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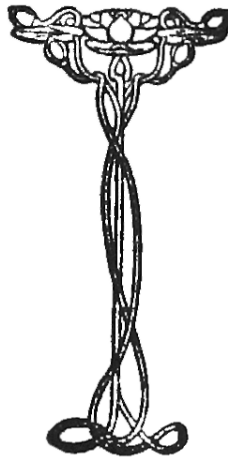

To the Superintendent of Schools, Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman Plantation:

I herewith submit for your attention a brief report of Jackman High School.

There has been many marked improvements in our school this year, the most striking, and perhaps the most important of these, has been the increased spirit of cooperation between the home and the school. I believe that there has been greater interest shown in our high school than ever before. We have had visits from over 200 parents and citizens during the past year. This may to some extent, be due to the "General Assemblies" that have been held from time to time. These have served as a special inducement for visiting and at the same time given an opportunity, for those interested, to see their school in action. The school officials and pupils wish to take this opportunity to thank those citizens who so cheerfully gave their time to contribute to the success of these assemblies.

We have enrolled 45 pupils in our high school this year. There are in actual attendance 44 pupils at the present time. It has, for the first time in the history of the school, been necessary to purchase additional seats. This fact proves that our high school is gradually growing. The classes are divided in number as follows: Seniors, 12; Juniors, 7; Sophomores, 9; Freshmen, 14; and 2 special students. Our present graduating class will be the largest ever graduated from Jackman High School. The attendance in most cases has been better than last year. An improvement might be made, however, in a few cases if the parents would cooperate more closely with the school.

Our scholastic standing has improved, and we have at present thirteen pupils on the "Honor Roll." Our commercial department is a credit to our school. Thirteen pupils have been awarded "Certificates of Proficiency" by the Underwood Typewriter Company, two by the Royal Typewriter Company, four by the Smith Typewriter Company, seven by the Remington Typewriter Company for typing thirty words per minute for fifteen minutes. Four have been awarded "Bronze Pins" by the Underwood Typewriter Company and one by the Smith Typewriter Company for a speed of forty words per minute for fifteen minutes. Two have been awarded "Silver Pins" by the Underwood Typewriter Company for a speed of fifty words per minute for fifteen minutes. Two have been awarded "Gold Pins" by the same company for a speed of sixty words per minute for fifteen minutes. The Underwood Typewriter Company wrote

that Jackman High School, at the time the gold pins were awarded, was the only high school in Somerset County to receive this honor. The continued success of our commercial department has been due, to a large extent, to my assistant, Miss Nadeau, in whom I have found a faithful and conscientious worker.

Athletics have created a spirit in the school that has materially raised the standard of scholarship. The pupils have been given something to interest them, both in and out of school. Our high school has been represented by a basket ball team and next spring we are to hold a track meet with Bingham High School. We hope to make this an annual event.

We feel that last year's school paper was a credit to our school, and the generosity shown us by the business men of Jackman in patronizing our advertising department has been worthy of our best efforts. We hope to present to you this spring a larger and better paper than ever before.

Debating has, for the first time, been introduced into our schools, and we are to debate with Greenville High School the last of March. Although this work is new with us it has been carried on by other schools throughout the State for some time, and prominent educators in their reports say that it will soon become a regular part of the course of study. The practice received by the speakers in the junior exhibition held last May has been a great help in this work. The interest that junior exhibition has aroused among the pupils and parents merits its continuance.

We have added thirty-five volumes to our school library during the past year. This has been made possible by the benevolence of our friends in buying tags on town meeting day. A library is now an essential part of any school's equipment.

Due to the far-sightedness of the Superintendent and members of the School Committee we have lengthened the school day one-half hour in the upper grades, as well as in the high school. This is a great saving for the Plantation as it increases our school year three and a half weeks, thereby making an equivalent to a thirty-nine and a half week year instead of the usual thirty-six. It has been done without any increased cost to the town.

A great improvement was made on the grounds last spring when a "Bee" was held for the purpose of grading the school lot. This work was very much needed and there are still some improvements which should be made in the future. A little

more grading is needed in the front yard and a suitable play ground for the smaller children should be made in the back yard. All of these improvements could easily be made by one more "Bee."

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation of the co-operation of Superintendent Taylor, the School Committee and citizens of Jackman.

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman Plantation: I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

I believe the people of Jackman have reason to feel proud of the educational opportunities they are giving their children, both as regards equipment and instruction. Our buildings are modern, in good repair and well cared for. Our teachers are well trained, conscientious and efficient. We are well equipped with up-to-date text-books and supplementary equipment, and can offer our pupils educational advantages equal to those in many larger towns.

HIGH SCHOOL

This year forty-five different pupils have been enrolled which is the largest number in the history of the school. Of these 28 are residents of Jackman, 16 of Moose River and 1 of Skinner. For a more detailed account I refer you to Mr. Mariner's report. It is pleasing to note that several of our recent graduates are successfully engaged in the teaching profession, as follows, Jackman, Miss Frances Nadeau; Moose River, Miss Louise Kennedy; Miss Hazel Hughey; Greenville, Miss Laura Clapp, Mrs. Violet Spinney; Skinner, Miss Arline Hall; Connecticut, Miss Greta McDaniels.

GRADE SCHOOLS

Our grade pupils are enrolled as follows: Station School, Miss Norma McDonald, teacher. Girls 7, boys 19. By grades: Grade VIII, 1 pupil; Grade VII, 0; Grade VI, 0; Grade V, 6; Grade IV, 2; Grade III, 3; Grade II, 5; Grade I, 9.

