

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

To Norman Charles; a Constalle in the town of Fryeburg in the County of Oxford, Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Fryeburg, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town, on Monday, the fifth day of March, 1906, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting

Art 2. To choose a clerk for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town reports of 1905-6.

Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 5. To chose a Treasurer for the year ensuing.

Art. 6. To choose one member of the School Board for three years.

Art. 7. To choose one member of the School Board

for two years.

Art. 8. To choose a Road Commissioner and vote his compensation per day.

Art. 9. To chose a Collector of Taxes and vote his compensation per day.

Art. 10. To choose all other necessary Town Officers required by law.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repairs of roads and bridges for the year ensuing.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Schools for the year ensuing

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the Poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 14. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for the current expenses of the town for the year ensuing.

Art. 15. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for the purchase of school-books for the year ensuing.

Art 16. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for the repairs of schoolhouses for the year ensuing.

Art. 17. To see if the town will grant and raise money to pay the interest on the town bonds for the year 1906.

Art. 18. To see if the town will grant and raise money as a sinking fund on the town debt.

Art. 19. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for Grover Post, G. A. R.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay town notes and the interest on the same.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the tuition of scholars who attend the Academy.

Art 22. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money to be expended on the state road.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to maintain schools in the Toll Bridge and Fryeburg Center districts for the school year of 1906.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Treasurer to convey to Freeman Franklin the right the town has by tax title to his present homestead in the Haley neighborhood on payment of the tax, costs and interest.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Treasurer to sell the town's interest in the land acquired by tax deed, on payment of tax. costs and interests.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to repair Canal Bridge and raise money to pay for the same.

Art. 27 To see if the town will vote to build a drain to take away the water on Oxford and Smith streets near the buildings of Mrs. F. A. Wiley, and raise money to pay for the same.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on taxes that are unpaid on Jan. 1, 1907.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to transfer the "Weston Bridge Account" from the hands of the selectmen to the hands of the Town Treasurer. Art. 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the town house at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT.

The Superintending School Committee, at its first meeting, elected Mr. E. L. Adams. Superintendent of schools and the members congr., tulated themselves that the town had the best man available for the place. On July 27, 1905, Mr. Adams resigned and the present incumbrent was elected to fill the vacancy.

There have been no radical departures from former years, as regards the management of the schools. Your Superintendent has employed local teachers where it seemed profitable, and they have given excellent satisfaction.

The schoolhouse at No. Fryeburg has been put in good repair. Some of the citizens thought the S. S. Com. ought to make an addition to the building, making another room but the Committee did not consider that they were authorized to do this. Some radical change ought to be made in this school, as satisfactory work cannot be done where there are so many scholars of all ages. This does not imply any criticism of the teacher, who is doing as well as could be expected under the conditions existing there. Let me say here, that the teachers in all the schools are doing excellent work. I do not believe they can be bettered at the wages we pay.

The schoolhouses throughout the town are in fairly good repair; painting and repairing seats being about all that is necessary.

The school-books, especially the Readers and Arithmetics are badly worn and need to be replaced by new ones. The teachers complain that the Arithmetics in use for the younger scholars are not as good as some other text books and I agree with them and think a different book should be used. An appropriation, sufficiently large, should be made, so that the school rooms may be provided with suitable dictionaries, charts, etc. One of the schools has no dictionary, and some of the other schools, mere apologies.

There has been a misunderstanding in regard to the liability of the town for the tuition of its High School scholars. The course taken must be of standard grade and the state Superintendent has decided that a business course in any school is not of standard grade.

There has been a tendency, and this tendency is increasing, year by year, to advance the town scholars into the Academy before they are prepared to enter the same. This tendency should be discouraged by teachers and parents. In order for the scholar to have his tuition paid by the town, he must have a certificate from the Superintending School Committee and the Superintendent of schools, stating that he has completed the common school studies and is entitled by scholarship to enter a secondary school of standard grade.

We ought not to expect our scholars to accomplish in

nine years of 27 weeks, as much as is accomplished by the Mass schools, in nine years of 36 weeks each.

There have been several flagrant cases of truancy, and unless this abuse is corrected, the law in regard to same will have to be enforced. The following is the itemized account of the schools expenses.

Auditor's Report.

I find the financial standing of the town to be as stated in their respective reports. I find that your chairman of selectmen, Mr. Hutchins, who has had charge of the town books has kept his accounts correctly and has been very careful and painstaking in having when possible, all orders drawn by him, vouched for by itemized bills. Although these bills do not appear in this town report they are on file with the town officers and can be examined by any one, and I think this system continued every year will show our taxpayers where and in what manner every dollar of the towns money is expended.
