Warrant

To Norman Charles, a Constable in the Town of Fryeburg, in the County of Oxford:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Fryeburg, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town on Monday, the sixth day of March, A. D., 1911 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles; to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the year ensuing.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town reports for the year ending Feb. 17, 1911.
- Art. 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the year ensuing.
 - Art. 5. To choose a Treasurer for the year ensuing.
- Art: 6. To choose one member of the School Board for three years.
- Art. 7. To choose a Road Commissioner or Road Commissioners for the year ensuing and to vote the compensation.
- Art. 8. To choose a Tax Collector and vote his compensation.
- Art. 9. To choose all other necessary Town Officers required by law.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repair of roads and bridges for the year ensuing.

- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Was taken from last year's surplus, \$14,677-20 Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1911.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate, in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$450, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the year ensuing.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for current expenses for the year ensuing.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the purchase of school books for the year ensuing.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repair of schoolhouses for the year ensuing.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the tuition of scholars who attend the Academy.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for Grover Post, G. A. R.
- Art. 20. To see what action the town will take to protect the town from the moth pests and to provide means therefor.
 - Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to maintain

schools in the Haley district, Center, Toll Bridge and Smart's Hill schools as recommended by the school board.

- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to build a side-walk on the northeast side of Smith street from the M. C. R. R. station to Main street and to raise the sum of (\$500) five hundred dollars for the same.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$1,000) one thousand dollars to raise the road commencing at Lake bridge by O. W. Osgood's to the bridge east of C. T. Shortridge's, to a water level.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to sell Menotomy and Mt. Tom schoolhouses.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of (\$250) two hundred and fifty dollars to repair the town farm buildings.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to cut the pulp wood on the town farm for part payment of repairs, if so voted.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to abate the taxes on the Mill lot, buildings and machinery, owned by The Hobson & Twombly Co.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to buy one or more steel cages for installation in the Village Corporation building at Fryeburg Village, to be used as a lock-up, provided the Village Corporation will authorize such installation in said building and if the town so votes, to see how much it will raise and appropriate for such purpose.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to lay a drain on Portland Street in Fryeburg Village, to be connected with either the drain on Oxford Street, or the drain on Main Street, for the purpose of carrying away the water from said Portland Street, and if it so votes, to see how much money it will raise and appropriate for that purpose.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to extend the outlet of its present drain on Main Street from its termina-

tion on the so-called "Cave lot" now owned by Miss Anna Barrows, to such point as will be satisfactory to her, the town now having no right to vent said drain on her land, and if it so votes, to see how much money it will vote to raise and appropriate for such purpose.

- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of (\$100) one hundred dollars or more as a fund to maintain the lot of Dr. Clement J. Adams, in the old burying ground.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriatae the sum of one hundred dollars to pay for the necessary statutory repairs on the cemetery at West Fryeburg and the cemetery at Fryeburg Village.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to abate the taxes on the Fryeburg Electric Light Company's plant.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to buy a new road machine and raise the money for the same.
- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate (\$300) three hundred dollars for a drain at North Fryeburg, commencing at a point below Stephen Charles' house, on the east side of the road, and running to Kimball brook.
- Art. 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT.

Our school year of thirty-seven weeks is drawing toward its close. It has been a thoroughly successful year, with a corps of teachers unusually efficient, and a student body of which we feel proud. We often hear of the superiority of the old times and the old schools, but at least we believe that in the present generation, childrengo to school more willingly and eagerly than they used to do, and that their general attitude is thus more receptive to the good influences of school life. A healthychild should not "creep unwillingly to school" in these days.

We have suffered more than usual from sickness in our schools this year, and in three districts there are still some weeks to be made up, if the time can be found at the end of the spring term. That explains some of our unexpended balance.

The largest items of expense under the repair fund have been for supplying new seats and a hard wood floor at the Harbor schoolhouse and for the building of the belfry at North Fryeburg. In the latter district the pupils and teachers deserve great credit for their public spirit. Their own funds paid for the bell and a substantial sum toward the belfry. The changes planned for East Fryeburg were not made, as there was a preference in the neighborhood for the present arrangement of rooms. Next year that schoolhouse should have the new floor The West Fryeburg schoolhouse, too, is in great need of a new floor. When the seats were changed there last year, we were not able to afford the new floor. That is one of our largest schools now, and for the sake of warmth and cleanliness, it should have this improvement.

There are few changes to report in regard to books. Our policy has been, as we are obliged to renew our books, to buy those which are up-to-date, without making the radical move of changing text-books in an entire subject at once. We have been able this year to supply physiologies, which are thoroughly modern, to all the ninth grade The new Civics readers, too, which have been put in the hands of the older scholars have given general satisfaction and will help them, we hope, on leaving school, to understand some of the ideals of good citizenship. Almost every school this winter has had at least one class using for supplementary reading, a story teaching kindness to animals. For children living in the country it seems reasonable to place more emphasis on love for animals and humanity in the treatment of them, than on the usual nature study.

Last year, through a mistake, the extra money asked for, under the book fund to use for maps, was not appropriated. Geography, as it has been taught, has been one of our weakest subjects, largely because we have so few maps. We need them greatly and we ask this year for an appropriation of three hundred dollars to cover books and supplies and maps.

We also ask an appropriation of three hundred dollars for repairs and improvements.

Under the general fund we ask an appropriation of twenty-two hundred dollars.
