To the Citizens of the Plantation of Jackman:

We submit to the taxpayers and citizens the annual report of your plantation for the year ending March 1, 1941.

The rate of taxation for the past year was \$49.00 per \$1,000.00.

Although there was an improvement showed in our plantation poor account, there would have been more of a gain if we had not been without the services of a doctor. As we were several months with no doctor there were several cases that had to have hospital that could have been taken care of if a doctor had been located here, also we went to a large expense of trying to get a doctor to locate here. After several months we were fortunate to contact Dr. Victor Szanton and have him locate here, and want to say that the citizens of Jackman should be pleased to have a man of his ability locate here, and to cooperate with him as much as possible, as to be without a doctor as we were in the early months of this winter is a very serious situation.

State vaccination came up in the past year and that made a cost of \$107.50, and our snow roads, 50-50 roads and cutting bushes showed overdrafts, which in our opinion could not be helped. As was the case of 50-50 road Mr. Leclerc worked night and day on this road last spring while frost was coming out to get traffic through and Mr. Leclerc did all he possibly could at as much of a saving as possible on this road, also on all others.

On our snow roads there must be more money raised as we had to pay to state and contractors approximately \$250.00 more than has been raised in the last few years. Our repair work which was charged to miscellaneous also was an overdraft. This work was done on town hall and the Pease house, and the coming year there must be work done on the so-called Bridget Morin house.

You will see by the school that they did not receive the tuition as in past years as the enrollment was much smaller.

The delivery of federal food and freight cost \$285.14 which was an extra cost but without this our pauper account will certainly go up.

We are in hopes that the rate of valuation will be the same another year as we have more real estate to be on assessment. As it is now it is \$6.00 below the average of this county.

You will note in auditor's report about assessors changing figures for last settlement but at that time we found we had more uncollected taxes for the past years than he had, therefore, our only way was to enter same.

We thank the citizens of Jackman, school board, budget committee, town officers and all who have helped during the past year.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

JACKMAN PLANTATION, FISCAL YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1941

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jackman:

I herewith submit my annual report as superintendent of schools.

HIGH SCHOOL

As will be noted, there has been a sharp decline in our high school enrollment. This is in part due to the graduating class being larger than the entering freshmen, and in part because several have left school during the year.

This has relieved the over-crowding to a considerable degree, although it is still necessary for one class to have home-room seats in the commercial room.

Mr. Stoddard, who succeeded Mr. Rowell as principal, has proven himself well qualified both as teacher and as executive.

All other teachers are the same as last year.

This year chemistry was offered to our students for the first time. As the initial enrollment was very large it was found necessary to limit the course to juniors and seniors. The course has been very interesting and profitable and is a decided advantage to students preparing for nursing or normal school.

This is only one of many ways in which the value of a third teacher is demonstrated. Due to the time required for laboratory work it would be impossible to offer this course in a two-teacher school in addition to other subjects essential to a class A school.

As there was an increase in the number of pupils wishing to learn typing, it was necessary to purchase an additional machine. We now have eight typewriters, all in first class condition.

I feel that the school is in excellent condition and that the majority of the students are doing work of commendable quality. For further details I refer you to the principal's report.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL - Mrs. Anne Nichols

We have 23 pupils in this room, graded as follows: Grade VIII, 4; Grade VII, 6; Grade VI, 9; Grade V, 4.

The same plan of work is carried on as last year, Miss Cobb taking all social science classes, thus reducing the number of Mrs. Nichols' classes and permitting longer recitation periods.

PRIMARY SCHOOL — Miss Alice Hennigan

The enrollment in this school is 27, graded as follows: Grade IV, 7; Grade III, 7; Grade II, 4; Grade I, 2; Sub-primary, 7. This is an active, progressive school in all respects.

As in all primary schools, the main purpose is to teach reading as thoroughly as possible, as this is the essential foundation upon which all formal education is based.

STATION SCHOOL - Mrs. Maxie Johnston

The enrollment here has varied considerably during the past year. The register shows twenty different pupils enrolled, but the actual attendance on any given day has been approximately thirteen.

At one time the feasibility of closing the school and transporting the pupils was considered. However the addition of several pupils in the winter made it seem advisable to continue until the end of the year, unless there should be a considerable reduction before that time.

FINANCES

There has been a considerable decline in our income from tuition, due to the fact that we have fewer tuition pupils than for several years. On the other hand our operating costs have increased by the addition of a teacher to the high school faculty and increased demands on the supply account.

For several years the overdraft on supplies has been charged to the common school account, but it has now reached a point where it is no longer possible without overdrawing this account also. Consequently it is necessary to make a larger appropriation for supplies in order to take care of all the miscellaneous items not specifically provided for.

REPAIRS

The roof at the Station school leaks badly and should be covered with galvanized iron. Except for this only the usual minor repairs and replacements need be provided for.

