SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

Our total enrollment this year is 144, divided as follows:

High School	73	Resident	120
Common School	71	Non-Resident	24

By classes: Seniors, 19; Juniors, 17; Sophomores, 11; Freshmen, 26; Grade 8, 14; Grade 7, 5; Grade 6, 5; Grade 5, 9; Grade 4, 6; Grade 3, 10; Grade 2, 9; Grade 1, 8; Sub-Primary, 3.

High School

As will be noted the enrollment is the largest in the history of the school. In accordance with the regulations of the State Department of Education, requiring at least three teachers in High Schools with an enrollment of sixty or more, a third teacher, Miss Jean Cobb, was added to the High School faculty this Fall. This has enabled us to introduce a course in biology and relieve Mrs. Nichols of her Social Science classes, at the same time reducing the teaching load in the High School to the limits required by the State. Besides her classroom duties Miss Cobb has coached the girl's basketball team and has assisted in other extra-curricular activities.

I feel that it is the duty of our High School to offer such courses as will meet the future need of our pupils as fully as possible, and reduce to a minimum the necessity of preparatory school or post graduate work to prepare them for whatever advanced study they may wish to pursue. For this reason I strongly recommend that we add a course in chemistry to our curriculum next year. This will be of especial value to girls who wish to train for the nursing profession as well as for boys and girls who plan to attend normal school or college. The initial outlay for equipment will be considerable, (approximately \$150.00 is estimated) but, except for an annual supply of chemicals, equipment will last for many years with proper care.

Grammar School, Mrs. Anne Nichols

School room permits more time for attention to the needs of individual pupils and consequently better opportunities for all.

The enrollment here is twenty-four. By grades: Grade 8, 10; Grade 7, 5; Grade 6, 4; Grade 5, 5. This is somewhat below that of some previous years, even with the addition of Grade 5, which was transferred from the primary room to more nearly equalize the teaching load. As the social science classes are taught by Miss Cobb, time is available for more intensive work in preparing pupils for High School

The enrollment is twenty-seven. By grades: Grade 4, 5; Grade 3, 8; Grade 2, 7; Grade 1, 4; Sub-Primary 3.

This is Miss Hennigan's first year in the Jackman Schools. She is a recent graduate of Farmington Normal School and has had a very successful year here in all respects. Transference of Grade 5, to the Grammar

Station School, Mrs. Fred Johnston

The enrollment is twenty. By grades: Grade VIII 4; Grade VII 2; Grade VI 1; Grade V 4; Grade IV 1; Grade III 2; Grade II 2; Grade I 4. The enrollment in this school varies considerably, not only from year to year but from term to term. This year the school is considerably larger than usual, with very good average attendance. Although comparatively few pupils from the Station School enter High School, it is our intention that all may receive a thorough preparation in order that any who may attend shall be at no disadvantage.

Repairs

During the past year a considerable amount of repair work has been done. In addition to the work done at Town expense, the N. Y. A. has done painting and varnishing at the High School building. A summary of the more important improvements is as follows:

All windows not provided with storm sash, also outside door at the High School, fitted with all metal weatherstrip, guaranteed for the life of the building; completion of inside paint and varnish job throughout High

School; fence around Village school lot, and a considerable amount of grading on the grounds.

At the Station: new steel ceilings, new curtains and a complete paint and varnish job in the school room.

For the coming year, beside the usual expense for up-keep, plans should be made to cover the roof at the Station School.

Conveyance

All pupils requiring conveyance are now transported by automobile throughout the school year. This is a great improvement, both as to the comfort and safety of the pupils. This arrangement also has the further advantage of a saving of \$2.00 or more each week to the town.

Recommendations

All recommendations for appropriations have been made as conservative as possible, consistent with keeping our schools up to the proper standard, and have been approved by the budget committee.

REPORT OF JACKMAN HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent, Russell S Taylor, members of the Superintending School Committee, and citizens of Jackman, I have the honor of submitting the annual report of our High School.

