Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman: I herewith submit my annual report as Superintenddent of Schools.

The past year has been marked by an unusually large enrollment, all schools except the Village Grammar school being badly overcrowded. This situation is due in a great measure to a large number of pupils who have previously attended the Convent entering the public schools. Should this tendency continue, it will be necessary to add to our teaching force to provide for this increase.

HIGH SCHOOL

The total enrollment this year is 53, of these 9 have left school for various reasons, making the present number 44. Of these 14 are from Moose River and one from Holeb, the remainder being residents of Jackman. The school spirit in all departments is very commendable, and the co-operation between the teachers and pupils excellent. For details I refer you to the report of the principal.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL

Anne Nichols, Teacher

This school although somewhat smaller than last year, is still as large as is desirable for efficient work. The 29 pupils are graded as follows, Grade VIII 9, Grade VII 10, Grade VI 10. As it is from this school that practically all our local high school pupils come, it is of the utmost importance that the work of this school be especially thorough, that the chances of failure in high school be reduced to a minimum. The poorly prepared pupil often becomes discouraged and leaves school, thus depriving himself of the many advantages that a high school training offers. Mrs. Nichols' work is often made difficult due to the fact that pupils frequently enter the upper grades with an inadequate knowledge and understanding of English, thus making their progress much slower than would otherwise be the case. The smaller attendance this year makes possible more individual attention to the slower pupils, which will help materially in preventing failures.

PRIMARY SCHOOL

Helen Rock, Teacher

Thirty-eight pupils have been registered this year, this being the largest number of which we have record. With five grades in this room it is evident that recitation periods must be short, and there is all too little time for the teacher to give individual help to the slower pupils. An additional teacher qualified to teach both elementary and secondary subjects would greatly improve the effectiveness of our school system. Such a teacher could take two or more high school classes and devote the remainder of her time to grade work thus relieving the pressure in all departments. The only expense besides the salary of the teacher would be some recitation seats, as classes of moderate size could be accommodated in either the teachers' room or the laboratory.

STATION SCHOOL

Maxie Johnston, Teacher

The increase in the size of this school during the past year has been remarkable. There are now 29 registered, representing all grades, and varying in age from five to nineteen years. A school of this type requires both hard work and careful planning, as the number of classes makes the time available for each very short. Mrs. Johnston has the work well organized and has a well conducted school.

REPAIRS

During the past year the outside of the high school building has been painted and various general repairs made. Both school houses need painting and varnishing inside, whenever funds are available for the purpose. I feel that considering the large number of pupils, the interior of our school buildings show very little willful damage or defacement, a condition that speaks well for the habits and conduct of our pupils.

SCHOOL NURSE

I do not feel that the present system of employing a school nurse is at all satisfactory, or that we are getting value received for the money expended. Since there is no longer a regular school nurse for Somerset County, we receive only such time as a nurse from some other county, usually Franklin, can spare from her regular duties. This means a hurried trip, hasty examinations and insufficient follow up work. I believe that a competent local nurse can render the town far greater service for the money, and besides would be instantly available in case of any epidemic or other emergency. A suitably worded article in the town warrant would leave the voters free to determine the kind and extent of nursing service which they feel most nearly meets our needs.

FINANCES

As it is impossible to say at this time what effect new legislation may have on our school income from the State School Fund, it seems best to base our estimates on conditions as they now exist, making any needed adjustments later. I feel that our schools are doing excellent work so far as conditions permit. As I have stated before I believe an additional teacher would considerably increase the efficiency. Should the new educational bill become a law, funds will be available which could advantageously be used for this purpose.

Our recommendations to you for appropriations are based on our expected needs for maintaining our schools along present lines. Any additions of importance either to personnel or equipment must be provided for by additional appropriations. In closing I wish to say that I greatly appreciate the co-operation I have received from the School Committee and citizens of Jackman.

Report of Jackman High School

I submit my annual report as Principal of Jackman High School.

The enrollment this year shows a slight increase over that of last year. There are forty-four students enrolled at present. The registration by classes is as follows:

There have not been any changes in the studies this year. American History rotated with Ancient History, Social Science with Commercial Arithmetic, and Algebra II with Plane Geometry.