All recommendations have been submitted to the budget committee for approval.

Report of High School Principal

To the Superintendent, Superintending School Board, and Citizens of Jackman:

I hereby submit my first report as principal of Jackman high school.

School opened September 3rd with a registration of sixty-four students classified as follows: Seniors 19; juniors 9; sophomores 22; freshmen 13; post graduate 1. Several students have left school since the beginning of school year, four have been transferred to other high schools and a few of reasons of their own.

Three new subjects, chemistry, civics and economics have been added to the curriculum. These three subjects are valuable and are required by those intending to be nurses.

School activities began with a well attended freshman reception and a very successful school fair in October. Due to the size of the junior class, it was found advisable to postpone junior exhibition until next year. At present, the seniors are rehearing a play to be presented at the Strand Theatre on March 28.

The aim of the faculty this year is to make school as interesting and practical as possible. In our activities period we have inaugurated the following clubs: Sewing, etiquette, boys' club, girls' basketball, camera, and airplane building.

The clubs hold their meetings on alternate weeks, and the students find the clubs both enjoyable and educational.

We have endeavored to have an assembly program every Wednesday morning in which we sing the school songs, play games and watch specialties such as tap dancing, plays, and performances of musicians.

In athletics we made a schedule of eight basketball games. Two games with Greenville, Dexter and Solon and one each with Monson and Skowhegan. The Dexter and Skowhegan games had to be cancelled because of the influenza epidemic. Both boys' and girls' basketball teams performed creditably. The boys defeated Solon and Monson.

The girls improved every game and next year should have a very good team because none are being lost through graduation.

There is considerable interest in winter sports. The winter sports team attended two winter carnivals, one at Bingham and the other in Monson and made good showings both times. Only one of this team will be lost through graduation and it should be larger and better another year. We should like to hold a winter carnival in Jackman next year.

Finally, in behalf of the faculty, I wish to thank the superintendent and superintending school board for their many suggestions and kindly criticisms with which they have aided us in our work. I also wish to express my appreciation to the citizens for the many courtesies they have extended us during the past year, and for their most encouraging support of our every activity.

To the Inhabitants of Jackman Plantation:

At your request this department, represented by Mr. F. A. Doble and Mr. M. E. Libby, has completed an audit of the accounts of your plantation officials for the municipal year ended February 20, 1940.

COMMENTS

Treasurer:

Because of the fact that there is no bank in your municipality and that your treasurer had not made deposits regularly, it was necessary to check in detail all receipts and disbursements to September 15, 1940. It has been the practice to cash checks for different people thus eliminating the necessity of sending currency through the mails. The checking account was reconciled with the bank as of August 30, 1940, and cash on hand was counted, therefore the cash balance as shown on our report as of February 29, 1940, appeared to be correct. Collector:

The commitment was compared with the valuation records and agreed, with the exception of a small variance due to fractional differences in figuring the valuations with the tax rate. Abatements, and receipts from the treasurer were examined, after which the uncollected balance, as printed in your town report, appeared correct although no mail verification was made of these outstanding taxes.

Assessors:

When our auditors were in Jackman last year your town books were posted to date and in balance. For some reason many changes were made by your assessors, making it necessary to go back to March 1, 1939, and check all accounts for the year. It was also necessary to carefully examine all payments in order to determine that all accounts had been paid. General:

It is suggested that your treasurer make deposits covering a group of receipts so that the account can be more easily reconciled at the end of your 1940 fiscal year.

Your excise tax collector should use the cash sheets, entering all receipts as made so that he may have before him an up-to-date amount collected. He should settle with the treasurer at least once each month as required by statute, and make a complete settlement on the day your books are closed at the end of each year.

If all suggestions made by our auditors are carried out, the cost of your audit will be reduced in the future.

Plantation Warrant

JACKMAN, MAINE

To Alfred Achey, Constable for the Plantation of Jackman in the County of Somerset.

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required by law to notify and warn the inhabitants of Jackman Plantation qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs to assemble at Jackman town hall, in Jackman, Monday, the Twenty-Fourth day of March, 1941, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose plantation clerk, three assessors also to be known as selectmen, five overseers of the poor, one to be known as mother's aid or aid to dependent children, treasurer, auditor, one member of school committee, fire warden for town, fire warden for forests, surveyor for wood and bark, and sealer of weights and measures.
- Art. 3. To elect a tax collector of town taxes, fix his compensation and it shall be understood that the person elected tax collector of town taxes will be required to make a full and complete settlement with the assessors of Jackman Plantation not later than March 1, 1942.
- Art. 4. To elect an excise tax collector, fix the compensation and it shall be understood that the person elected excise tax collector shall be required to turn over all excise tax money collected to treasurer of Jackman monthly, and to make complete settlement on or before March 1, 1942.
- Art. 5. To see if the plantation will vote to elect a road commissioner, fix his compensation and have it understood that one hundred dollars of the common road money shall be set aside for fall use after the state patrol is laid off if needed at said time, and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 6. To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways and bridges in said plantation for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$1,000.00.

