# Report of Supt. of Schools.

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## FELLOW CITIZENS :

It needs but few words of mine to report the condition of our schools, as this is a small town and we have the schools which speak for themselves.

Accompanying this report is a tabulated outline of the attendance, financial condition of the schools, etc., a careful inspection is invited.

There is an increasing interest in the schools and school work as is evidenced by the attendance and enthusiasm at the Free High school, the first goal for which the majority of our pupils are striving. In most cases the past year I think we have received our moneys worth from the schools.

It has been our purpose to hire teachers with former experience in the school-room or with normal training, both if possible. An effort was made to hire teachers at lower wages, but good teachers are in demand, and they put us off to correspond for better positions, thus obliging us in some instances to delay the commencement of the schools.

One of the evils of the present school method is the changing of teachers too often. Employing a new teacher is something of a lottery, too often the chances are against us. In the hiring of teachers largely rests the success or failure of our schools. When a successful teacher of character and ability has been secured his or her services should be retained as long as possible at any reasonable cost. A teacher who has had a school several terms knows the capabilities and needs of the pupils and the requirements of the community. No time is lost in classifying and learning the pupils.

We feel there is sometimes truth in the remark that had the teacher been paid the money and sent home on the first day of school the pupils and town would have been better off. Some educator has said "The true aim of education should be the perfection of the individual." If so a teacher might have the pupils make fair progress in book knowledge and at the same time becoming degraded morally and physically. The teacher who helps the pupils to help themselves, who inspires them with a desire for better

things to occupy a higher plain in life, who fills them with a love of truth, honesty, sobriety, "who creates a desire for them to make the most of the best that is in them," such a teacher will be a success in any school, and his services should be sought and retained.

We would draw attention to the advantages gained through grading the school at the Thoroughfare and the earnest labor of the teachers there. These schools are now under the best organization of any we ever had in town. Many of the pupils have made excellent progress during the past year. We wish all the schools in town could be graded in like manner.

The Free High school so far has been a success. These schools create a thirst in our pupils for a broader education. By a recent state law, towns not having a legally established High school with a four year's course are liable for the tuition of any pupils belonging to such town who may properly enter any such school in the state. This town is liable to have to pay out money enough to go a long way towards supporting such a school in town for the benefit of all our pupils fitted to enter. This matter should receive our careful consideration.

The free text book question is a somewhat serious one. It takes a comparatively large sum of money to keep up the present supply of books. We have had to buy quite a quantity of new and expensive books for the High school but it would be folly to put a workman into the field or shops without tools, or even improper ones with which to work. We cannot afford to decrease the appropriation for text books.

Money has been raised with which flags have been purchased and presented to each of the schools. What true American boy or girl does not love our beautiful stars and stripes? What better way to teach patriotism and love of country than to have "Old Glory" floating over every schoolhouse?

Let us make our schoolrooms and surroundings as homelike and attractive as possible, put in the best teachers to be secured, and give our pupils as much schooling as is profitable.

## School Committee's Report.

To the citizens of North Haven :

Your committee delegated to the Superintendent the hiring of the teachers, and the general superintendence of the school property.

The schoolhouses have received all necessary repairs to the amount of \$82.77. Your committee have recommended the removal of the schoolhouse in district 5, to a location near Chas. Beverage's dwelling house.

It was a unanimous vote of the school officers that a portion of the lower part of Union Hall be fitted up for a High school room. School desks were secured at a low cost which are proving very satisfactory.

The expense for the High school has been quite heavy this year, but we think the money has been well expended.

We endorse the work being done in the High school and heartily recommend its continued support.
