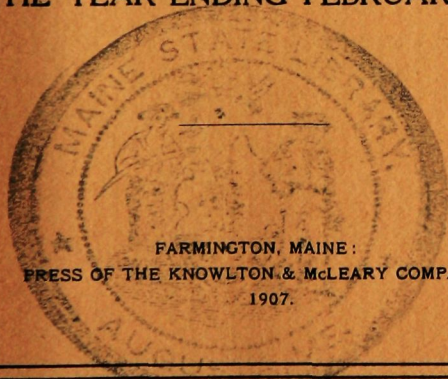

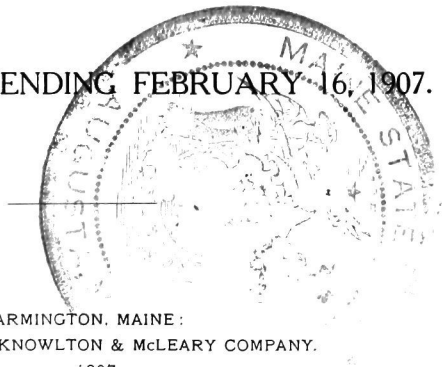

TOWN WARRANT.

To E. E. Bubier, a Constable of the Town of Jay, in the County of Franklin,

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Jay, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town on the fourth day of March, A. D. 1907, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit :

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside over said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to choose one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year, or act thereon.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to defray town expenses for the ensuing year.

ART. 6. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to defray pauper expenses for the ensuing year.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repairs of roads and bridges.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Free High schools, or act thereon.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for Free High schools.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repairs of school-houses.

ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free text-books.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for janitor work and school supplies.

ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for fuel for schools.

ART. 15. To see what sum the town will vote to pay their Road Commissioner per day for the ensuing year.

ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay outstanding notes and interest on the same.

ART. 18. To see what method the town will take to collect their taxes for the ensuing year, or act thereon.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for abatement of taxes, or act thereon.

ACT. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for permanent improvement of State road.

ART. 21. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for improvement of State road.

ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer through Church street in the village of Chisholm during the summer of 1907, according to the plans that will be shown by the Selectmen, and raise money for same, or take any action relative thereto.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to accept a road as laid out by the Selectmen at Chisholm, from the north end of Knapp street to the center of travel of Jewell street.

ART. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to build the road as laid out by the Selectmen at Chisholm from the north end of Knapp street to the center of travel on Jewell street.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to purchase a bell for the school building at Chisholm, also what sum of money they will raise for same.

ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to instruct the school officials to maintain a standard high school, or take any action thereon.

ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to build a horse-shed near the town office for the use of the selectmen, also what sum of money they will raise for same, or act thereon.

ART. 28. To see if the town will vote to join with some other town or towns in hiring a Superintendent of Schools.

ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to grade the road from culvert near L. G. Kyes barn to the Universalist church and raise money for same, or act thereon.

ART. 30. To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of receiving and correcting the list of voters at their office, at nine o'clock A. M., on the day of said meeting.

In view of the general discussion of school affairs which has taken place throughout town during the past year, I might, properly enough, in submitting this report, set forth in some detail the school situation as I found it last March, when I undertook the duties of Superintendent of Schools. I might explain some of the difficulties and obstacles a new official is likely to meet in any town at any time, but which he was certain to encounter in Jay during the year just past. I might speak specifically of those who have assisted, and of those who have done just the reverse in the efforts made to better the conditions of the schools generally and to solve the problems that demanded immediate attention. All of this, however, would involve personalities, which I should most certainly consider improper in a report of this kind. I shall, therefore, confine myself to a few brief, general statements of the more important facts that call for our attention.

The schools at Clay Brook and Intervale have each failed to maintain, during the year, the average attendance required by law and can be continued only by vote of the town. I suggest that both these schools be continued.

Although I am convinced that the small school is, as a general thing, more or less unprofitable, yet, in the present instance, I believe the difficulties and disadvantages arising from the conveyance of these pupils would more than outweigh the advan-

tages that are always to be derived from uniting the small schools with other and larger ones.

There is much to commend as there is something to condemn in our schools as they are to-day.

One of the most encouraging signs of progress is the generous spirit manifested in the appropriations for the school department, by means of which we have been able to make the school year longer by two weeks than it has been before. I sincerely hope that, in the year to come, the length of schools may be again increased by at least two weeks, making the school year thirty-four weeks. This I believe can be done if the recommendations of your School Committee are sustained by vote of the town.

I am glad to testify to the ability manifested by nearly all the teachers employed this year. In a few instances there has been a little dissatisfaction on the part of the parents, part of which, I regret to say, was entirely reasonable and justifiable (for able teachers cannot, of course, be had in every case). A greater part of this dissatisfaction, however, was utterly unwarranted and reflects anything but credit upon those making the complaints.

Two High schools have been maintained in town during the year—one at Jay and one at North Jay. Because of the question that has arisen in regard to the standing of the High schools of Jay, (whether they are of standard grade or not) it was thought best to continue these schools throughout the year upon the same basis as that upon which they were conducted last year. This gives the town an opportunity to discuss this question and vote upon it at the annual town meeting.

Many new text-books have either been introduced or bought to replace worn-out copies of those kinds already in use. The Jones's Readers have been introduced and the changes in Grammars and Arithmetics continued from last year. These changes have been beneficial in every case and should be continued during the ensuing year.

1,029 new books (exclusive of writing-books,) ranging in price from 20 cents to \$1.25 each, have been bought and put into the schools this year.

The janitors and supplies account shows a balance of \$71.97 overdrawn. An examination of the account, however, will show that the appropriation for this year has been actually overdrawn \$18.34. The sum \$418.34 is the total for the year including all janitors' bills and bills for supplies for the winter terms.

The one particular phase of the school situation that merits condemnation is the method of superintendency pursued not *only in our own town but in our neighboring towns* as well. A large sum of money is expended each year for our public schools, and it is of the highest interest to every tax-payer that this money be expended in such a way as to insure the best possible results. These results can be attained, I believe, only by a man who makes school superintendence his business, and who, by devoting his whole time, as he must by law, to that business, makes himself expert in his line. Our schools lack system. They need, in short, the services of an efficient executive who can give his undivided attention to their management.

The simplest way to accomplish this end is to join with some neighboring town in hiring a superintendent. As the State pays half of such superintendent's salary, the town could, by such union, have the best talent the State affords without any noticeable increase in expense. I earnestly hope the town will see this matter in its true light and serve its own interest by taking favorable action upon it.

In closing I wish to extend my sincere thanks to those who have made this year's work lighter and pleasanter by their courtesy and assistance
