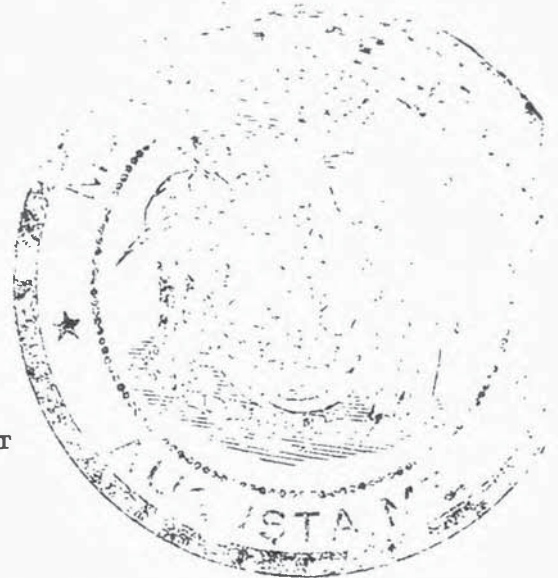

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

To Norman Charles, a constable in the Town of Fryeburg,
in the County of Oxford. Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Fryeburg, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town, on Monday, the seventh day of March, A. D. 1910, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town reports for the year ending Feb. 18, 1910.

Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 5. To choose a Treasurer for the year ensuing.

Art. 6. To choose two members of the School Board; one for three years, and one for one year.

Art. 7. To choose a Road Commissioner or Road Commissioners for the year ensuing and to vote the compensation.

Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector and vote his compensation.

Art. 9. To choose all other necessary Town Officers required by law.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repair of roads and bridges for the year ensuing.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote yes or no upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by chapter

69, Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways, for the year 1910.

Art. 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$450, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the year ensuing.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for current expenses for the year ensuing.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the purchase of school books for the year ensuing.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repair of schoolhouses for the year ensuing.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the tuition of scholars who attend the academy.

Art. 19. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for Grover Post, G. A. R.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to take a re-valuation of the real estate in the town, and if it so votes to determine the manner in which such re-valuation shall be taken, and to provide means for the expense thereof.

Art. 21. To see what action the town will take to protect the town from the moth pests and to provide means therefor.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to maintain schools in the Haley district, Fryeburg Center, Toll Bridge and Smart's Hill schools, as recommended by the school board.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$150 or more, as a fund to maintain the lot of Alexander Stevens in the West Fryeburg Cemetery.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 as a fund to maintain the lot of Dr. Clement J. Adams, in the old burying-ground.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to install lights on the line of the Fryeburg Electric Light Co.'s line of wire at Ballard brook bridge and near there; also to supply the light at Weston's bridge and other lights to be put in at the outskirts of the village through the Fryeburg Village Fire Corporation—as to village lights, also to provide a light in Canal bridge, near Fryeburg Center.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to abate the taxes or any part of them on the mill of Hobson & Twombly.

Art. 27. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$100 to assist the North Fryeburg Library Association.

Art. 28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

School Report.

It is a great satisfaction to the school board that we can report a school year of greater length by two weeks than we have ever enjoyed before. When the schools close on March eleventh, we shall have completed a thirty-four weeks year. This has been made possible by various conditions, chiefly in the transportation department. The longer Winter term has been appreciated by students and parents alike.

The schools have had a quiet, but busy and profitable year, several of them under teachers whom we have been fortunate enough to retain term after term.

We congratulate ourselves as a town especially, because we have had so little trouble with truancy. It has come to be an unusual thing for a child of school age to stay away from school for a day, without a good excuse. The teachers deserve credit for the attention they have given to this matter, and for the success of their efforts to instill the idea that when school is in session, the pupil must, quite inevitably be there. To the parents, too, praise is due, that, often at a temporary sacrifice, the children are kept in school with so few interruptions.

The insurance and repairs arranged for in the appropriations last March, have been attended to. Insurance policies for three thousand dollars on the Village school building have been renewed for five years, and the North Fryeburg schoolhouse has been insured for one thousand dollars, also for five years. The policies were deposited with the town clerk.

The schoolhouses at the Village, East Fryeburg and Smart's Hill have been painted, and many small repairs in carpentering and mason work have been made. Six new seats and desks were bought for the Village Grammar room, to accommodate the increased number of pupils. We have also bought new seats for the West Fryeburg school, to take the place of the old, straight-backed benches. The improve-

ment in the appearance of the room and in the comfort of the pupils is great.

The school board urges that the town adopt a definite policy of renovating one school room a year, until they are all on an up-to-date basis. The durability of the old benches has been their only strong point. They are not comfortable nor clean. Moreover the seats are double, which makes for noise and confusion in a room. Most of the schools already have separate seats for the small children, and we believe the older ones would take care of and appreciate new seats. We would advise beginning with the Harbor school next year, and putting in a new floor and new seats there. The following year, the East Fryeburg school might have the improvements, and the smaller schools follow in turn.

We also recommend that new out buildings be built at East Fryeburg, away from the basement.

Our rural schools have great need of maps, as no new ones have been added for years. If a little more money could be appropriated for the books and supplies fund, with the understanding that this might cover maps also, a beginning could be made of equipping the school rooms with necessary maps.

As we are to have more State money next year, it seems a favorable time to urge that the school year be increased to thirty-six weeks. The appropriation asked for is considerably smaller than it has been hitherto, and we hope the town will feel that it is a suitable time to make our school year of standard length.

The appropriations which we recommend and which we believe would cover the items mentioned above, are as follows: General fund for schools, twenty-four hundred dollars, for repairs three hundred dollars, for books and supplies, two hundred and fifty dollars.
