To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman:

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of schools.

The past year has been in all respects a profitable one. It has cost a large amount of money to maintain our schools, but we believe that the pupils have received full value, and that it is better to spend enough to have good schools than to spend three fourths as much for poor ones. It is the last few dollars that make the difference between getting a first c'ass teacher and one not so well qualified.

HIGH SCHOOL

At their annual meeting of March 1922, Moose River withdrew from the high school union, and now sends her students on a tuition basis, the tuition charge being the per capita cost of maintaining the school for each term. This arrangement while perfectly fair between the plantations gives Moose River a decided advantage in the matter of State re-imbusement, they being entitled to receive \$40.00 per pupil as a tuition refund, while Jackman receives no specific high school aid from the State other than the attendance allowance of \$.0079 per day for each day that a pupil attends school, and \$100.00 for each high school teacher.

Our high school is in charge of the same teachers as last year, both of whom are doing faithful, conscientious work. There are at present thirty six pupils in the school, twenty-seven from Jackman and nine from Moose River.

COMMON SCHOOLS

We are maintaining three common schools, one at Jackman Station and two in the high school building. At the close of the spring term, Mrs. Hinds resigned and Miss Norma McDonald was engaged to teach the Station school. Her work in this school has been very satisfactory both to parents and school officials. Following the custom of last year, this school has been maintained for two terms of eighteen weeks each, the school being closed during the coldest part of the winter. The continuance of this plan depends of course on the preference of the people of the community. At the village the work in Mrs. Williams' and Miss Veazie's rooms is of the usual high order, and the children of both rooms are making good progress.

FINANCES

Like everything else, the kind of schools we have depends largely on the money we invest in them, and when one source of income fails or diminishes we must make it up from some other source, or lower the quality and efficiency of our schools, and there are few places where town money can be wasted more rapidly than in poor schools. The time has come when we must raise considerably more money for school purposes, if we are to maintain our present standard. There are several reasons for this, first, during the past few years the cost of maintaining schools has greatly increased, while our school money has not, consequently we have been using up our surplus which accummulated during the years when our income was large in proportion to our school population and the cost of operating schools was much less. This surplus is now exhausted, and from now on we must raise each year the full amount needed to run our schools, less the amount received annually from the State school fund and our interest on reserved land fund. Furthermore our State school money is reduced by an act of the 1921 Legislature effective July 1, 1922, which entirely changes the method of distribution. Hitherto the combined common school fund and school and mill fund derived from a tax of three mills on all property in the State. has been distributed two thirds in proportion to the number

of children between the ages of five and twenty-one in a town and one third in proportion to the valuation of the town. present law makes no allowance for valuation, but distributes to each town \$3.00 for each child between five and twenty-one, and \$.0079 for each day each pupil attends school, also \$100.00 for each teaching position, Formerly there was a re-imbusement of two thirds the amount expended for high school instruction with a maximum of \$500.00 to any town. Now there is no specific aid to high schools except as they come under the general provisions of the law. The effect of this law appears to be to increase the amount received by the larger towns, and to proportionately reduce the income of the smaller places, as our receipts from the State school funds are several hundred dollars less than last year. Our recommendations are made on the basis of maintaining good schools, and keeping our buildings in proper condition. We shall be glad to explain in detail any matters relating to school finances.

To the Inhabitants of Jackman Plantation:

The accounts of the Assessors, Plantation Treasurer and School Committee for the fiscal year 1922 have been examined by me and I found the same correct, with all payments properly vouched for.

Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

To William B. Hall, constable for the plantation of Jackman in the County of Somerset. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said plantation qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemple at Jackman Hall, in said Jackman on the twenty-sixth day of March, A. D. 1923, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, viz:

- Art. 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2—To choose a plantation clerk, assessors and overseers of the poor, and all other officers required by law to be chosen at the annual March meeting.
- Art. 3—To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways and bridges in said plantation and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 4—To see if the plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State aid on unimproved roads under the patrol system.
- Art. 5—To see if the plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State aid as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25 of the Revisted Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 6—To see if the plantation will appropriate and raise the sum of \$30 per mile for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the plantation is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 7—To see what action the plantation will vote to take relatives to the use of a dust preventative on the sreets of Jackman for the ensuing year.

- Art. 8—To see if the plantation will elect three overseers of the poor, one being elected for three years, one for two years and one for one year. They shall also be known as Municipal Board of Mothers' Aid and Child Guardianship.
- Art. 9—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the repair of sidewalks for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 10—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of a free high school for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 12—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purchase of school text books for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay a joint superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for hydrant rental for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15—To see what action the town will take relative to placing an electric light on the street that Richard Gagnon lives on; also on the street leading to the pumping station.
- Art. 16—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for electric street lights for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of the poor.
- Art. 18—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay plantation officers and all other miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay for insurance, apparatus and appliances.
- Art. 20—To elect one or more fire wards, fix their compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 21—To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation will vote to raise for the repair of the Gilbert and Pepin road, so called.
- Art. 22—To see if the plantation will vote to elect one or more constables for the ensuing year and raise a sum of money for the same.

- Art. 23—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for breaking snow roads for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 24—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for maintenance of the Jackman Library and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 25—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for school supplies for the ensuing year and pass all votes repecting the same.
- Art. 26—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for schoolhouse repairs and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 27—To see if the plantation will vote to employ a traffic officer to enforce the law relative to motor vehicles, etc., fix his compensation and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 28—To see what action the plantation will take relative to a Soldier Memorial and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 29—To see if the plantation will vote to fix the compensation of all plantation officers and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 30—To see what action the plantation will take relative to locating and accepting a proposed street extending from the east end of Dyer street to the premises now occupied by Max Nadeau, and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 31—To see what action the plantation will take relative to the purchase of necessary repairs for the chemical fire extinguisher owned by Jackman Plantation and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 32—To see what action the plantation will take relative to the purchase of the amount of timber necessary in constructing a temporary bridge over Sandy Stream for the purpose of procuring gravel for road purposes, and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 33—To see what action the plantation will take relative to the purchase of an automobile truck to be used on the highways in Jackman, and pass all votes respecting the same.
- Art. 34—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purpose of paying all or a portion of the plantation debt and interest due thereon and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 35-To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The assessors hereby give notice that they will be in session at Jackman Hall on Monday, the twenty-sixth day of March, A. D. 1923 at eight o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
