To the Superintendent, Superintending School Committee, and Citizens of Jackman Plantation: I herewith submit the annual report of the high school.

School opened for this year on the 5th day of September with an unusually small enrollment. There have been twenty-nine on the school register this year, but at the present time, we have only twenty-four. The loss of the mill is felt more than ever. The classes are divided as follows: Seniors 3, Juniors 8, Sophomores 7, and Freshmen 6.

Scholastic standing has been very high throughout the year. As an example of this, there are 13 students, who had an average of 85% or better, on the present honor roll. This is over one-half of the student body. An excellent co-operation between students and teachers accounts for such a high percentage. The old saying, "Where there's a will, there's a way," applies very well in our case this year. The work of Miss Curtis in the commercial department is to be highly commended. As a teacher and associate, she is very much respected by all.

Athletics were hampered this year, not only on account of the enrollment, but also because of the lack of a hall for participation. It was with regret that we learned that we could not have a hall for basketball. As the season wore on, a town team was formed, consisting of three high school boys and two town boys. These boys are still playing and from the way they have played thus far, they show that Jackman would have been represented by a fast team this year. Several other boys of the high school have shown promise of developing into fast players. It is hoped that next winter will see a better chance for athletics in the high school. We don't want to lose sight of the fact that we must grow physically fit as well as mentally fit.

The senior class drama, "Topsy Turvy," was presented on February 17th, before a large and enthusiastic audience. The cast showed the results of careful drilling. Jackman can well be proud of these students who demonstrated their ability as actors and actresses. Only two of the members had had any real previous experience, but the whole cast acted like people who had had long experience in such affairs. I want

to thank those people who were so kind to let us have any of their own personal things to make the affair a success. It is such a cooperation between town and school that makes a successful high school.

On account of the small enrollment this year, it is deemed advisable to get along without debating, but it is hoped that next year we may be able to have it again. The practice of debating enables one to be able to get up and say something before a crowd without being afraid of doing so. It also enables one to think quickly. It is deeply regretted that we cannot have this branch of interscholastic relations this year. We are going to have the school paper and expect it to be as good, if not better than last year's. Through its widely distributed exchange department, the paper received a great number of new friends. This is one good way of putting Jackman high school on the map.

The general condition of the school this year is very good. For the size of the town, Jackman can boast of a very fine school, which is on a par with any school. Let us hope that this condition will be kept up and that we shall all work for a better school all the time.

By way of conclusion, I want to express my appreciation of the services rendered by Mr. Taylor, our superintendent, the school committee, and the citizens of Jackman.

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

The past school year has been one of steady conscientious work on the part of both teachers and pupils. The progress made has been very satisfactory and we have every reason to believe that our boys and girls are as far advanced, and as thoroughly trained in their various subjects as the pupils of any school with which we have had opportunity to make comparison.

HIGH SCHOOL

At the close of the spring term Mr. Marriner having completed his third year as Principal of Jackman High School resigned to accept the superintendency of the Guilford-Sangerville union. Mr. Charles Diehl was elected to fill the vacancy, and has already shown himself a thorough, efficient principal. It was also necessary to secure a commercial teacher. After considering the qualifications of several candidates the choice fell on Miss Viola Curtis, who is discharging the duties of the position to the satisfaction of all.

The high school enrollment is smaller this year than usual, 24 being registered for the winter term. Of these, four are from Moose River, the others being residents of Jackman. Our tuition students are fewer than for a long time which means that our revenue from this source is correspondingly diminished. As in view of a smaller enrollment and decreased revenue it was considered inadvisable to engage a third teacher, some changes were necessary in the curriculum to meet the requirements of the State Department of Education regarding the number and length of the recitation periods. Fortunately it was possible to do this without interfering materially with the plans of any student.

So far as is possible in a small high school we feel that we are meeting the needs of a majority of the students very effectually. For a more detailed account of the work I refer you to Mr. Diehl's report.

PAYSON SMITH GRAMMAR SCHOOL

At the close of the spring term Miss Young decided not to return. We were fortunate, however, in being able to secure for this school Mrs. Thomas Nichols who has a record of several years of success in this room. The enrollment this year is as follows, Grade VIII, 5; Grade VII, 13; Grade VI, 5.