Art. 7. To see if the plantation will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to state aid, and pass all votes respecting same as provided in section 19, chapter 25 of the revised statutes of 1916.

Recommended by budget committee, \$533.00.

Art. 8. To see if the plantation will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to state on unimproved roads under the patrol system, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$928.20.

Art. 9. To see if the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise a sum of money to expend on state maintenance in addition to the regular money raised for care of ways, highways and bridges; this is known as the 50-50 road, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$100.00.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for sidewalks for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$150.00.

Art. 11. To see if the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise a sum of money for maintaining third class roads for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$127.00.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for cutting bushes along highways for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same. Recommended by budget committee, \$150.00.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for breaking snow roads for the ensuing year, also to see if the plantation will vote to instruct the assessors to buy a plow from money raised under this article, and to hire truck and driver on an hourly wage to plow side streets of Jackman for the ensuing year and fix their compensation, and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise to pay plantation officers for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$425.00.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for support of plantation poor for the ensuing year, also to authorize the assessors to set aside a certain sum of money to employ those that are receiving help from the plantation and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$4,000.00. Set aside \$500.00.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for support of common schools for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$3,000.00.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for support of high school for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$2,000.00.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the purchase of textbooks for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$200.00.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise to pay a joint superintendent of schools for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$340.00.

- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for insurance apparatus for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for school supplies, (lights, water, typewriters, schoolroom material, books, etc.) for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$600.00.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for school repairs for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$250.00.

Art. 25. To see if the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$25.00 to help to defray the graduating expenses of the class of 1941 of Jackman high school, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$25.00.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for maintenance of Jackman public library for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$100.00.

- Art. 27. To see if the plantation will vote to elect a constable for the ensuing year, fix his compensation, accept bids for same if necessary and that it be understood that the person elected will be on duty on streets from 1 o'clock noon until 1 o'clock after midnight from May 30 to September 10, both days inclusive and subject to calls at all times of the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 28. To see if the plantation will vote to have installed a street light near the residence of Willie Thibodeau, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for street lights for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$1,080.00.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for aid to dependent children for the ensuing year and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$156.00.

Art. 31. To see if the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise a sum of money to purchase collector's and treasurer's bond for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$48.00.

Art. 32. To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the tax collector to pay to all who pay their taxes in full before June 1, 1941 2% of the tax assessed, and pass all votes respecting same.

- Art. 33. To see if the plantation will vote to raise a sum of money to cover the amount paid as of article 32, and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 34. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise to pay bond No. 2, due December 1, 1941, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$1,000.00.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise to pay coupon interest for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$460.00.

- Art. 36. To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the tax collector to charge on all unpaid taxes after September 1, the rate of 6% per annum, and pass all votes respecting same.

 Recommended by budget committee.
- Art. 37. To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the assessors to deduct from payroll 10% of any money due person or persons that are indebted to plantation within the past five years, this money collected under this article to be credited in miscellaneous fund, and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 38. To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the assessors to take from all that are indebted to plantation for taxes, 20% of amount entered on payroll, this article to apply to all persons that the plantation is indebted to who have taxes due the plantation and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 39. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate to employ county school nurse for the ensuing year, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$65.00.

Art. 40. To see if the plantation will vote to instruct the assessors to procure a temporary loan in anticipation of taxes, said loan to be repaid by tax receipts of the fiscal year, and pass all votes respecting same.

- Art. 41. To see if the plantation will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of having daylight saving time from April 28 to September 28, both days inclusive, and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 42. To see if the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$50.00 to defray the expenses for the ensuing year for band concerts to be held weekly during summer months, alternating one week at Colby Park and next week at Legion Hall, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee.

Art. 43. To see if the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$300.00 to be expended in conjunction with the federal government on the N. Y. A. projects, this being the plantation's share of expense for material and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee, \$300.00.

- Art. 44. To see what sum of money if any the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise in regard to repairs of tomb, and pass all votes respecting same.
- Art. 45. To see what sum of money the plantation will, if any, vote to raise to tar Coburn avenue, from the residence of the so-called Joseph Dallairre home to the Willie Thibodeau home, the money expended on gravel on this to be taken from the common road money, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee.

Art. 46. To see what sum, if any, the plantation will vote to recommend to take from the third class apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous treatment to third class roads, as to be expended on the so-called Nichols road, and pass all votes respecting same.

Recommended by budget committee.

Art. 47. To see if the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise \$100.00 to be expended on repairs of town hall basement and wall, and pass all votes respecting same.

Art. 48. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting including the passing of any and all votes that may be considered necessary to carry into effect any and all votes passed under this warrant.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and have you there this warrant with your doings thereon.
