Mr. James H. Sinclair who has faithfully served the town as night warchman and police officer for many years, was stricken with paralysis while on duty; and is still confined to his bed. His is a very deserving case, and we trust the town can and will do something for his relief.

The old Cemetery on Cook Hill was cared for as usual. At the Foxcroft Cemetery, besides the usual work, the stones were straightened up and fences repaired. In Evergreen Cemetery the work of cleaning out more of the old roads was continued; trees, fences, walks, roads and lots received due attention, and additional pipe was laid where most needed.

As per vote of the Town, the Selectmen bought the Monson farm, so-called, for \$1450 oo, containing some sixty acres. About nineteen acres of it was seeded down and the barn thereon repaired. The rents received from the property have more than paid fair interest on the purchase price, This year purt of it can be lotted off, as needed, for cemetery purposes.

To do this, for fences and general cemetery work, we recommend \$500 00 be raised.

Six additional rooms have been funished off at the Almshouse this year in the third floor, and, a fire escape from this floor is in process of construction. Each year finds a larger number cared for at the town farm and this must be expected as the town grows. Calls for help off the farm have also been large this year; and it seems anomalous that our pauper bills should be largest when we are having so-called "Prosperous times."

For support of the poor, including pauper insane, we recommend the sum of \$3000 00.

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There are more than eighty miles of highways, some twelve miles of sidewalks, and forty-two bridges, large and small, in our town to look after and keep in repair each year. We respectfully call your attention to the fact, that, during the five years, one as Selectman and four as Road Commissioner, Mr. Edblad has had charge of same ; the appropriations for road work have not been overdrawn ; and no defect, causing injury or legal claim for damages against the Town, has occurred. There has been much work to do, considerable of it new work, like concrete for sidewalks, and in our judgement the work has been done well.

The nature of our soil makes our road work more difficult and expensive than it is in most places. Ordinarily we estimate \$2500 00 required for sidewalks and bridges, and \$3000 00 for highways. This year we think a little more should be appropriated, to enable us to build a piece of Macadam Road. The total appropriations for roads, bridges and sidewalks last year, including \$2000 raised for Rock Crusher, and \$600 for Road Commissioner, was\$3300. For the coming year we recommend the sum of \$6800 00 be raised, the same to include pay of Road Commissioner. We further recommend \$450 00 be raised to repaint our two Iron Bridges and \$200 be raised for the "State Road" under the proper articles in the Warrant.

There are now 1430 books in the Library. Of these 65 were presented, and 178 purchased by the Trustees, during the past year. There is an increasing call for books; and the better to accommodate its patrons, the Library. by vote of the Trustees, after about April 10th, will be open Monday, Wednesday and Saturday afternoons from 2 to 5 o'clock and on Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday evenings, from 7 to 8 o clock—except holidays. During the year 1901, nine thousand thirty-two books were taken out, being an average of 90 bookseach Library day, or rather half day, and an increase of 226 over the preceding year.

This means that every book in our Library, on an average, has been out six and one half times, during the past year. Many of the books, since placed on the shelves, have been taken out from 50 to 70 times each, and are much worn and have been rebound. Among books, recently sent to book-binder, was one, presented to the Library by one of our townsmen, which had been taken 73 times since January 3, 1900. This was a good book. It shows how many peorle can be reached by the Library at a small expense 1 and is stated here as an example of the benefit and advantage of a Free Public Library to our community.

We recommend the usual \$300.00 appropriation.

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Houlton :

I respectfully submit my report as Chief Engineer of the Fire Department for the past year :

The alarms have been as follows :---

April 12, 1901-Slight blaze on roof of Union Square Hotel. No damage.

April 17, 1901-W. R. Dresser's cooper shop near B. & A. station. Total loss.

April 21, 1901-Chimney Hotel Exchange. No damage.

May 2, 1901—Harrigan house near B. & A. station. No damage.

May 24, 1901—A. A. Hutchinson house on North street. No damage.

June 2, 1901—Baptist Parsonage chimney. No damage.

June 3, 1901-C. Niles store, North street. Main building badly damaged.

July 4, 1901—Fire on the dump near McCluskey Bros. stable.

July 17, 1901—Snell House, fire round stove in kitchen. Slight damage.

July 28, 1901—Fire in boiler room at Titcomb's mill. Owing to quick response of Department a bad fire was averted, with slight damage.

Oct. 17, 1901—Iott house on Flat, so called. Slight damage.

Nov. 10, 1901—Chimney in Gray block, Main street. No damage.

Nov. 11, 1901—Building owned by John Watson on Putnam street, known as old laundry building. No damage.

Dec. 7, 1901—E. A. Lowe house, high street, fire round chimney. Slight damage.

Dec. 11, 1901—Box car at B. & A. station. Slight damage.

Dec. 26, 1901—Williard H. Putnam house, Putnam street. Fire caught from burning chimney. Small damage.

Jan. 13. 1902--Alarm rung 10.20 p.m. Fire in Frisbie's brick block. Although this fire had a big start before the alarm was given and it was a very hard fire to fight, the Department was just one hour and ten minutes putting it completely out, as the water was turned off at 11.30 p. m. Upper rear part of building quite badly damaged and stock in stores badly damaged by water, Feb. 4,—Alarm rung 1.30 a. m. Fire in Millar's brick block. Owing to the Department's very quick response what would have been a total loss to building and stock was changed to a quite badly damaged building and total loss to stock of J. A. Millar. The boot and shoe store of A. T. Smith received only small damage by water.

REPORT OF ROAD COMMISSIONER.

To the Citizens of Houlton, Me.

I herewith respectfully submit to you, my report, for the past year as Road Commissioner.

The past year has been favorable in some respects regarding the highway. We had a favorable summer without much wet weather, but the past winter has given us several heavy storms that cost money to overcome.

The streets and country roads were put in as good condition, with use of road machines and afterwards by hauling of gravel as it was possible with available funds.

Am very sorry to say that some of our townspeople find so much fault that more money is not expended on our streets. If they would stop to consider the matter in its true light I think they will agree to the fact that the people of the country are also entitled to some considerations. They help pay the expenses and have their hauling to do over the country roads to get to market. The appropriation for this work could not be made large enough to do all this work to suit all.

Bridges.

The bridge at foot of Mechanic street was replanked this season and we used 21000 feet spruce plank on this job

Bridge on Columbia street also one on Green street across Pearce brook was recovered, also one bridge on Ludlow road, one on County road at Moose Brook and one at Cary's Mills, besides minor repairs on others.

Next season a new bridge will have to be built across Pearce Brook on Franklin street and bridge across Cook's Brook on Hovey road is badly in need of repairs. The last named structure would have received attention last fall but lumber could not be procured.

Culverts.

We have put in 15 new culverts this season as follows: County road 3. Letter B road 2. Columbia street 1. Woodstock road 2. Burleigh street 1. Callaghan road 4. Lowrey road 2. In all of the above the material has been cedar.

Concrete has been laid on the following streets :

There is on the Town lot 9,000 feet hemlock plank bought this winter and paid for, for use this spring as none can be had from the mills until the mill men get their drives in.

Have bought three new improved snowplows this season for use on sidewalks and they proved to be a good investment and will make a saving of expense each year.

Rock Crusher.

After careful consideration of your Selectmen a Rock Crusher was bought from the Acme Road Machine Company and it proved to be a first class outfit. It does good work, has plenty of power and is capable of crushing the very hardest rock obtainable.

The cost of machinery used up the appropriation, and the expense of setting same up, building of storage bins, enclosing engine &c. was paid out of the highway fund. There was not enough of that fund available to warrant any extended work with the Crusher this year. Everything is in shape to start at any time and I hope to see lots of rock crushed next season for I firmly believe it a move in the right direction.

Tools.

The Town of Houlton owns today as good set of tools of various kinds for highway purposes as any town of its size needs to have. They are all in good condition except one road machine which will need a number of new repairs this spring before being put to work.

All tools were properly painted and housed last summer. Not having storage room for tools elsewhere I rented a place from Mrs. S. F. Austin paying a rental of \$15.00 per year for same. It will be a pleasure to me to hand a list to my successor of all tools belonging to this department and show him where they all are to be found.

I respectfully refer you to the report of Selectmen when you will find an accurate account of all money expended by me the past year. All bills contracted in this department the past year are paid up to and including February 22, 1902, in full.

REPORT OF S. S. COMMITTEE.

In conformance with an annual custom, the members of the Board of Education present a brief statement of the operations of the school department for the fiscal year ending March 1st, 1902.

There has been no change from the general policy of previous years, of sufficient importance to require extended mention. The report of the Selectmen contains a full account of the expenditures of the school funds.

The Lowrey, Moose Brook and Foxcroft schools have been closed the entire year. These schools are not able to maintain an average attendance of 8 scholars as required by law. The children in these localities are conveyed to the village schools at the expense of the town.

The past school year has consisted of 34 weeks. The attendance in most schools has been good, although in some instances, sickness has interfered.

The primary and intermediate schools of the village were closed for several weeks during the fall term owing to scarlet fever.

The school houses throughout the town are all in fairly good condition. Painting and general repairs however will be required upon some of the buildings during the summer.

In conclusion we are pleased to call attention to the evidence of increasing interest in educational matters, shown by some of our citizens. We wish that this interest might become more general. The schools are theirs. They should visit and criticize them, but in a kindly spirit. They should make the acquaintance of the teachers, assist them in understanding their children, and by so doing they will contribute very materially to the better and more satisfactory results for which all are so desirous.

Free High School.

A catalogue of the Houlton High School will be published in a few weeks that will give a full and accurate account of all matters pertaining to our High School.

We make simply the following report at this time.

The teachers are :--

Fred W. Burrill, A. B., Bates College, Principal. Mathematics, Sciences and Greek.

Mabel A. Harris, A. B., Smith College, English and Music.

Marion Rockwood, A. B., Wellesley College. Latin, German and Mathematics.

Mrs. Belle L. Briggs. French and History.

Mr. Burrill has supervision over the four Grammar schools in addition to his other duties. Likewise Miss Harris devotes one-third of her time to the Grammar grades. Thus it will be readily seen that a part of the salaries paid our High School teachers should be properly paid by the common school fund.

There are three regular courses of study. The English course is intended to give those students who do not intend to continue their studies beyond this school, a thorough training in the common English branches and also in the Sciences and higher English. Realizing the deficiency of students of the present time, in their ability to write and speak the English language well, an effort has been made to give as thorough a course in English Grammar, Rhetoric and Literature as possible.

The Latin Scientific course includes the study of Latin in addition to English and the Sciences. The College Preparatory course prepares pupils for admission to any college in this State. Music continues to be taught in our High and Grammar schools. Daily lessons are given in each room of these grades. We have also made a beginning of a library and of proper apparatus for scientific study for our schools.

During the past summer a spacious room was finished in the third floor of the High School building and fitted up for practical, individual work in chemistry.

Examinations for certificates of admission to Free High School were held June 17 and Sept. 6, 1901.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

The Board of Health of the Town of Houlton respectfully submit their annual report for the municipal year ending February 28, 1902, as follows;

The only contagious diseases reported to the Board for the year are diphtheria, typhoid fever, and scarlet fever. Chapter 139 of the laws of 1895 makes it the duty of physicians and householders to report cases of meningitis, measles, membraneous croup, and consumption to the Board of Health but no such cases have been reported.

Our records show three (3) cases of diphtheria with no deaths, thirty-one (31) cases of typhoid fever with no deaths, and seventeen (17) cases of scarlet fever with two deaths.

During the summer of 1901 we were considerably alarmed by the report that small pox had broken out in the neighboring county of Carleton in New Brunswick. Immediate steps were taken in co-operation with the State Board, to prevent, if possible, the introduction of the disease into this vicinity. Consultations were had with the local boards in the neighboring towns and a quarantine line was established along the whole border from Houlton to Mars Hill. We were assisted also by the Woodstock Board in getting information. The disease is said to have been brought east by a man who had escaped from quarantine in Colorado. We found it very difficult to manage the quarantine owing to the fact that the cases were all exceptionally light and many refused to believe that it was small-pox. However, although there were 60 or more cases reported in the Province, not a single case was found on the Maine side of the Boundary.

It was found necessary to purchase this year a new apparatus for the manufacture of formaldehyde gas, for disinfecting purposes as it is occasionally necessary to use two at the same time.

WARRANT.

To WILLIAM H. GUIOU, one of the Constables of the Town of Houlton, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Houlton, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at Heywood's Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the twenty-fourth day of March, 1902, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit :

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more Road Commissioners, and what sum of money will be raised for services of said commissioner.