PRIMARY SCHOOL

As for many years this room has been in charge of Mrs. Vesta Williams whose excellent work is well known to all who are familiar with the affairs of the school. The enrollment is as follows. Grade V, 6; Grade III, 8; Grade IA, 1; Grade IB, 4.

STATION SCHOOL

Miss Norma B. McDonald who has taught here successfully for several years resigned at the close of the school year, to enter Bates College. Miss Madeline M. Barton a recent graduate of Farmington Normal was elected to fill the vacancy. This is a difficult school both as to numbers and grades and Miss Barton deserves much credit for the work she has accomplished here. Over 40 different pupils have been registered this year, while all grades are represented except the second. An additional difficulty is found in that frequently pupils enter who either speak no English at all, or else so imperfectly as to greatly handicap their progress. The cost of transportation has been greatly reduced in this district during the past year, which has contributed considerably to the large unexpended balance on the common school fund.

REPAIRS

In order to comply with the State Law respecting sanitary facilities, a considerable amount of work has been done at the Station School. A part of the hall has been partitioned off and divided into toilet rooms for the boys and girls respectively. The old tile drain to the cesspool was dug up and iron soil pipe laid instead. Also a cellar drain was laid from the Northeast corner of the basement to take care of surface water. As soon

as funds are available some further work should be done in the basement and the south window altered to prevent the entrance of water after heavy rains. At the high school building the interior woodwork and furniture has been varnished, the sliding doors re-hung, and some minor repairs made. This building should be painted next year as the surface is in very poor condition.

As it is not expected that the cost of maintaining the schools during the coming year will vary greatly from that of the year past, recommendations for appropriations have been made on the basis of having approximately the same amounts available. These recommendations have been submitted to the budget committee for their consideration and approval.

Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

To Joseph Francouer, Constable for the Plantation of Jackman
in the County of Somerset. GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said plantation qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at Jackman Hall, in said Jackman, on the nineteenth day of March, A. D. 1928, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, viz:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a plantation clerk, assessors, overseers of the poor, collector of taxes and all other officers required by law to be chosen at the annual March meeting and it is to be distinctly understood that the person chosen collector of taxes shall be required to make a full and complete settlement with the plantation not later than March 1, 1929.

Art. 3. To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways and bridges in said plantation and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, \$2,000.

Art. 4. To see if the plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State Aid on unimproved roads under the patrol system.

Recommended, \$900.

Art. 5. To see if the plantation will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Recommended, \$533.

Art. 6. To see if the plantation will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum which the plantation is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Recommended, \$600.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the repair of sidewalks for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended, \$200.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for breaking snow roads for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$500.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay plantation officers, fix their compensation and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$725.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Pass over.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for hydrant rental for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$400.

Art. 12. To see if the plantation will elect three overseers of the poor, they to be also known as Municipal Board of Mothers' Aid and Child Guardianship.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of poor and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$1,200.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for maintenance of the Jackman Public Library and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$100.

Art. 15. To see if the plantation will vote to elect one or more constables for the ensuing year and raise a sum of money for same.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of Jackman, Maine.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for electric lights for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 19. To see if the plantation will vote to employ a traffic officer to enforce the law relative to motor vehicles, etc., fix his compensation and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$3,200.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of a free high school for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$2,200.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purchase of school textbooks for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$125.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay a joint superintendent of schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$340.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for payment of insurance, apparatus and appliances and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$125.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for school supplies for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$300.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for schoolhouse repairs and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$500.

Art. 27. To see if the plantation will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to help defray the graduating expenses of the class of 1928 of the Jackman high school.

Recommended, \$25.

Art. 28. To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for procuring a speaker for Memorial Day.

Pass over.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purpose of paying all or a portion of the plantation debt and interest due thereon and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended, \$900.

Art. 30. To see if the plantation shall instruct the assessors to make application to the State Highway Commission for snow removal from the north line of Jackman to the south line thereof at an expense not to exceed twenty-five dollars per mile, said amount to be taken from the amount raised under Article 8 and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 31. To see what action the plantation will take relative to constructing a proper sewer in said plantation extending from a point at or near the residence of Mathias Veilleux to the south side of the Moose River easterly of Moose River Bridge, and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The assessors hereby give notice that they will be in session in Jackman Hall on Monday, the nineteenth day of March, A. D. 1928 at eight o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
