To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman Plantation:

I herewith submit my annual report of the condition of our schools. In comparison with many other towns and cities of the State, we have been very fortunate in being able to carry on our school work without serious interruption from influenza or other epidemics. There has of course, been some absence on this account, but not to greatly interfere with the work of the year, consequently, if we are spared a further visitation, we shall accomplish the usual amount of work without especial difficulty. In general the condition of our schools is excellent, we have an efficient corps of teachers, the discipline is good, and with the exception of a few pupils whose attendance is poor or who are lacking in interest, satisfactory progress is being made.

HIGH SCHOOL

The spring term was held at the Station schoolhouse as during the past two years. Both the location and arrangement of the building were unsatisfactory, and it was seen by all interested in the school that its future success depended in a considerable measure on a more central and suitable location. During the summer an arrangement was made with Moose River whereby the two plantations should unite in the support of a high school to be centrally located as possible, which

should offer both the Commercial and College Preparatory The joint committee was most fortunate in being able to secure the former residence of Mr. Abram Newton for Its location is excellent and the arthe use of the school. rangement of rooms very convenient. Our course of study has been approved by the State Department of Education, and the school awarded a class A rating, which releases both plantations from all tuition claims, and enables graduates of the College Preparatory course to enter the University of Maine without examination. Graduates of both courses are eligible to take the State examinations for elementary teachers certifi-The present school year has thus far then been an unqualified success, and it is highly desirable the present union of the two plantations for the support of a high school be continued as in this way both plantations have the advantages of a much better school than it would be practical for either to maintain alone, on account of expense.

PAYSON SMITH SCHOOL

The Grammar school is in charge of Miss Clara Libby, who is a first class teacher in all respects. The room is quiet and orderly and the pupils are making good progress. At present there are four pupils in the ninth grade which should mean four freshmen for the high school next year. In the Primary room we are still fortunate enough to retain Mrs. Williams the high quality of whose work is well known to all. The children in this room are doing excellent work with the exception of those whose attendance is too erratic to make satisfactory results possible.

STATION SCHOOL

Several changes have taken place here. All the children have been put in charge of one teacher in the south room, the steam heating plant has been abandoned in favor of a box stove and chemical closets installed in place of the flush system to avoid freezing. The results on the whole have been pleasing. Miss Kennedy has her school well in hand, and is securing good results. The heating of the school room is more within the

bounds of possibility, and the operating expense much less than in previous years.

ATTENDANCE

This is still unsatisfactory; I know of no one thing more needed at present to enable us to get the full benefit, of our school money than a more rigid enforcement of the truancy law. Expert teachers and the best of text books and equipment cannot greatly benefit children who are absent frequently and consequently have little interest and no connected idea of the work.

REPAIRS

On account of the extremely high cost of labor and materials, no important repairs have been made during the past, or are contemplated for the coming year. Experience has shown however, that from \$100.00 to \$200.00 is needed annually on this account to meet the incidental expenses of up-keep.

Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

To John A. Burke, Constable of the Plantation of Jackman in the County of Somerset

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Plantation, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Jackman Hall, in said Jackman, on the twenty-fourth day of March, A. D. 1919, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, viz:—

- Art. 1—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2—To choose a Plantation Clerk, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor and all other officers required by law to be chosen at the annual March meeting.
- Art. 3—To see if the Plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways and bridges in said Plantation and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 4—To see if the Plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State aid on unimproved roads under the patrol system.
- Art. 5—To see if the Plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Plantation to State aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 6—To see if the Plantation will appropriate and raise the sum of thirty dollars for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the Plantation is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 7—To see what sum of money the Plantation will raise for the repair of sidewalks for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 8—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of a free high school for the ensuing year and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.
- Art. 10—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purchase of school text books for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay a joint superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for hydrant rental for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for electric street lights for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of the poor.
- Art. 15—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay plantation officers and all other miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay interest and portion of the plantation debt.
- Art. 17—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay for insurance, apparatus and appliances.
- Art. 18—To elect one or more fire wards, fix their compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 19—To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise for the repair of the Gilbert and Pepin road, so-called.

- Art. 20—To see if the plantation will vote to elect one or more constables for the ensuing year and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 21—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for maintenance of the Jackman Library and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 22—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for breaking snow roads for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 23—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for school supplies for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 24—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for schoolhouse repairs and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 25—To see if the plantation will vote to purchase a suitable lot of land in Jackman Plantation, erect a proper tomb theron and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 26—To see what action the plantation will take in regard to purchasing for a public dumping ground the lot of land in Jackman Plantation on or near Forest Street, owned by Rev. Joseph Forest, or cleaning said lot.
- Art. 27—To see what action the plantation will take relative to locating and establishing a public highway leading from or near the county road to the residence of John Bisson.
- Art. 28—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Assessors hereby give notice that they will be in session at Jackman Hall, on Monday, the twenty-fourth day of March, A. D. 1919, at eight o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
