REPORT OF SUPERVISOR.

In presenting my report of the schools in Fryeburg for the year ending February 20th, 1880, let me say that I have endeavored to execute the duties of Supervisor of Schools faithfully and impartially.

CONDITION OF THE SCHOOLS.

The success attending the work of instruction in our schools the past year, has on the whole been very good. The teachers have manifested a good degree of interest in their schools, causing thereby, the scholars to feel more earnest in their work. It is to be regretted that all who attempt to teach do not have the faculty of imparting to others what they actually know. It is then essential to have, not only the required amount of knowledge, but the faculty of imparting that knowledge to others.

With a single exception, no trouble has arisen in any of the schools to retard the progress. Owing to a little dissatisfaction on the part of a few, the Summer term in No. 17, was not so profitable as it would otherwise have been. There was no good cause whatever for any dissatisfaction. It does not pay to be too sensitive in school matters.

TO THE AGENTS.

You cannot be too careful in the selection of your teachers. It is always best to hire, if possible, those who have been tested. Don't think because your school is small that any teacher will do.

TO THE PARENTS.

Your attention has before been called to the fact that you do not show that interest in the schools which you ought. There has been but little, if any, improvement in that direction, while you may feel the greatest interest in the education of your children, by visiting your school, the tendency is to stimulate the scholars and teacher to greater activity. You who allow your children to be often away from school may expect them to make but little improvement.

TEXT BOOKS.

When I entered upon my duties, I found several kinds of Spelling Books in use and quite a number of schools very poorly supplied. No record of adoption having been entered within five years. I deemed it best to adopt Monro's series of Spelling Books, thereby removing the several kinds that were used. I procured from the publishers, introduction rates and adopted this.

In relation to the use of Hagars series of Arithmetics (although not legally adopted.) I wish to say that while they are, with but few exceptions, the only ones used in town, I recommend that they remain as they now are for the present.

Nearly all the schools in town have been supplied with a set of Watson's School Maps.

Every School Room should contain a Globe and a proper supply of maps. They not only aid the teacher in his explanations, but serve to make them more readily comprehended by the scholars.

A word to those on whom the duty of hiring teachers, for the coming year will devolve. The Statistical Summary may prove an unsafe guide for you to take in the selection of teachers, for the reason that a teacher may be successful in a small school and quite the reverse in a large school. To obviate this, I make the following classification: First, those teachers that I consider best qualified to instruct and govern any school in Town. Second, those teachers that are profitable in the smaller schools.
