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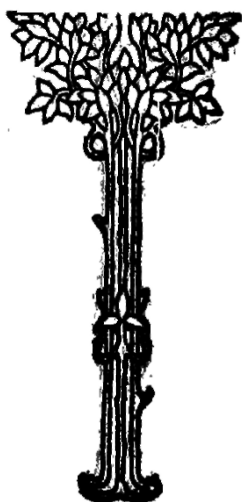

To the Superintendent of Schools, Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman Plantation:

I herewith submit for your attention a brief report of Jackman high school.

The school year opened on September 8, with thirty-nine pupils enrolled. The number has increased and up to the present time we have enrolled a total of forty-five students. Our actual attendance at present is forty as we have lost four pupils to other schools due to parents or guardians moving from town and one pupil due to ill health. Of this number there are fifteen from Moose River. The classes are divided in numbers as follows: Seniors, six; juniors, fourteen, sophomores, six; freshmen, twelve, and two special students. Our next year's graduating class will be by far the largest ever graduated from this school. The attendance, except in a very few instances, has been good and from figures taken from other schools throughout the state, it is above the average.

The attendance of high school pupils depends entirely upon the willingness of the individual and the interest of the parent. Parents should remember that there is exactly thirty-six weeks of work laid out for the pupil and that no pupil, however far advanced can stay out one day without loss. A pupil who attends regularly cannot be kept back for those who are absent, and the teachers do not have the time to teach the lesson twice. Therefore, the pupil who is absent must be the loser.

Our scholarship standing, I believe, has been materially raised to a higher level this year, especially in our commercial department. Five of our pupils have been awarded a "Certificate of Proficiency" by the Underwood Typewriter Company for typing thirty words per minute for fifteen minutes. Two have been awarded a "Bronze Medal" by the same company for a speed of forty words per minute and one a "Silver Medal" for a speed of fifty words per minute.

Eight of our pupils have received an average rank of 95% for the two terms, four in the general and classical courses and four in the commercial department. This makes a total of one-fifth of our pupils enrolled upon the "Honor Roll." We feel that this is something that the parents and citizens of Jackman may look at with a feeling of pride. The success of our commercial department and in fact all of the school work, has been due to a large extent to my assistant, Miss Williams, in whom I have found an excellent disciplinarian, a good instructor and a faithful and conscientious worker.

Our pupils have, as a whole, we believe for the first time done two hours of home study daily. The time has come when boys and girls of high school age must work in order to warrant the amount of money expended for secondary education. We solicit most heartily the parents' co-operation in this matter.

Athletics for the first time has been introduced into our schools and the results of basketball this winter in health and scholarship to the participants and the school as a whole have merited their continuance in the future. The school officials and pupils wish to take this opportunity to thank the parents and friends who have so generously supported them in their games this winter. We also wish to extend our sincere thanks and gratitude to Mr. Whalen, who to a large measure, made athletics possible in our school.

We are publishing a school paper this year and are already assured of its financial success through the kindness of our many advertisers.

We have a school orchestra of five instruments and they have already given several public exhibitions in connection with our basketball games. For a school of this size this seems to be a very creditable showing.

It seems to me that our greatest need at the present time is a closer co-operation between the home and the school. The parent and teacher must work together for the interest of the pupil. If this can be brought about I can see no reason why our high school, although small, should not be one of the best in Somerset County.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of Superintendent Taylor, the school committee and the citizens of Jackman.

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman Plantation:

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of schools.

We like to think that every year marks a step forward and I feel that the present one has been especially satisfactory in several respects. There is an old saying that a school is no better than its teacher, which contains much truth. We feel that we have teachers, who to use a slang term, are "live wires," who are on the job all the time doing their best to help our boys and girls to become useful efficient citizens.

HIGH SCHOOL

Our high school attendance has averaged about forty this year, which is one or two above the average for last year. Of these sixteen are residents of Moose River and one from Dennistown, the remainder being residents of Jackman. During the year three of the Moose River pupils as well as the one from Dennistown have left school so our present non-resident enrollment is thirteen. The same arrangement is being continued with Moose River that has been in effect since the Union high school was discontinued, namely that Moose River pays according to the per capita cost of maintaining the school. This has averaged somewhat over one hundred dollar a year per pupil. I believe this arrangement to be fair to both plantations and recommend its continuance.

One marked improvement I have noted in our high school this year is the improved attitude toward home study, the majority of our pupils are studying from one to two hours daily outside of school hours. This cannot fail to show results in a higher standard of scholarship, and better preparation for their life work.

GRADE SCHOOLS

As for several years past we are maintaining three grade schools, two in the high school building and one at Jackman Station. The present enrollment is as follows: (Jackman grammar school, Miss Annie Veazie teacher, twenty-eight pupils; Jackman primary school, Mrs. Vesta Williams teacher, eighteen pupils; Jackman Station school, Miss Norma McDonald teacher,

twenty-two pupils. This comparatively small enrollment makes the per capita cost of maintaining our schools high and emphasizes the unfairness of distributing a considerable portion of the state school fund on the basis of attendance, as up to the capacity of our buildings, such items as teachers, janitors, fuel, insurance and repairs cost as much for a few pupils as for many.

One of the largest items of expense in proportion to the number of pupils benefited is tuition, and what is practically in the same class, conveyance. While it is not our desire to deprive any child of the opportunity of securing an education on account of his residence yet in the interest of the taxpayers we feel that this is a matter that deserves careful consideration, and the earnest co-operation of parents living at a distance from the school to keep the cost as low as possible.

REPAIRS, ETC.

There are several repair jobs that must be undertaken this year, such as painting the walls and ceiling of the high school room to improve lighting conditions, and various minor replacements and repairs. The big proposition, however, is the foundation wall of the Station school. Due to the continued action of frost, portions of the wall are badly shattered, especially on the west side. Possibly temporary repairs would take care of the matter for another year, in case a complete re-building of the wall may not seem advisable at this time on account of industrial conditions. Toilet facilities at this school are also unsatisfactory and should be improved, though this can probably be done to best advantage when the cellar is repaired.

In making our recommendations for appropriations, which will be submitted to the budget committee, we have estimated that the cost of maintaining our schools will not vary greatly from that of the year past.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for school supplies for the ensuing year.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for schoolhouse repairs and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 29. To see if the plantation will vote to make certain necessary repairs on the Station schoolhouse and pass all votes respecting same.

~~Art. 30. To see if the plantation will vote to fix the compensation of all plantation officers and raise a sum of money for the same.~~

Art. 31. To see if the plantation will vote to construct and maintain a sidewalk on Marston street commencing at or near the residence of Mathias Veilleux and extending to the

residence of Augustas Nadeau and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 32. To see if the plantation will vote to make an application of tar, tarvia or asphalt on the highway in said Jackman from the north line of the plantation and extending to the Sacred Heart Convent at Jackman Station and raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 33. To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors to procure by loan the necessary amount of money to be used in surfacing the highway as per article 32 and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 34. To see what action the plantation wishes the superintending school committee to take in regard to tuition and conveyance of pupils living within the jurisdiction of the Station school.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purpose of paying all or a portion of the plantation debt and interest due thereon and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 36. To transact any other legal business.