Last year attention was called to the fact that in two years the High School has increased fifty per cent in size. This year also marks considerable increase. In all we have registered this year seventy-four. Of this number two have left owing to inability to secure transportation and one moved away from Town. One post graduate joined the Army and one left for reasons of his own. The sixty-eight now enrolled are distributed as follows:

It is doubtful if there will be any increase next year if the pupils now in the eighth grades of the various schools is any indication.

With the record breaking numbers this year, it was indeed fortunate that a third teacher was added, and the various duties of the teaching force lessened in number at least. Two new studies, Biology and a combination of Commercial Law and Vocational Guidance, have been added to the regular subjects taught. Both are valuable and usually found in up to date schools.

School activities have followed the usual pattern, a well attended Freshman reception, a successful school fair in October, Prize speaking to take place March 22 at the Strand. We plan to give the school play in April as attendance in former years when the play was given earlier has not been fully satisfactory.

In athletics the school has been fortunate in having the services of Mr. Langdon Holden as basketball coach. He has a well trained team which has done well this year and can be counted on to do even better another year. The girls have also been well-coached by Miss Cobb the new High School teacher.

A beginning was made last year in Winter sports when we took four skaters to Rumford. This year we took twelve boys to Bingham and scored third in boy's events against Monson, Guilford, Skowhegan, Madison, Bingham, Solon, The Forks and West Forks. None of this team will be lost by graduation and it should be larger and better another year. If there were a skating rink and a ski tow in Town, they would aid training very greatly.

One very encouraging feature of the year has been the interest of the Alumni who have given a play to raise funds and have helped the school purchase a much needed duplicating machine. To them, as well as to the other teachers, to Mr. Taylor, to the Board, and to the many citizens who have helped us in many ways, I wish to express my gratitude and appreciation.

WARRANT

To Philip Nadeau, Constable for the Plantation of Jackman in the County of Somerset:

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of Jackman Plantation, qualified by law to vote in Plantation affairs to assemble at Jackman Town Hall, in Jackman, Monday the 18th day of March A. D. 1940 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Plantation Clerk, Three Assessors also to be known as Selectmen. Five Overseers of the Poor, one to be known as Mothers' Aid and Aid to Dependent Children. Treasurer. Auditor. One Member of the School Board, Fire Warden for Town, Fire Warden for Forests, Surveyor of Wood and Bark, and Sealer of Weights and Measures.
- Art. 3. To elect a Tax Collector of Town Taxes, fix his compensation and it shall be understood that the person elected Tax Collector of Town Taxes will be required by law to make a full and complete settlement with the Assessors of Jackman not later than February 15th, 1941.
- Art. 4. To elect an Excise Tax Collector, fix he compensation and it shall be understood that the person elected Excise Tax Collector shall be required to turn over all Excise Tax money collected to the Treasurer of Jackman and to make full settlement by February 15th, 1941.
- Art. 5. To see if the Plantation will vote to elect a Road Commissioner fix his compensation and

have it understood that \$100.00 of the common road money, shall be set aside for Fall use after the patrol is taken off, if needed at said time, and pass all votes respecting same.

- Art. 6. To see if the Plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing Highways and Bridges in said Plantation for the coming year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended \$1,000.00

- Art. 7. To see if the Plantation will vote Yes or No on the question of Appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Plantation to State Aid, and pass all votes respecting same, as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 8. To see if the Plantation will vote Yes or No on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Plantation to State Aid on unimproved roads under the Patrol System, and pass all votes respecting same.

- Art. 9. To see if the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise a sum of money to expend on State Maintenance in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges, this known as 50-50 Road and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended \$50.00

- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for repairs of Sidewalks for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended \$100.00

- Art. 11. To see if the Plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for maintaining Third Class roads for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended \$119.00

- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for cutting bushes along Highway for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$125.00
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for breaking snow roads for the ensuing year, and to instruct the Assessors to ask for bids for Snow Removal for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$900.00
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise to pay Plantation Officers for the ensuing year, fix their compensation and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$760.00
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$500.00
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for Hydrant Rental for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$425.00
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Platation will vote to raise for Support of Plantation Poor for the ensuing year, also authorize the Assessors to set aside a certain sum of money to employ those receiving help from the Plantation, also to set their compensation per hour while employed on labor related to this article and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$4,000.00 to set aside \$1,000.00
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote for Support of Common Schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$3,000.00

- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for Support of High School for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$2,000.00
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for purchase of Text Books for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$200.00
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to pay a joint Superintendent of Schools for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$340.00
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for Insurance Apparatus and Appliance for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$125.00
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for School Supplies for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$250.00
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for School House repairs for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$250.00
- Art. 25. To see if the Plantation will vote that sum of \$25.00 to help defray the Graduating Expenses of the class of 1940 of Jackman High School pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for the Maintenance of Jackman Public Library for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$100.00
- Art. 27. To see if the Plantation will vote to elect a Constable for the ensuing year, fix his compen-

sation, and it to be understood that the Constable elected will attend or be on street near dance halls while said dances are being held on Holidays and Saturdays or in buildings and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 28. To see if the Plantation will vote to have Street Light installed on the so-called Nicholas Road near summer home of Mrs. Cole and also Nadeau Street leading to the residence of Hormidas Gilbert, and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise to defray the expenses of Street Lights for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended \$1,080.00

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for aid to Dependent Children for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended \$150.00

Art. 31. To see if the Plantation will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase Treasurer and Collector's bond for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended \$48.00

Art. 32. To see if the Plantation will vote to instruct the Tax Collector to pay all who pay their taxes before June 1st, 1940, 2 percent and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by the Budget Committee

Art. 33. To see if the Plantation will vote to charge interest at the rate of 6 percent on all taxes paid after September 1st, 1940 and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by the Budget Committee

- Art. 34. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise to pay Bond due December 1st, 1940. Recommended \$1,000.00
- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise to coupon interest due ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$500.00
- Art. 36. To see if the Plantation will vote to authorize the Assessors to take from all persons working for the Plantation 20 percent of money to be applied on taxes due Plantation and pass all votes respecting same.
Recommended by the Budget Committee
- Art. 37. To see if the Plantation will accept from Rev. Joseph Forest the Street that leads to pumping Station, said street to be owned by Plantation and maintenance kept by Plantation and pass all votes respecting same.
Recommended by the Budget Committee
- Art. 38. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to raise for a Public Health Nurse for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended \$50.00
- Art. 39. To see if the Plantation will if necessary authorize the Assessors to procure a temporary loan in anticipation of taxes, said loan and interest to be paid during the current municipal year from tax receipts, if possible, and pass all votes respecting same.
Recommended by the Budget Committee
- Art. 40. To see if the Plantation will vote Yes or No in regard to Daylight Saving Time from April 28th to September 22nd included and pass all votes respecting same.

- Art. 41. To see if the Plantation will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to defray expenses for Band Concerts to be held weekly at Jackman in the Summer months and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 42. To see if the Plantation will vote to instruct the Assessors to investigate the so-called Nadeau Street, and if said street is not legally laid out as per Plantation records to rebuild same where said street is legally planned, also if necessary to raise the amount of money needed to build said street and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 43. To see if the Plantation will vote to authorize the Assessors on behalf of the Plantation to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by law for the non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim bonds for such property.
- Art. 44. To see what action if any the Plantation will take in regard to old Sewer beginning near the residence of Omer Duval and extending to the so-called Verne Hutchings House, to overcome the gas fumes that prevail during the summer months, and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 45. To see if the Plantation will authorize the Assessors to take from the miscellaneous account the sum of Two Hundred Dollars to be expended by the N. Y. A., this money to be expended for necessary equipment and supplies for N. Y. A. under the supervision of the Assessors and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 46. To see if the Plantation will vote to authorize the Assessors of Jackman to buy the so-called L. R. Moore house and land located near the price to be paid for same to be made at this meeting and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 47 To see if the Plantation will vote to raise \$40.00 to be paid State Auditor and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 48. To appoint a Budget Committee.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting, including the passing of any votes that may be considered necessary to carry into effect any vote passed under this Warrant.

The Assessors hereby give notice that they will be in session in Jackman Town Hall on Monday the 18th day of March 1940, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Hereof, fail not, and have you there this Warrant with your doings thereon.
