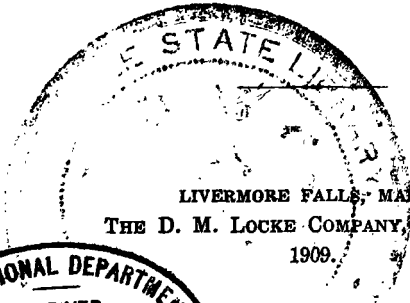

TOWN WARRANT

To Herman E. Briggs, a Constable of the town of Jay in the County of Franklin,

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Jay qualified by law to vote in town affairs; to meet at the Town House on the first day of March A. D. 1909, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit :

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside over said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to choose one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year or act thereon.

ART. 5. To see what sum the town will vote to pay their Road Commissioners per day for the ensuing year.

ART. 6. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to defray town expenses for the ensuing year.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to defray pauper expenses for the ensuing year.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repair of roads and bridges.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Free High Schools or act thereon.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for Free High Schools.

ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repairs on schoolhouses.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free text-books.

ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Janitor work and school supplies.

ART. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for fuel for schools.

ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay outstanding notes and interest on the same.

ART. 18. To see what method the town will take to collect its taxes for the ensuing year or act thereon.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for abatement of taxes or act thereon.

ART. 20. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provision of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1909.

ART. 21. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907 being the sum of \$246.50.

ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to accept a road as laid out by the selectmen beginning near J. D. Ridley's barn and extending in a westerly direction about twenty rods.

ART. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the conveyance of scholars to the "High School" at Jay Bridge.

ART. 24. To see if the town will accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Revising Board.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to support a school at Jay Intervale for the ensuing year or act thereon.

ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to install a sufficient number of Hydrants in the village of Chisholm for the proper protection of property in said village from fire.

ART. 27. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Hydrants in the village of Chisholm.

ART. 28. To see if the town will accept the legacy left by the codicil to the will of Joanna C. Thompson, late of Holliston, Mass., or take any action or pass any vote in relation thereto.

ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to rebuild the bridge on the Bean's Corner road near the Horace Ranger Farm, so called, known as the "Meadow Brook" bridge.

ART. 30. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to rebuild the bridge on the Bean's Corner road near the Horace Ranger farm, so called.

ART. 31. To see if the town will vote to widen the bridge and abutments near the Samuel Look place on the road leading from North Jay to Wilton or act thereon.

ART. 32. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to widen the bridge mentioned in Art. 31.

ART. 33. To see if the town will vote to widen the road from the Saco Valley Canning Co.'s factory to a point near the R. H. Thompson house, known as the owl house, or act thereon.

ART. 34. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to widen the road mentioned in Art. 33.

ART. 35. To see if the town will vote to continue the school in the Morse and Clay Brook districts or act thereon.

ART. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise a reasonable amount of money for the erection of guide boards or act thereon.

ART. 37. To see if the town will vote to purchase fire escapes for the Jay Bridge and Chisholm schoolhouses or act thereon.

ART. 38. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay for fire escapes or act thereon.

ART. 39. To see if the town will vote to accept as trustee an Endowment Fund from the North Jay Cemetery Association. Said fund to be a permanent fund and the earnings to be expended in caring for, improving and beautifying the North Jay Cemetery.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of receiving and correcting the list of voters at their office Saturday, February 27, 1909.

Report of School Committee

In accordance with the laws of the State the following report is submitted:

At this time we wish to report on special repairs made on schoolhouses during the past year. In order to understand fully just what repairs were needed, your committee made a circuit of the town, visiting nearly all the school buildings and noting their condition. Then during the summer vacation extensive repairs were made on the schoolhouses at Clay Brook, Stubbs Mills, Blaisdell, Beane's Corner and Lake, and at Stone's Corner and Macomber Hill the chimneys were relaid, also at the high school building a new room was partitioned off and fitted up for a class room and the outside of the building painted.

After the Collinwood, Ohio, fire it was thought wise to re-hang the doors here and at Chisholm, so as to swing outward, and porches or projections were built to protect them from slamming. Aside from increased safety these have added much to the appearance of the buildings.

For additional protection for our children eight fire extinguishers were purchased and placed in school buildings where most needed. We also recommend that the town make an appropriation to enable us to place fire escapes on the two two-story buildings in town.

Now, agreeable to your instructions and to meet the demand, a wing has been added to the schoolhouse at Riley, and now the town has a nice, comfortable, two-room building there as good as any in town. This addition and the furnishings cost about \$900. One or two other schoolhouses will need some repairs this year.

In spite of strictest economy we have overdrawn our appropriation, but all these repairs seemed very necessary and we believe the tax-payers will be willing to make an appropriation

sufficient to cover the overdraw, and we thank them now for their generous support and good will. On the whole, this has been a very prosperous year for our schools and we feel that much credit is due our Superintendent for his untiring efforts.

And now your committee would recommend the following sums to be raised for the support of our public schools the ensuing year, viz.:

Report of Principal of High School

This report is respectfully submitted to the school board and to the citizens of the town of Jay at the request of the superintendent of schools.

