.....73 School No. " ٤. " " 4.....16, Foxcroft (old house.) ... " ... " " " 7 (2 schools).... 119, North St. •• " " " " " 10.....10, Lowrey. " " 11.....9. Conlogue. " " 12.....10, Johnson. " " 13.....14, Foxcroft.

The schools of the town have been in session thirty-four weeks, during the school year ending March 24th, 1895. The pupils have done good work, as a rule, and have made commendable progress. In some schools advancement has been hindered by the fact that individual instruction has been rendered impossible by the very large attendance of pupils. This is the case in the Central Building. The teachers are now unable to give that attention to individual work that is necessary for the proper advancement of every scholar.

The committee found at the beginning of the fall term that the Central brick school building could not accommodate the pupils of this village. The seating capacity of this school house is about 360. There were in attendance nearly 500 pupils. Arrangements were finally made whereby one entire grade, the third primary, should be housed and instructed at Ricker Classical Institute for the remainder of the year. This, however, is but a temporary arrangement. It gave some relief to the schools at the Central Building, but even now every foot of space is taken. All of the rooms are over-crowded. We have been unable to enforce the truant laws on account of lack of room, and as a result children can be seen daily on our streets, who should be at school receiving an education.

There are to-day 200 scholars in this village without proper school room accommodations.

In fact a condition of things exists that should not be tolerated by the citizens of this town.

We recommend that two wooden school houses be erected in the different portions of the village for the primary classes; and that the sum of \$5,000 be appropriated for this purpose.

This will reduce the attendance at the Central Building to what it should be; relieve the crowded condition of the hill school and furnish school room for those scholars who have not been attending school during the past year.

The amount necessary to supply all the public schools of the town with free text books for the coming year is estimated at \$750.

This amount is small when it is considered that there are nearly 1,000 scholars in our schools. It is an expense of about 75 cents per scholar for the entire year.

The school buildings throughout the town are now in good condition. Some repairs, however, will be necessary, especcially upon the Donovan school house.

The old school house on the Foxcroft road would accommodate more families if it were located nearer the village.

We recommend that this building be moved about one mile farther south on the Foxcroft road, to a point at or near the junction of the two roads; and that a suitable lot be secured for this purpose. In this location it will accommodate scholars who are now attending the hill school and thus reduce its numbers, which are far in excess of its seating capacity.

The school house near the Town Farm was burned May 12th. It was insured for \$250. A new building has been erected, located on the Deasy farm, at a place more convenient for the majority of the people. The school has been in session twenty-three weeks since Sept. 17th.

The voters of the town are asked to take action toward the

disposal of the old school lot, for which there is a standing offer of \$25.

At the beginning of the present school year, it was deemed advisable to employ a male teacher as principal of the grammar school, who should have the general government of the entire building. Mr. Winfield S. Webb took charge of the schools at the commencement of the fall term. Results have shown the wisdom of this course.

Tuition has been furnished to Free High School scholars at Ricker Classical Institute, according to the terms arranged by vote of the town at the last annual meeting. Attendance for the year was as follows: 62 at the summer term; 71 at the fall term; 67 at the winter term. Cost to the town, \$1,000: to the State, \$250. Total, \$1,250.

Report of Board of Health.

There have been reported to the Board during the year, the following cases of contagious diseases :

Typhoid Fever, 28 cases, with 1 death; Scarlet Fever, 3 cases, with no deaths; Diphtheria, 4 cases, with 1 death.

Exactly how many other cases have occurred which have not been reported, we are unable to state, but a number of instances have come to our knowledge in which physicians have neglected to report according to law.

About fifty nuisances of an unhealthy nature have been visited and attended to, such as uncleaned vaults, impure wells, refuse heaps, etc. All cases complained of have been visited by one member of the Board, at least, and in most cases by all the members, besides many cases which came within our knowledge without complaint by others. Furthermore, several tours of inspection have been made by the Board as a body through the now thickly populated portions of the village, and the owners of nuisances notified of their existence, when found. Our requests have always been cheerfully complied with and we are pleased to hereby make acknowledgment of the fact.

Chief Engineer's Report.

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Houlton:

I respectfully submit my report as Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, for the past year.

The department is in its usual good condition. It consists of Chief Engineer, Assistant Chief, Engineer of Steamer, and Assistant; Foreman, First and Second Assistants. and 22 men. Hook and Ladder Co.—Capt., J. H. Wingate, Foreman and 13 men. Apparatus in good condition.

The alarms have been as follows:

April 9, 1894, alarm about 10 A. M.,—fire on roof of Stimson's house on Kelleran St.; roof badly damaged. Cause, sparks from chimney.

Oct. 5, 1894, alarm rung 5 P. M.,—fire in Ora Gilpatrick's house on North St.; no damage; caused by children playing with matches.

Oct. 7, 1894, alarm at 4 P. M.,—fire in J. H. McPartland's stable on Court St.; company responded promptly, but stable and shed were badly damaged, owing to poor pressure of water; cause unknown.

Dec. 29, 1894, alarm at 5.30 P. M.,—fire in building occupied by C. H. Smith, rear of Times office; fire confined to building; cause defective flue.

Dec. 31, 1894, alarm 5.20 p. m.,—fire in Risteen's potato house near C. P. R. Station. Total loss.

Jan. 6, 1895, alarm 4 P. M.,—chimney in R. W. Shaw's house Military St.; no damage.

