School Report

As another school year is nearly completed it seems fitting as well as a duty required of me by law that a report of the receipts and expenditures of the money raised for the support of the public schools by the voters of this town be submitted to them for their consideration and approval.

The expense of conveying pupils will not be less than last year, yet I feel that we have been as economical as the just claims of the pupils would permit.

In accordance with Section 5, Chapter 58, P. L. 1913, after Sept. 1, 1914, all teachers are required to hold a State certificate or a non-removable teaching permit for a period not to exceed one year.

The teachers have complied with this law and all except four are possessors of a State certificate (see appended teachers' statistics), and nearly every one of them has had considerable experience in teaching, and as a result of their experience and training I am assured that the present school year, longer by three weeks than last year, has been a profitable one to the scholars, an evidence of which fact is the good progress made by the pupils and the discipline which they have received.

As to repairs which have been made, will say that the Haley school house has been thoroughly repaired by painting inside, laying a new floor and installing new seats and desks.

The outside has been painted and one side of the roof shingled.

In addition to the repairs the bushes have been cut and removed to a suitable distance from the school house as to be a protection against loss by fire.

The roof of the Toll Bridge school house has been covered with metal roofing.

The following repairs are recommended to be made the ensuing year:

To shingle one side Smart's Hill school house and both sides Center school house.

To paint one coat, the North Fryeburg, Toll Bridge, Center and West Fryeburg school houses.

New seats and desks are needed in the Toll Bridge school house—to make these repairs a larger appropriation than usual will be necessary.

Tables of statistics are herewith appended for present use and future reference.

Again thanking the School Committee for their advice and the teachers for their coöperation, I would recommend that the following sums of money be voted and raised for the year ensuing:

Common school general fund, twenty-six hundred dollars.

School books, three hundred dollars.

Repairs on school buildings, four hundred dollars.

Warrant For Town Meeting

To CORIDON T. SHORTRIDGE, Constable of the Town of Fryeburg, in the County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Fryeburg, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the 1st day of March, A. D. 1915, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside over said meeting.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the town reports for the year ending Feb. 10th, 1915.

Article 4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the year ensuing, and vote their compensation.

Article 5. To choose a Treasurer for the year ensuing.

Article 6. To choose one member of the School Board for three years.

Article 7. To see how many Road Commissioners the town will vote to have, not exceeding three.

Article 8. To choose a Tax Collector and vote his compensation.

Article 9. To elect one or more fire wards; vote their compensation, and raise a sum of money for same.

Article 10. To choose all other necessary officers required by law.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repairs of roads and bridges for the year ensuing.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Article 13. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum sum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools in the year ensuing.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of poor for the year ensuing.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for current expenses for the year ensuing.

Article 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the purchase of school books for the year ensuing.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repairs of schoolhouses for the year ensuing.

Article 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the tuition of scholars who attend the Academy.

Article 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Grover Post, G. A. R.

Article 21. To see what action the town will take to protect the town from the moth pests and to provide means therefor.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to pay the School Board for their services, and if so voted, how much shall be paid.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to maintain a school in the Smart's Hill district.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of twelve hundred dollars toward the erection of a suitable monument in the memory of the Soldiers of the town of Fryeburg, who sacrificed their lives in defence of their country in the war of 1861. Said sum so raised and appropriated to be

used therefor in conjunction with the sum of not less than one thousand dollars to be provided by Grover Post No. 126, Grand Army of the Republic.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to construct an intake between the houses of Benjamin E. Brown and Chas. E. Fox on Main Street in the Village of Fryeburg, and connect the same with the present sewer pipe, which discharges the surface water on said Street; and if it so votes, to see what money it will raise and appropriate to pay for the same.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of two hundred dollars, bequeathed to it in trust under the will of S. M. Wadsworth, income thereof to be applied to the perpetual care of the Wadsworth Cemetery lot in Fryeburg.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote a separate sum to continue the work done on Smith St. last year, and if so, vote to see what sum it will raise.

Article 28. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money to pay the deficiency in the last year's appropriation for roads and bridges.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to accept the town way in Fryeburg Village. Starting from the old fair ground road near the house of Alvin Cram and ending at the house lot of John Burke, as laid out by the Selectmen, Dec. 26, 1914, and if it so votes to raise money for same.

Article 30. To see if the town will grant and raise the necessary amount required by law for repairs on the State aid and State roads.

Article 31. To see if the town will take any action in regard to buying road machinery.

Article 32. To see if the town wants to take any action in regard to letting the snow roller.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to raise money to fix the Eber Johnson road.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to raise a special appropriation of \$500.00 to fix the road from Hemlock Bridge to the Denmark line.

Article 35. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money if needed to pay road bills, not exceeding \$1000.00.

Article 36. To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
