Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

To Norman Charles, a constable in the Town of Fryeburg, in the County of Oxford, Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Fryeburg, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town, on Monday, the fourth day of March, 1907, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town reports for 1906-1907.

Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 5. To choose a Treasurer for the year ensuing.

Art. 6. To choose one member of the School Board for three years.

Art. 7. To choose a Road Commissioner or Road Commissioners for the year ensuing, and vote the com-

pensation per day.

Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector and vote his compensation.

Art. 9. To choose all other necessary Town Officers required by law.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repairs of Roads and Bridges for the year ensuing.

Art. 11. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money to be expended on the State Road.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Schools for the year ensuing.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the Poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the current expenses of the town for the year ensuing.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the purchase of school books for the year ensuing.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repairs of school-houses for the year ensuing.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay the interest on the town bonds for 1907.

Art. 18. To see if the town will grant and raise money as a sinking fund on the town debt.

Art. 19. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for Grover Post, G. A. R.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay town notes and the interest on the same.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the tuition of scholars who attend the Academy.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to repair Walker's bridge, so called, near Geo. H. Walker's.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to take action to protect the town from the Moth pests, and provide means therefor.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to have a Town History written and raise money to pay for the same.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to build a drain at North Fryeburg from near A. E. Gray's to Kimball Brook, and raise money to pay for the same.

Art. 26. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$2,000.00 to provide a building to accommodate a graded school at the North end of the town.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Treasurer to sell the town's interest in the land acquired by tax deed on payment of taxes, costs and interests.

N. B. While the foregoing statement shows a balance against the town of only \$1,560.69, it should be noted that the resources, so offset against liabilities, cannot be used to pay the outstanding bonds and notes of the town, but will be used only to pay its outstanding bills, coupons due and the further bills that will be incurred by reason of the appropriations made for the past municipal year.

As a matter of fact, the town owes one thousand dollars in the form of bonds, and thirty-five hundred dollars in form of notes, which it has no funds, duly raised, to pay and which sum it will have to raise by future assessments in order to relieve itself of debt.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

At the close of the fiscal year, I submit to the citizens of the town the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

I am glad to report a fairly prosperous year. Your Superintendent has been hindered considerably by the teachers resigning, in several instances within a few days of the beginning of school, so that some of the schools have not closed, as the report goes to the printer.

The several schools have been in session 28 weeks during the year, with the exception of the Haley school which has had only 26 weeks, so that there will be due them 2 weeks extra during next year. This was thought to be better than the placing of a new teacher in that school for only two weeks.

Sickness among the scholars has materially affected the attendance in all of the schools, the attendance not being nearly as large as usual.

I would call special attention to the matter of transportation of scholars. The Superintending School Committee decided that no transportation should be paid where the distance was less than a mile and a half. This rule has not been strictly regarded as it seemed too far to ask small scholars to go alone on isolated and

exposed roads. We are paying too much for transportation, and I would remind the citizens of the town that the School Board are empowered by the statutes to transport the whole or a part of distance from home of scholar to the school building, or to take the child and board him if the same could be done for a smaller sum than the amount asked for transportation.

The price paid for transportation to the Centre schoolhouse for the winter term seems large, the following explanation may not be out of place. The transportation was let to the one who was to teach and she decided to board in the vicinity of the schoolhouse and so could not transport the scholars. I engaged Mrs. W. H. Howard to teach her daughter at a certain price per week, and finding that I could not do this legally, I had to make other arrangements. Mr. Howard agreed to carry the child for \$35.00 which was a less amount than was offered for the conveyance of the scholars by anyone else.

The amount of transportation should be considerably decreased another year.

There has been but a small amount of repairs made on the schoolhouses during the year. The following repairs should be made next year: The schoolhouses at East Fryeburg and Harbor should be painted, also the schoolhouse at Smart's Hill should be painted and shingled if this has not already been done, as it has been provided for. There should be a suitable shed and water closet built at Toll Bridge. These are the large items of repairs for the coming year. The chimney at the Centre schoolhouse should be examined.

It would be for the welfare of the schools, if the par-

ents would visit the schools and learn of their condition and the work done for themselves.

Let me say just a word in regard to the school at No. Fryeburg. The work in that school is too hard for one teacher. Miss Melvina Green was engaged for that school for the Spring Term. She refused to return and gave as the reason that she could not do justice to the school or to herself by remaining. Miss Green is an excellent teacher and her opinion ought to have some weight with the voters of Fryeburg.

In the amount paid for Books and supplies is included the amount paid for janitors supplies, as toilet paper, brooms, brushes, etc.