The annual J.H.S. fair held in October again proved a success. This is the only project to raise money to carry on the outside activities of the school year.

The four one-act play contest was held in November. Each class competed with one play as usual. The judging of the merits of the acting was done in a different way this year than formerly. In addition to the vote of the audience, there were two judges. The Freshmen carried off the honors.

Basketball was the main activity for the winter term. Both boys' and girls' teams lacked experienced material. Then, too, the J.H.S. teams were handicapped in securing games with other schools to get experience. Two of the boys' games were with much older and more experienced boys. The boys won one and lost four games, while the girls lost three.

Rehearsals have begun for Junior Exhibition which will be held on March 29. We hope to have our annual speaking contest with Greenville High School here in Jackman sometime in April. We shall send a representative to the semi-finals of our district in the Spear Prize Speaking Contest. Last spring Renaldo Tessier represented J.H.S. in this contest and won second place in our group. He then attended the finals at Augusta, where he won seventh place in a group of ten speakers representing high schools from various sections of the state. Much credit is due to Renaldo and to Miss Curtis, who coached him, for the good work done in this activity.

J. H. S. is represented by six students in the town band. They will receive one-half a credit toward graduation for their work in music. It is hoped that more students will join the band, as music is one thing that may be carried on for a person's pleasure as well as for business. Mr. Ghen has done very well with the band and Jackman ought to be considered fortunate in securing the services of such an able musician to furnish instruction in the different band instruments.

The citizens of Jackman have been very generous in their support of all the activities of the school. Especially do I wish to mention their great cooperation in the recent food sale and entertainment for the benefit of the mid-west flood victims. Through the efforts of the primary, grammar, and high schools, the sum of \$83.03 was turned over to the Red Cross. This donation is very large in proportion to the size of the town. We could not have done that without the fine loyalty that is usually given us.

I also wish to express my appreciation for the co-operation of Mr. Taylor and the School Committee.

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Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

To Alphonse Fortier, Constable for the Plantation of Jackman in the County of Somerset: Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of Jackman Plantation, qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at Jackman Town Hall, in Jackman, on Monday, the 22nd of March A. D. 1937. at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, viz:

Art. 1-To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2—To choose a plantation clerk, three assessors, three overseers of the poor who shall be known as Mothers' aid and child guardianship, treasurer, auditor, one member of the school committee, fire warden, surveyor of wood and bark, and sealer of weights and measures.

Art. 3—To elect a tax collector of town taxes, fix his compensation and it shall be understood that the person elected tax collector of town taxes will be required to make a full and complete settlement with Jackman Plantation not later than February 20, 1938.

Art. 4—To elect an excise tax collector, fix his compensation, and it shall be understood that the person elected excise tax collector shall be required to deposit in the Guilford Trust Co. Jackman, Maine in the Jackman Plantation checking account monthly, all the excise tax money collected.

Art. 5—To see if the plantation will vote to elect a road commissioner, fix his compensation and have it understood that a certain sum of common road money, shall be set aside for fall use after the patrol is taken off, if need be, and pass all votes respecting same. Art. 6—To see if the Plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways and bridges in said plantation and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$1,000.00

Art. 7—To see if the plantation will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$533.00.

Art. 8—To see if the plantation will votes "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State Aid on unimproved roads under the Patrol system, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$928.20.

Art. 9—To see if the plantation will appropriate and raise a sum of \$400.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum which the plantation is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18 Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916 and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$400.00.

Art. 10—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the repair of sidewalks for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$100.00.

Art. 11—To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for maintaining third class roads, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$125.00.

Art. 12—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for cutting bushes along the highways, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$150.00.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for breaking snow roads for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$1,500.00.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay plantation officers, fix their compensation and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$750.00.

Art. 15—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for Miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$1,500.00.

Art. 16—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for Hydrant rentals for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$425.00.

Art. 17—To see if the plantation will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the benefit of the Jackman Band, the money to be used to reduce the expense to the members by 50% and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$200.00.

Art. 18—To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors to procure a loan of \$800.00 to pay Percy L. Colby for the Airport land, if necessary, and pass all votes respecting same.

Budget Committee accepted.