Jackman Grammar School, Mrs. Annie Nichols, teacher. Girls 12, boys 21, total 33. By grades: Grade VIII, 8; Grade VII, 9; Grade VI, 6; Grade V, 10.

Jackman Primary School, Mrs. Vesta Williams, teacher. Boys 7, girls 7, total 14. By grades: Grade IV, 7; Grade III, 3; Grade II, 0; Grade I, 4.

CONVEYANCE, TUITION, ETC.

We are maintaining two conveyances as during the past few years. One from the southern part of the town to the Station School with an average of 12 pupils conveyed, and one from the Pepin Road with two pupils.

We are also paying a part of the cost of maintaining 7 children residing on the Long Pond Road in the Convent, and tuition on 4 pupils attending the Mill School in Moose River, as in the opinion of the School Committee this is cheaper and more satisfactory than conveyance.

REPAIRS, ETC.

Very extensive repairs were made to the foundation of the Station School during the past summer, which seem to have prevented the constant shifting of the wall due to frost. At present the wall shows no signs of being affected by cold weather. By keeping a fire in the basement during the winter it is probable that further trouble will be avoided. In addition to this work the walls of the school room were painted and other repairs made. At the High School re-painting the ceiling of the high school room has been the only repair work of consequence done at town expense. To lessen the danger to pupils in case of fire several sprinkler heads have been installed in the basement which should check any basement fire until all pupils would be able to escape.

Through the generosity and public spiritedness of a large number of the townspeople the High School grounds have been graded and greatly improved at a "Bee" held during the spring term. The Soldiers' Memorial erected by the American Legion has added a touch of dignity and patriotism to our school grounds which is most pleasing and appropriate.

By a law passed by the 1923 Legislature amended 1925, we must provide approved toilet facilities at the Station School before Sept. 1, 1927. This may be either by installing flush toilets connected with the town water system, by chemical closets of a type approved by the State Board of Education or by an ap-

proved type of earth closet. It will be well for the voters to consider as to whether or not this work should be done during the summer of 1926. Also in regard to changing the toilets at the High School.

In making recommendations for appropriations for school maintenance, we have estimated probable costs as closely as possible, and taken into consideration all probable sources of income.

These recommendations with a statement of the items covered under each, will be submitted to the Budget Committee for their consideration as has been the custom during the past few years.

Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

To Joseph Francouer, Constable for the Plantation of Jackman
in the County of Somerset. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said plantation qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at Jackman Hall, in said Jackman on the twenty-second day of March, A. D. 1926 at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, viz:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a plantation clerk, assessors, and overseers of the poor, and all other officers required by law to be chosen at the annual March meeting.

Art. 3. To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways and bridges in said plantation and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$1800.

Art. 4. To see if the plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State aid on unimproved roads under the patrol system.

Budget Committee recommends \$900.

Art. 5. To see if the plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Budget Committee recommends \$533.

Art. 6. To see if the plantation will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commis-

sion in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum which the plantation is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Budget Committee recommends \$600.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the repair of sidewalks for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Budget Committee recommends \$300.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for breaking snow roads for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$350.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay plantation officers, fix their compensation and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends pass over.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for hydrant rental for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$400.

Art. 12. To see if the plantation will elect three overseers of the poor, they shall also be known as Municipal Board of Mothers' Aid and Child Guardianship.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of poor and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$1000.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for maintenance of the Jackman Public Library and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$100.

Art. 15. To see if the plantation will vote to elect one or more constables for the ensuing year and raise a sum of money for same.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Budget Committee recommends \$50.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of Jackman, Maine.

Budget Committee recommends \$400.

Art. 18. To see if the plantation will vote to establish and maintain one or more electric lights on the highway leading to the residence of Jules Pease and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for electric lights for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$930.

Art. 20. To see if the plantation will vote to employ a traffic officer to enforce the law relative to motor vehicles, etc., fix his compensation and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 21. To see what some of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$3800.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of a free high school for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$2000.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purchase of school text books for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$150.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay a joint superintendent of schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$300.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for payment of insurance, apparatus and appliances and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$125.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for school supplies for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Budget Committee recommends \$500.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for schoolhouse repairs and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$475.

Art. 28. To see if the plantation will vote to raise a certain sum of money for the purchase of calcium chloride to be used on the streets the coming summer, and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee recommends \$800.

Art. 29. To see what action the plantation will take in regard to exempting, E. A. Piper and his associates, for a term of years, on a mill and lot, if built in Jackman, and to employ from twenty to thirty people in mill. No questions will be answered in regards to products that will be manufactured, or location of mill.

Budget Committee reports favorable.

Art. 30. To see if the plantation will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to help defray the graduating expenses of class of 1926.

Budget Committee reports favorable.

Art. 31. To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money to employ a speaker for Memorial Day.

Budget Committee reports favorable.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money if any the plantation will vote to raise for the purpose of keeping the sidewalks open in the winter between the Convent and Nichols Road.

Budget Committee reports favorable.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purchase of a snow plow and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 34. To see if the plantation will vote to accept a trust fund of two hundred dollars, from the estate of the late Peter Liberty, the interest of said fund to be used for the perpetual care of his lot in the cemetery.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purpose of paying all or a portion of the plantation debt and interest due thereon and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$2500.00

Art. 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The assessors hereby give notice that they will be in session at Jackman Hall on Monday, the twenty-second day of March, A. D. 1926 at eight o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
