Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman: I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

As for several years past our enrollment, except at the Station School, has been so large as not only to crowd the rooms considerably but to make it necessary for our teachers to plan their work most carefully and employ their time to the best advantage if the prescribed work is to be satisfactorily covered. The number of pupils by grades is as follows:

Several pupils have left the Station school to attend elsewhere, making the present number less than at the opening of the school year.

HIGH SCHOOL

Once more our high school enrollment has surpassed all previous records. While the room is somewhat crowded our real

need is an additional teacher. This would make it possible to reduce the teaching load in the grades as well as in the high school, also to offer high school subjects for which there is a real demand but for which at present we have no room in our curriculum.

As a ruling of the State Commissioner of Education requires that high schools in which the enrollment exceeds sixty pupils shall employ at least three teachers in order to receive a "Class A" rating and accept tuition pupils as a Class A school, it seems probable that this will make it necessary to employ a third teacher next year. As but two terms will have to be paid for before the 1940 town meeting, the expense can be met from the unexpended balance of 1939, so that no additional funds will have to be raised for this purpose before 1940. For several years, due to our large pupil to teacher ratio, it has become increasingly difficult to meet the requirements of the State Department with regard to our Course of Study and teaching periods and at the same time give our students the kind of training they desire and need for the furtherance of their individual plans.

At present fifteen Moose River pupils are attending Jackman High School; the 1938-39 tuition rate is \$88. It is evident therefore, that we cannot afford to lower our standards and thus fail to qualify as a legal Class A tuition high school. For a detailed account of the high school affairs I refer you to Mr. Rowell's report.

CONVEYANCE

Although we are at present conveying but eight pupils, the cost is relatively high, due to the fact that part of both routes are not open to travel by auto throughout the winter. We hope to be able to provide some more satisfactory arrangement next year if it is at all possible.

REPAIRS

Due to the very liberal provisions of the N.Y.A., a great deal of work has been done at the high school building at a comparatively small cost to the town. The walls and ceilings have been cleaned and painted, standing finish and doors varnished, floors scraped and refinished where necessary and various odd

jobs done. We hope that this work may be continued during the coming year, as it has the double advantage of getting some much needed work done, as well as providing employment for several young men. Next year we plan to do some repair work at the Station School, the ceiling in particular being in very poor condition. A considerable amount of the work can be done by N.Y.A. workers if available, thus reducing the cost to the town.

All recommendations for appropriations have been passed upon by the Superintending School Committee and the Budget Committee.

Report of Jackman High School

To Superintendent Russell S. Taylor, the members of the Superintending School Committee and the citizens of Jackman, I have the honor of submitting my second annual report of Jackman High School.

Last year's report gave a total of forty-seven pupils. This year we have ten Seniors, eighteen Juniors, sixteen Sophomores and twelve Freshmen—a total of fifty-seven. Examination of previous town reports shows the average membership to be forty. Thus our school has become in two years almost half as large again as it was, and this growth has been in the main a healthy one. It has, however, intensified the old problem of an insufficient number of teachers to do the work. If two teachers were not enough in the past to do justice to forty pupils—and all previous teachers vouch for this—still less can two teachers now be expected to give adequate instruction to fifty-seven and support a decent extra-curricular program. The State Department of Education tells us that we have the numbers and course of study for a four teacher school.

Outside activities this year have followed the usual plan—Freshman reception, School Fair, Senior Play, etc. The boys organized their own basketball team, independent of the Boys' Club, and played four games under the coaching of Mr. Lawrence Cyr. Results have been promising as was also true of the girls' team directed by Mrs. Paxton McKenney. For the first time in its history the school sent a team to the Rumford Winter Sports Meet and all are enthusiastic to continue this work on a larger scale next year. This kind of athletics is ideal for our school, situated as it is with a long winter season and plenty of snow and ice for training.

The Prize Speaking contest will be held the last of March and the Greenville contest here somewhat later. Last April our speaker stood fifth in the regional contest held at Winslow in which the larger schools of Somerset and Kennebec Counties took part.

As to quality of work done, eighteen pupils have made the honor roll requirement of at least 85% in every study. The

typewriting work has been greatly assisted by the two new typewriters.

The new electric lights and painted ceilings have greatly improved the lighting of all rooms. In fact too much credit cannot be given to the N.Y.A. project which has renovated the interior and given it a bright and attractive appearance. There is further opportunity for such work if funds can be available.

We have been fortunate this year to secure five N.Y.A. student helpers. The financial aid has helped needy students and their work about the building has been uniformly good.

Last year the Activities fund paid thirty-five dollars to secure a hall for the Prize Speaking Contest and the Graduating Exercises. It would seem advisable in many ways if this expense could be borne by the regular school appropriation.

