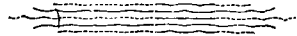

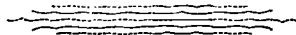

Report of Superintending School Committee.

In compliance with the laws of the state, the Superintending School Committee of Jay herewith present the following report of the condition of the schools of the town.

Your Committee having been serving you on the board quite a number of years, are pleased to note that as an increasing school revenue has enabled us to employ a higher grade of teachers, there has been a corresponding rise in the grade of scholarship in our schools, which has been more noticeable than ever during the past year.

In our supervision we have found, in nearly every case, our teachers faithful in their work and patient and pains-taking in their drill. In a few instances we have found the best work of our teachers hindered by a lack of co-operation or a positive opposition on the part of the parents, which we cannot too strongly censure. Among the evils to be corrected in our schools are so few scholars attending, and so low an average. This, however, must be corrected mostly by the parents and truant officers. Several of our schools are too small. During the past year we have suspended the functions of one district, for the reason that the school was so small that we did not consider it a profitable investment of the town's money, and should have done the same with others had not the distance been so great to other schools with which we wished to consolidate them.

Your Committee were very fortunate in securing teachers of high qualifications for the four Free High Schools, and they regret that in one or two of them the attendance was so small.

In one school in this town Columbus Day was fittingly observed. Through the efforts of the teacher, Miss S. M. Whittemore, aided by the citizens, a beautiful flag was raised above the new school house at Otis Falls, which we trust will long wave to inspire the pupils which may gather there with patriotic devotion to the land for which their fathers fought.
