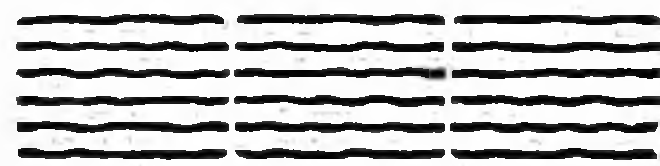

Our schools during the past year, with but two exceptions, have been under the instruction of the very best teachers and as the success of the schools depends mostly upon the teacher there is no need of my telling you that our schools have been profitable and the money well expended. We need *more* money. If you will stop and consider for a moment you will realize that you are raising the same amount now that you did when you could hire a teacher for from \$2 to \$3 per week and get them boarded for from \$1 to \$2. Fuel is also higher now than it used to be. Good teachers are in great demand and command a good salary, and if we want them to teach our schools we must raise more money to pay them with. It is hard to get a teacher boarded now for less than three dollars a week. Therefore if we wish to have our schools on a level with the schools of other towns we must have more money to put them there. The times demand it. And I recommend that we raise \$800 instead of \$650, as has been the rule.

Last year the superintendent in his report spoke of the necessity of another school room at the Thoroughfare. So far as I know no steps have been taken to better the situation there. The same number of pupils were registered this winter as last, and there is every reason to believe that the school will be larger next winter. The seats are overcrowded. Some have had to furnish their own seats and

benches. Something must be done before another winter in order to make the school profitable. Therefore I recommend that we vote to make the necessary change in the school house to accommodate the pupils.

The present out building at the Thoroughfare is a public nuisance. There should be a new one built there with two rooms. These rooms should have bolts and locks on them, and the keys should be in the care of the teacher. Another menace to the health of the pupils in this school is the sink. The water that is turned into this flows into the basement and there remains to form a cesspool in which diseases will germinate. It ought to be changed.

When I took charge of the schools I found a great many of the text books in very bad condition. I have done all I could to remedy this, buying all the books my conscience would allow me to, for I had to overrun the money raised for that purpose. I recommend raising \$150 this year.

The school house in the West District needs some repairs. There has been only one door there this year that has been safe to use.

While I was disappointed in not getting the teacher for the Free High school that I hired, yet I think the school was a success. The attendance was good and much advancement was made by pupils. There were 30 registered; average attendance was 27.7.

Town Warrant.

To Frank Beverage, Constable of the town of North Haven, in the County of Knox, in the State of Maine.

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of North Haven, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Union Hall, on Monday, the third day of March A. - 12 To choose Superintending School Committee.
- 13 To choose a School Superintendent.
- 14 To choose a Road Commissioner or Commissioners.
- 15 To see what action the town will take in regard to the collection of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- 16 To choose a Collector of taxes.
- 17 To choose a Constable.
- 18 To choose Truant Officer or Officers.
- 19 To choose Surveyors of Wood and Bark.
- 20 To choose Surveyors of Lumber.

- 21 To choose a Pound Keeper.
- 22 To provide a place for a Pound.
- 23 To choose Fence Viewers.
- 24 To choose an Undertaker and all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 25 To see what sum of money the town will raise to defray Town Charges.
- 26 To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair bridge at Beach.
- 27 To see what sum of money the town will raise for repairs on roads and bridges.
- 28 To see what sum of money the town will raise to clear roads of snow.
- 29 To see what sum of money the town will raise in a labor tax for repairs on roads and bridges and fix the price of labor on same.
- 30 To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of common schools
- 31 To see what sum of money the town will raise to be expended in a Free High school.
- 32 To see what sum of money the town will raise for free text books.
- 33 To see what sum of money the town will raise for repairs of school buildings.
- 34 To see whether the town will appropriate the sum of three hundred (\$300) dollars or more to grade and otherwise improve the highway between the store of F. H. Smith & Co., on the east, and the property of Mark Calderwood on the west.