March, 12, 1895, alarm 10 A. M.,—fire over Donovan's Grocery Store in the G. A. Hall building on Kendall St.; no damage.

Also several false alarıns.

I would here recommend a pair of horses, and a hose cart with capacity of 1000 feet of hose. As it is now, it takes so long to haul the apparatus to a fire, and tires the men out so, it is wonderful that we ever conquer any fire. I would also recommend that the town purchase a vehicle for conveying ladders to fires that may occur during the winter months.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said Town of Houlton, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Heywood's Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the Twentyfifth day of March, 1895, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, (standard time), to act upon the following articles, to wit:---

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said Meeting.

ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor, and other necessary expenses of the town for the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Schools.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of a Free High School for the ensuing year, and how the same shall be expended.

ART. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairs upon School houses, and how the same shall be expended.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the purchase of School Text Books.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the services of the Supervisor of Schools.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the S.S. Committee to contract with party or parties to build two school houses in the village, also to purchase suitable lots for same, and if so, what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the S. S. Committee to purchase a lot on the Foxcroft road, and to move the Bray school house on to said lot, and if so, what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and convey to John McHugh, the lot of land on which the school house formerly stood in the Poor Farm District.

ART. 12. To see what instructions the Town will vote to give the S. S. Committee and Supervisor in relation to having vocal music taught in the town schools.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen not to grant license to parties running billiard saloons, and bowling alleys in the town.

ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen, and Town Agent, to prosecute all parties running billiard saloons, bowling alleys and gambling houses in the town.

ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Seclectmen not to grant license to Agents of Circuses and Wild West Shows, Merry-go-rounds and Skating Rinks.

ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Town Agent to prosecute all persons in town who violate the prohibitory liquor law, during the municipal year 1895.

ART. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Department, and Watchmen.

ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase a pair of horses, a hose wagon, a ladder sled and harnesses for the fire department, and if so, what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to contract with the Houlton Water Company to furnish a water supply for the protection of property in the town against fire and to provide and maintain for a term of years from April 1, 1895, six or more good and effective hydrants along the lines of the water supply pipes of said company; said hydrants to be in addition to those already rented by the town, and if so, what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase a Steam Fire Engine, and if so, what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for observing Memorial day.

ART. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for rent of hall lockers, etc., for National Guards of Houlton. ART. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise-for rocks for county work yard.

ART. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Lighting the Streets of the Village.

ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town Agent to examine the records and ascertain whether or not the road leading from North Street near Watson's Starch Factory to the Meduxnekeag stream is a public way, and if so to instruct him to prosecute parties for closing up said way.

ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize or instruct the Selectmen to contract with party or parties to build a bridge across the Meduxnekeag stream, to extend from the foot of Mechanic Street to the southerly end of Highland Avenue as shown on plan of "Highlands addition to the village of Houlton" made by C. E. F. Stetson, Surveyor, and on file in the Aroostook Registry of Deeds, and if so, what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for sprinkling the Streets in the village, and what Streets the Town will vote to have sprinkled.

ART. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repairing and building of Roads, Bridges and Sidewalks, and how the same shall be paid and expended.

ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to keep the Sidewalks in the village open during the winter of 1895–6, and if so, to instruct the Selectmen what ones to keep open and what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the purpose of keeping the roads open during the winter of 1895-6.

ART. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the making and opening the road located by the County Commissioners, November 27, 1891, on petition dated September 14, 1891, running southerly from the east terminus of Pearce Avenue, (so-called,) in Houlton village, across Lots 28 and 29, to Hodgdon line.

ART. 32. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to contract with parties to take away the Mansur Bridge and to build a bridge where it now stands, and if so, how much money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose. ART. 33. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase three gravel lots, one of N. Herrin, one of T. Travis and one of M. D. & A. T. Putnam, and if so, what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 34. To see what instructions the Town will vote to give the Selectmen in regard to allowing fast driving across the Iron Bridge.

ART. 35. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase granite curbing for sidewalks, and if so, what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to build the Dykeman road and for land damages.

ART. 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the road located by the Selectmen, Murch 9, 1895, on petition of John D. Hackett and others, and if so, what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for land damages and to build said road.

ART. 38. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to contract with parties, to take away the Hammond Mill Bridge and to build a bridge where it now stands, and if so, how much money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 39. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries.

ART. 40. To see if the Town will vote to pay to J. A. Millar and W. S. Perks a sum of money for work and materials for sewer, and if so how much money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 41. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise in aid of the Aroostook Mutual Telephone company, provided said company establishes a telephone exchange in the Town.

ART. 42. To see what instructions the Town will vote to give to the Health Committee and Town Agent, in regard to enforcing the law compelling physicians and others to report all deaths and births to the Town Clerk, and all contagious diseases to the Health Committee.

ART. 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a loan or loans for the purpose of paying the debts of the Town. ART. 44. To see if the Town will vote to make any discount upon taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what per cent.; also to fix a time and rate for interest to be added upon taxes remaining unpaid.

ART. 45. To see if the Town will vote to employ a physician to attend the poor and what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for his services.

ART. 46. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to abate the poll tax of all persons over sixty years of age.

ART. 47. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen, whereby they have abated the taxes published in the Town Report, March 11th, 1895.

ART. 48. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Report as published by the Selectmen, March 11th, 1895.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Selectmen's Office, in said Town, on the 21st, 22d and 23d days of March, 1895, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, (standard time), for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