During the two years that I have served in this school it has been my good fortune to see several changes, all of which I believe to be for the best interests of the school. In 1907 the school was organized with about twenty students. Two teachers were employed. At the beginning of the present school year the number of pupils increased to thirty. Another teacher was added.

Miss Grace Stetson was employed as assistant during the first year of the time, and at the close of that year she left to accept a position in Lexington, Mass. Her work was of a high order. Miss Helen Dickinson and Miss Sarah Snow were secured as assistants for the present year. Their work is satisfactory and they are untiring in their efforts to advance the interests of the school.

Each teacher has seven recitation periods and these are filled with classes. In some cases the classes are small, but many more students could be accommodated in the same time. There are three courses: The College Preparatory, English, and Classical of which the pupil makes his selection. The studies pursued are those used in our best High Schools and Academies, and the Course of Study has been approved by the State Board, thus placing the Jay High School in the list of approved High Schools of Maine.

The building was divided into three rooms to accommodate the different classes and one of these is also used for a laboratory, owing to lack of room. A Cabinet has been purchased, also chemical supplies, thus giving ample facilities for experimental work.

The writer has had the privilege of visiting several schools in our state, and we believe that our work compares favorably with

that done by other institutions. There is still much to be done. The boys and girls who throng our High School to-day are the men and women of a near to-morrow. As citizens of that larger future, they should receive that which will best fit them for positions of help and usefulness.

Let it ever be remembered that in education lies the safeguard of the nation, and that in the school lies the intellectual life of the community.

In closing let me thank the school board, the superintendent, and the citizens at large for the hearty and cordial support afforded our school and let me invite every citizen to visit our school and to feel personally interested in its welfare.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

Another year has come and gone and your superintendent herewith submits his second annual report to the school committee and citizens of the town of Jay:

The condition of our schools so far as educational promise is concerned, is at present very encouraging. We have an enrollment of 482 pupils and our 23 teachers, with one or two possible exceptions, are unusually efficient and progressive, ready to avail themselves of every opportunity for improvement. Nearly all attended the State Convention at Portland last October and the County Convention at Farmington a few weeks ago. These meetings were very helpful, indeed. We must keep constantly in mind that the age is widening out before us. New thoughts and ideas are rapidly developing and we want our children to receive in full measure the education that rightfully belongs to them, that they may be fitted for that plane on which, before they reach the prime of life, they will be forced to stand, and we must keep ourselves well informed in the latest educational methods.

At the beginning of the year we graded the schools in the four villages of our town and laid out a course of study, placing a copy in the hands of each rural school teacher, which has been helpful in classifying these schools also. In our High School some changes were necessary.

Mr. Jones fortunately returned to us. Miss Stetson having resigned, Miss Helen Dickenson, a Colby graduate, was elected first assistant.

The growth of the school called for another teacher and Miss Sarah Snow, also of Colby, was added to the teaching force. The principal, in his report, will give a more detailed account of the school.

The conditions at the Riley school are greatly improved by the new addition to the school building. Mrs. Maude Bradford

was employed in the grammar grade for a year, but on account of ill health she resigned near the close of last fall term.

Mr. John Hodgdon, the present teacher, is doing excellent work, and we expect a class to graduate in June from this grammar school. We were fortunate in securing the services of Miss Winnifred Hall for the primary department. She is well fitted for this grade.

The school at Chisholm is greatly improved by the present grading and is now as quiet and orderly as any in town. The only change in teachers here is a new principal—Mr. Raymond Carter taking charge last fall and thus far his work is very satisfactory.

The furniture in this building has been re-arranged so as to accommodate the primary children on the first floor, thus lessening the danger in case of fire. Still we consider this building unsafe while without fire escapes, as is also the High School building.

Miss Belle Williams, the grammar school teacher at North Jay, resigned at the close of the fall term on account of illness in her family and Mr. Everett Burbank was secured for the winter term, with the hope that the large boys of the place might enjoy the instruction of a male teacher and attend school one more term.

We realize that this school is greatly reduced in numbers and unless business revives so as to call families here, it is possible that for a while two teachers may be able to care for the pupils here. We were sorry to lose Miss Grace Adams from the Jay Grammar School last spring. We employed Miss Velma Walker to take her place. Miss Walker is a very able teacher.

At the Macomber school Miss Beatham, who has given faithful service here for a year, resigned to complete her normal course, and Miss Kidder was secured for the winter term. We hope to retain her for the remainder of the year.

We were obliged to place a new teacher in the Stubbs Mills School last fall, and Mrs. Melvina Stubbs, a normal graduate, was elected. We are glad to give this school the instruction of this excellent teacher and hope to retain her services. We

should like to speak of the work of each school in detail, but perhaps it is unnecessary. We believe parents and friends of the schools appreciate the unusually good work which is being accomplished by our teachers.

All pupils of the common schools have had the privilege of 34 weeks' schooling, and we hope to make it 36 weeks next year, as that length of time is needed, particularly in the grammar schools, to fit them for the high school.

The Lincoln Centenary was observed by all the schools of Jay with appropriate exercises.

On another page you will find a financial statement, the enrollment of teachers and a list of text-books.

In closing I wish to thank the School Board and citizens for their kind courtesy and co-operation.