The Activities Association has planned to buy this year a suitable steel safe for the protection of school records and valuables from fire and other dangers and this expenditure will be considerable.

In closing this report I wish to thank the Alumni; the citizens; Mr. Taylor, and the School Board for their unfailing interest and help during the past two years. Our school is growing and like any healthy child has its growing pains and its problems, first of which is the need of a third teacher. May we not all further cooperate to secure one and soon?

Warrant for Annual Plantation Meeting

To Philip Nadeau, Constable for the Plantation of Jackman in
the County of Somerset: Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of Jackman Plantation, qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at Jackman Town Hall, in Jackman, Monday, the 20th of March A. D. 1939, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, viz:

Art. 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2—To choose a plantation clerk, three assessors, five overseers of the poor, one being known as Mother's Aid and Child Guardianship, treasurer, auditor, one member of the school board, fire warden, surveyor of wood and bark and sealer of weights and measurers.

Art. 3—To elect a tax collector of town taxes, fix his compensation and it shall be understood that the person elected tax collector of town taxes will be required to make a full and complete settlement with Jackman Plantation not later than February 20, 1940.

Art. 4—To elect an excise tax collector, fix his compensation and it shall be understood that the person elected excise tax collector shall be required to turn over to the Jackman Plt. treasurer all excise tax money collected.

Art. 5—To see if the plantation will vote to elect a road commissioner, fix his compensation and have it understood that \$100.00 of common road money, shall be set aside for fall use after the patrol is taken off, if need be, and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 6—To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways and bridges in said plantation and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$1,000.00.

Art. 7—To see if the plantation will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$533.00.

Art. 8—To see if the plantation will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State Aid on unimproved roads under the Patrol System, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$928.20.

Art. 9—To see if the plantation will appropriate and raise a sum of \$400.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum which the plantation is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 25, Section 18 of the Revised Statutes of 1916 and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$100.00.

Art. 10—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the repair of sidewalks for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee.

Art. 11—To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for maintaining third class roads, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$129.00.

Art. 12—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for cutting bushes along the highways, and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$125.00.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for breaking snow roads for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$1,200.00.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay plantation officers, fix their compensation and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$750.00.

Art. 15—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$500.00.

Art. 16—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for hydrant rentals for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$425.00.

Art. 17—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for support of poor for the ensuing year, also authorize the assessors to set aside a certain sum of money to employ those assisted by the plantation to help defray their expenses and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$4,500.00, set aside \$1,500.00.

Art. 18—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$3,000.00.

Art. 19—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the support of high school for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$2,000.00.

Art. 20—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the purchase of text-books for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$200.00.

Art. 21—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to pay a joint superintendent of schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$306.00.

Art. 22—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the payment of insurance apparatus, and appliances for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, Amount necessary.

Art. 23—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for school supplies for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$250.00.

Art. 24—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for school house repairs for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$250.00.

Art. 25—To see if the plantation will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 to help defray the graduating expenses of the class of 1939 of Jackman High School.

Art. 26—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for the maintenance of Jackman Public Library and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$100.00.

Art. 27—To see if the plantation will vote to elect one or more constables for the ensuing year and fix their compensations and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee.

Art. 28—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for electricity for streets and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$1,080.00.

Art. 29—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for Mother's Aid for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$100.00.

Art. 30—To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase the treasurer's and collector's bonds and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$48.00.

Art. 31—To see if the plantation will vote to charge interest at the rate of 6% on all taxes paid after Sept. 1, 1938 and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, Yes.

Art. 32—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise to apply on the plantation debt and interest and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$550.00.

Art. 33—To see what action if any the plantation will take relative to authorizing the assessors to take from all persons working for the plantation 20% from plantation order same to be applied on their taxes for the year 1939.

Recommended by Budget Committee, Yes.

Art. 34—To see if the plantation will vote yes or no in regard to Daylight Saving Time from April 30 to September 24 and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 35—To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors to procure a temporary loan in anticipation of taxes. Said loan and interest to be paid during the current municipal year from the tax receipts, if possible, and pass all vote respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee, Yes.

Art. 36—To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to raise for a Public Health Nurse and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee \$65.00.

Art. 37—To see if the plantation will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for the benefit of the Jackman Community Band and pass all votes respecting the same.

Art. 38—To see if the plantation will vote to pay 2% on all taxes paid before June 1st and pass all votes respecting the same.

Recommended by Budget Committee.

Art. 39—To see if the plantation will vote to authorize the assessors on behalf of the town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon; on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim bonds for such property.

Recommended by Budget Committee, Yes.

Art. 40—To appoint a Budget Committee.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting, including the passing of any votes that may be considered necessary to carry into effect any vote passed under this warrant.

The assessors hereby give notice that they will be in session in Jackman Town Hall on Monday the 20th of March, 1939, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