ART. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor, and other necessary expenses of the Town for the ensuing year.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

ART. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairs upon school houses and how the same shall be expended.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the purchase of school text-books.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the services of the Superintendent of Schools.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of a free high school for the ensuing year.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to pay Insurance on school buildings.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the repairing and building of roads, bridges and sidewalks.

ART. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to repaint our two Iron Bridges.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to be expended on the "State Road" under Chapter 285 of the Public Laws of 1901.

ART. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Fire Department, Watchmen, and rent of hydrants.

ART. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for lighting the streets of the village, town hall, engine house and town lock-up.

ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to keep the sidewalks in the village open during the winter of 1902-1903 and if so, to instruct the Selectmen what ones to keep open and what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for said purpose.

ART. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Houlton (Free) Public Library.

ART. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for observing Memorial Day.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Militia purposes.

ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a loan or loans for the purpose of paying the debts of the town.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for cemeteries.

ART. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise toward paying off the town debt.

ART. 23. To see if the Town will make and adopt the following by-law and ordinance respecting and regulating the measure and sale of wood, brought to market, in said town of Houlton.

SEC. 1. All wood sold or offered for sale in the town of Houlton, shall, before delivery, be surveyed by a sworn surveyor thereof.

SEC. 2. Any person who shall be guilty of a violation of this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay a fine of not less than one, nor more than twenty dollars, upon each and every conviction thereof, to be recovered for the use of the town, upon complaint before any Trial Justice.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the whole or any part of the stock of the Houlton Water Company, and will authorize and empower the Selectmen or a Committee of Citizens duly elected, for and in behalf of the Town, to do any and all needful acts and things, and to make and execute all papers, necessary therefor.

ART. 25. To see if the Town, for the purpose of purchasing and owning stock in the Houlton Water Company, will vote to issue bonds of the town to an amount not exceeding forty-five thousand dollars bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually and maturing in not more than thirty years from May 1st, 1902, and whether the Town will authorize the Selectmen to fix the date, amount, form, denomination, rate of interest and maturity of such bonds, and in behalf of the Town to execute, issue and negotiate the same.

ART. 26. To see if it is the expression of the Town to purchase the stock, plant and franchise of the Houlton Sewerage Company, and to authorize the Selectmen to get a proper enabling act, if necessary, from the next legislature to effect the same.

ART. 27. To see if the Town will accept from Mrs. Louisa Powers and Mrs. Caroline Jefferds, a deed of a parcel of land, 12 I-2 feet wide by 65 feet long, lying on the west side of and adjacent to Evergreen Cemetery, in which the remains of Joseph Houlton (for whom the town was named) and his descendants are now buried, on condition that the same shall become a part of, and be included in said Evergreen Cemetery and be cared for by the Town in like manner as the rest of said Cemetery.

ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to purchase for town purposes, a parcel of land bounded east by Mechanic street, south by land of Sarah F. Lunt. west by the Town hall lot and north by a line parallel with the north line of said Town lot and what sum of money the Town will raise therefor.

ART. 29. To see if the Town will accept the road, being a continuation of the Hovey road, so-called, as laid out by the Selectmen and made during the summer of 1901, across lots 11 and 5 in the South Division of Houlton.

ART. 30. To see if the Town will furnish a "public dump" ground for the use of the town and its citizens and will make proper rules and regulations as to same.

ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to make any discount upon taxes paid at such time or times as it may determine, and if so, what per cent.; also to fix a time and rate for interest to be added upon taxes remaining unpaid.

ART. 32. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen, whereby they have abated the taxes published in the Town Report, March 1st, 1902.

ART. 33. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance regulating driving of hacks and other public carriages for hire.

SEC. 1. No person shall drive any hack or other public carriage or vehicle transporting passengers, from place to place, in said Houlton, without first obtaining from the municipal officers of the Town a written permit there for.

SEC. 2. The Municipal officers may grant such permit to such persons as they deem proper on payment of such reasonable fee for the use of the town and under such restrictions as they shall think just and right. SEC. 3. Any person violating Section One of this ordinance shall forfeit to the town, a sum not less than Five, nor more than Twenty dollars, for each offence, to be recovered in an action of debt or on complaint before any Trial Justice.

ART. 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Report as published by the Selectmen, March 1st., 1902.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Selectmen's office in said Town, on the 20th, 21st and 22d days of March, 1902, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
