Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

To Norman Charles, a constable in the Town of Fryeburg, in the County of Oxford, Greeting :—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Fryeburg, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town on Monday, the first day of March, A. D., 1909, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town reports for 1908-1909.

Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 5. To choose a Treasurer for the year ensuing.

Art. 6. To choose one member of the School Board for three years.

Art. 7. To choose a Road Commissioner or Road Commissioners for the year ensuing and vote the compensation.

Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector and vote his compensation.

Art. 9. To choose all other necessary Town Officers required by law.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repairs of roads and bridges for the year ensuing.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote yes or no upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid.

Art. 12. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart for the permanent improvement of the state road within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for 1907, being the sum of \$137.00.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the year ensuing.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the Poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the current expenses of the town for the year ensuing.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the purchase of school books for the year ensuing.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repairs and insurance on school houses for the year ensuing.

Art. 18. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for Grover Post, G. A. R.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay the tuition of scholars who attend the Academy.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to make any repairs on the Town House, and to provide means therefor.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise a sum of money, not to exceed \$300.00, to be devoted to the writing and publishing of a Town History.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to set off any parts of the streets in the village of Fryeburg, to be used for sidewalks, and if it is so, votes to determine the manner in which such sidewalks shall be so set off.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Treasurer to sell and convey such lands in said town as it acquired by sales thereof for unpaid taxes, and if it so votes to authorize and empower said Treasurer to make, execute and deliver to any purchaser thereof a proper quit claim deed of such lands, or any part thereof, on payment to him, of the amount of taxes, interest and costs thereon.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to accept the \$200.00 bequeathed to it by the last will and testament of the late Harriet G. Gordon, in trust for the care of the cemetery on Smarts Hill, and to execute the trust thereon conferred on said town.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to maintain schools in Haley, Fryeburg Center, Toll Bridge and Smart's Hill districts for the year 1909.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to lay a drain to take care of the surface water on the street leading near L. J. Olneys house to the corn factory and raise money to pay for the same.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to ratify the action of the Selectmen in depositing the Bachelder fund, \$1000.00, in the savings department of the United States Trust Co., and \$500.00 in the Maine Savings Bank.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to buy a stone crusher or some crushed stone for use on the roads, and to raise money for the same.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to lay out a road continuing the road from a point near J. J. Johnson's house to the New Boston road so called.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to adopt the E. F. McIntire Traction Motor Snow Roller for breaking its roads in the future, and if so, to see what provision they will make to have one of the rollers built for use the coming winter.

Art. 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectman give notice that they shall be in session for for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.

We submit the report of the Municipal Officers of the Town for the year ending Feb. 17, 1909.

We have endeavored to place before the citizens of the

Town, in this our annual report, a plain and accurate statement of all municipal accounts and affairs for the current year, and we appreciate the efforts of all the other officers of the Town, in the careful manner in which they have conducted the business of their several departments so as to keep within the appropriations, and they have succeeded so well that after paying the bills for the year, we found that we had sufficient funds to pay the outstanding \$1000.00 in Chair Factory Bonds, and this has been done. And we congratulate the citizens of Fryeburg, that there are no bonds or notes against the town.

As Mr. P. W. Seavey did not care to stay on the Town Farm another year, we hired Mr. Frank C. Eastman and wife, while the balance against the Town Farm looks large, it is through no fault of Mr. and Mrs. Eastman, as we consider that they have tried hard and succeeded well but owing to the drouth and grasshoppers, etc., that the crops were cut off somewhat, the hay crop especially, so that we were obliged to sell considerable of the stock at discount, which makes the balance larger, but we found everything in good shape.

We have had quite extensive repairs made on Walker's bridge and the cost of the same is shown by the Report. The work was done by Mr. C. A. Broughton of Conway, and we now have a Bridge—if no accident happens—that will be in good condition for years.

School Report.

The school year has come to an uneventful close. The schools were finished on Feb. 19, with the exception of the Harbor school, which ended a week later. The North Fryeburg school is enjoying two extra weeks from the Bachelder fund.

Such degree of success as has been attained is due, of course, largely to the teachers. We have been exceptionally fortunate in this respect. Although we regret that we have to report only thirty-two weeks of school this year, the same amount as last year, yet believe that we are justified in our policy in retaining successful teachers, even at the expense of another week of school. In the larger schools, especially, it has been found wasteful of all that constitutes scholarly progress, to change teachers. The additions to individual salaries have been small, yet the whole difference in that item alone, between this year and last, is two hundred and four dollars.

The transportation bills are over a hundred dollars more than those of last year. In almost every route a little more per week has been asked. The Burgess children, living in the Fox Evans house, have been brought to the village, during the last term, with the Ballards. The Brackett children returned to their home in Fish Street, and have been conveyed to North Fryeburg, and in several routes young scholars have been added to the number transported.

The Committee would be glad to have the opinion of of citizens regarding the transportation problem. It is a question as to where the town's duty to the child ends, and the parents' begins. We have set a mile and a half as our inside limit for the establishing of a route. Sometimes it seems no cruelty to make a pupil walk farther than that. The State Superintendent tells us that children are walking two miles and a half in some towns in Maine. When the plea is brought in that children are delicate and cannot walk the required mile and a half in bad weather, it seems to us that

that is where the parents' duty begins, and that education that involves no sacrifices will not be lightly valued.

We have changed our policy regarding janitors fees, and have added fifty cents to the fee, if kindlings are furnished. That has been found an economical move. Wood suitable for kindlings was hard get when needed, and was sometimes used extravagantly.

From the repair fund the Smart's Hill school house has been shingled, the blackboards all over town have been painted, and a new blackboard much needed in the Village grammar room has been added. In several rooms where the seats were too low, we have had them raised by placing them on blocks of wood. The numerous small needs in the way of glass, knobs, hinges, stove repairs and so forth, have been attended to as they have arisen. During the year the East Fryeburg school house should be painted, and the subject of painting the village school house should be considered and decided. It may be more economical to paint it now than to wait longer. The insurance on the village school house expires in April. The Committee advises the insuring of that building, and the North Fryeburg school house.

In regard to books there is little to report, as no changes of importance have been made. As much new reading matter as possible has been added, and we have invested heavily in writing books. Pupils have had a daily writing lesson, and we hope that we see a decided improvement in the three R's.

The outstanding bills proved to be not as large as estimated when the reports were made out last year, so there is a small balance to be brought over, to be added to this year's assets. The financial statement for the year follows:
