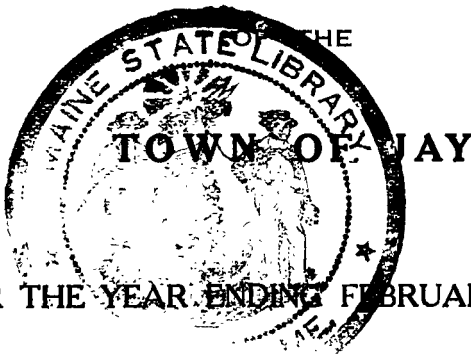

TOWN WARRANT

To Herman E. Briggs, a Constable of the town of Jay in the County of Franklin,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Jay, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House on the seventh day of March A. D. 1910, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1.** To choose a Moderator to preside over said meeting.
- Art. 2.** To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3.** To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4.** To see if the town will vote to choose one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year or act thereon.
- Art. 5.** To see what sum the town will vote to pay their Road Commissioners per day for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to defray town expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to defray pauper expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repairs of roads and bridges.
- Art. 10.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Free High school or act thereon.
- Art. 11.** To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for Free High School.
- Art. 12.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repairs on school-houses.
- Art. 13.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for free text-books.
- Art. 14.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for janitor work and school supplies.
- Art. 15.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for fuel for schools.

- Art. 16.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the observance of Memorial Day.
- Art. 17.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay outstanding notes and interest on the same.
- Art. 18.** To see what method the town will take to collect its taxes for the ensuing year or act thereon.
- Art. 19.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for abatement of taxes or act thereon.
- Art. 20.** To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1910.
- Art. 21.** To see if the town will raise and appropriate, in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$700.00 being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112, of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.
- Art. 22.** To see if the town will vote to widen the road from the Saco Valley Canning Co.'s factory to a point near the R. H. Thompson house, known as the "Owl House," or act thereon.
- Art. 23.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to widen the road mentioned in Article 22.
- Art. 24.** To see if the town will vote to build a new bridge across the stream near Riggs' mill.
- Art. 25.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to build said bridge.
- Art. 26.** To see if the town will vote to accept of a private way for the use of Rufus C. Stone as laid out by the Selectmen across land of E. W. Paine and E. D. Paine.
- Art. 27.** To see if the town will vote to remove the walls on the sides of the road and cut down the hill next to County Road leading to the residence of C. G. Bartlett.
- Art. 28.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to remove the walls and cut down the hill leading from the County Road to the residence of C. G. Bartlett.
- Art. 29.** To see if the town will vote to build a new school-house in what is known as the Blaisdell district.
- Art. 30.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to build a new school-house in the Blaisdell district.
- Art. 31.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to cut bushes by the roadside in town for the ensuing year,

- Art. 32.** To see what action the town will take to protect the property of David Miller and Humphry Purrington from being damaged by the water that has been turned on their land from the highway.
- Art. 33.** To see what sum of money the town will raise to protect the property of David Miller and Humphry Purrington mentioned in Art. 32.
- Art. 34.** To see if the town will vote to join with some other town or towns in hiring a Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 35.** To see if the town will vote to widen certain portions of a road beginning at or near the residence of A. S. Thompson and running south to a point near a water course on land of the B. F. Parker estate.
- Art. 36.** To see what sum of money the town will raise to widen the road mentioned in Art. 35.
- Art. 37.** To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars for the repairs of the fence at Bean's Corner Cemetery. The same to be laid out under the supervision of an agent appointed by the town.
- Art. 38.** To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for Fire Hose in the village at Chisholm or act thereon.
- Art. 39.** To see if the town will vote to install a sufficient number of electric lights in the village of Jay and Chisholm.
- Art. 40.** To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to pay for electric lights at Jay and Chisholm.
- Art. 41.** To see if the town will refund to H. D. Parker, the sum of \$9.60 the same being due him by reason of double taxation.
- Art. 42.** To see if the town of Jay will accept as Trustee of a fund provided the North Jay Cemetery Association will raise a fund from friends and owners of lots in the North Jay Cemetery, for perpetual care of said yard and the earnings only to be used in care of yard.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of receiving and correcting the list of votes at their office Saturday March 5, 1910.

Report of Principal of High School.

This report is made to the School Board and citizens of the town of Jay at the request of the Superintendent of Schools with a slight feeling of reluctance, since we feel that the progress of any school is more to be noted by those outside of its daily influence than by those who are a part of it.

Our progress for the year past, though gradual, has been perceptible. In the fall term, we were visited by the State Inspector of High Schools, Prof. Harry M. Wheeler, who told us that with a few changes in our course the school would be placed on Approved List of High Schools, Class A, which would entitle the town to receive more money from the State, according to the law which took effect July 2, 1910. He also suggested some changes in the schoolroom. These changes were made and reported to him, and met his approval. We were placed on the List of Approved Schools, Class A, and have received a Certificate to that effect.

At the close of the year 1908-1909, one girl was graduated from the school. At the opening of the present school year, a class of seventeen entered the school, and two more have joined us since. The whole number of students in attendance during the present school year has been forty, with an average attendance of thirty-four. A class of six will graduate in June.

There are three courses of Study: College Preparatory, Latin Scientific and English. Ten are pursuing the first course, nine the second, and eighteen the third. Three regular teachers are employed, each having seven periods of forty-five minutes for recitations. Miss Caroline Wescott is with the school two days of each week, and every student has work to her in elocution. We feel that the improvement along this line is marked, and sincerely hope that it may be continued.

During the past year, the students have given a drama and a prize-speaking contest, in addition to the Commencement Exercises, with marked success, and the Junior Class has presented the school a valuable set of Encyclopedias.

For these entertainments, we have felt the great need of an Assembly Room, and during the fall vacation, Mr. Dresser, our Superintendent, made a change in the arrangement of the rooms which will enable us to seat an audience of nearly two hundred, and which also makes a great improvement in the daily work of the school. The main room has been made larger, and the recitation rooms have been made into more suitable size and form for conducting recitations. Electric bells, for a fire alarm and conducting classes, have been installed. Both teachers and scholars feel grateful for the improvements which have been made.

In closing, we wish to commend the School Board, the parents and the citizens of the town for the cordial support of the school. Only with your co-operation, may your boys and girls obtain the best training. It is your school. We invite and solicit your inspection, for we feel that by this means you will better understand the work we are trying to do.

It has been the writer's privilege to visit other schools in the vicinity and in different parts of the state, and we feel that our boys and girls, equipped as we now are, will compare favorably with those of other schools. Yet there is still opportunity for improvement. Let us press on unitedly to make our school second to none.

Elocution is required one hour each week in all English work.

Essay work is considered a part of the English work in all courses.

Arrangements will be made for taking Solid Geometry with students wishing to enter College in the B. S. Course.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

Gentlemen of the School Board and Citizens of the Town of Jay:

It is a duty incumbent upon me at this time to make a report to you of my work in your schools. When I assumed the office of Superintendent of Schools of Jay and East Livermore last August, I was a stranger, not only to you but also to all your teachers. I wish to thank you all for the cordial manner in which I was received, and for the assistance which you have always been ready to give me in the discharge of the duties of my office. The short time at my disposal, before the beginning of your schools will, I hope, make pardonable what mistakes I may have made in the beginning.

HIGH SCHOOL.

This school is in charge of Mr. V. Merle Jones, a graduate of Colby University. He is ably assisted by Miss Helen F. Dickinson and Miss Sarah Snow, both Colby graduates. At the beginning of the fall term, I found forty pupils in attendance and was obliged to put in more desks for their accommodation. The room was so crowded that in the winter vacation the School Board thought it necessary to provide more commodious quarters, which was done by taking the two recitation rooms, which were larger than necessary, for a main school-room, and making the old school-room into two rooms which were better adapted for recitation rooms than the old ones were. The benefits derived from this change have been mentioned by Prof. Jones in his report.

In order to take advantage of the New High School Law, passed by the last Legislature, by the advice of Mr. Harry M. Wheeler, State Inspector of High Schools, the courses were revised and sent to Mr. Wheeler. He accepted the re-

vised course, and we received his certificate placing Jay High School on the Approved List of High Schools, Class A. This gives us \$500.00 next year, instead of \$250.00 which we have previously received from the state.

The minimum rank for promotion was raised from 60 to 70, thus putting the school on the same footing as most of the High schools in the country.

GRADED SCHOOLS.

The schools at North Jay, Riley, Jay Bridge and Chisholm, are graded for eight grades. A ninth grade should be added this year in order to more thoroughly prepare those intending to enter the High school. I shall try to accomplish this before the end of the school year.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

The rural schools are not so fully graded as the others, but I am working to the end that they may be so equipped, that any pupil desiring to enter the High school can be prepared to do so in any of these schools. The greatest difficulty in this is that the parents are often obliged, when work presses, to have the help of the older children at home, which causes a break in the school work of the pupil, and often causes discouragement.

BOOKS.

To obtain the best results, there should be a uniformity of books in the schools of a town. I find in actual use in the town the following books; Wentworth's Practical Arithmetic, Milne's Progressive Arithmetic and Walsh's Arithmetic; Maury's Geography and Frye's Geography; Montgomery's History; Readers—Jones', Baldwin, Ward, New Educational, Aldine, Stepping Stones to Literature and several supplementary books; Emerson and Bender's Grammars; Blaisdell's series of Physiology; Aiton's Spellers and Rice's Spellers; Whitehouse's Copy Books. The same books should be used in all the schools in town so that a scholar going from one school to another would not be obliged to change books. Supplementary books are all right in their place, but one

book should be used for a base. Unless this is done, you cannot have uniformity in your school work.

The whole number of scholars in town, as given to me, last April was 874. The whole number enrolled in school this year was 524, average, 443. This gives an increase in enrollment of about 9 per cent. over 1908, and an increase of 6 per cent. in average attendance. This is a step in the right direction and leads us to hope that the increase next year may be still greater.

For the next year your School Board recommends the following:

SCHOOL-HOUSES.

The school-houses in town are nearly all in fair condition. I wish in particular to commend the pupils of the school at Bean's Corner for the excellent care they have taken not to mar the building inside or out. If all schools would be as careful of school property as this one has been, school-rooms would be pleasant places indeed.

Several houses need the underpinning reset and some repairs made. One side of the house on Macomber Hill is sprung out several inches, and should be strengthened before the wood is put in for the next year.

Blaisdell and Stubb's Mills schools both need new houses. The house at North Jay should be painted outside, and the house at Riley should be painted on the outside and whitewashed inside. The School Board will doubtless tell you more in detail what they think is necessary to be done in this line.

GENERAL REMARKS.

In order to make a detailed financial report of your schools, it is necessary for the Superintendent of Schools to have an account of every transaction, that you may know where all your money is expended.

I have purchased a ledger for the use of the Superintendent and shall begin the present year with an account under each branch of the School Department. Anyone who has a bill against the School Department can greatly help the Superintendent in keeping this account by passing bills directly to him. He will draw his orders, these will be approved by the School Board and then passed to the Selectmen who will draw town orders and pass them to the Town Treasurer and he in turn, sends checks to the proper parties.

There being but four scholars in attendance during the fall term at the Intervale school, the School Board met the

Selectmen in consultation, and decided that if those who would be directly affected did not object, it would be better to discontinue the winter term in that school. No objection was offered, and the school was discontinued for the winter term and such scholars as were affected by this action were conveyed to the school at Jay at a cost of \$20.00, thus saving the town between \$50.00 and \$60.00. The fall term was taught by Miss Ethel Reed. The expense of this term was: salary, \$84.00, janitor, \$3.00, besides the cost of fuel. The School Board estimate the cost of wood used in schools of the town to average about \$5.25 per cord.

Owing to a decrease in the number of scholars during the last year, the town received \$198.00 less money from the State than in the preceding year. You also raised \$200.00 less than in 1908. Many of the teachers are from the Normal Schools, and in order to retain their services, it will be necessary to keep up the present scale of wages. While the Normal Schools cannot make good teachers out of every one, the real teacher who has had the advantage of Normal training is worth far more than one who has not had such training. Keep the Normal teacher at any cost, when she has proved her worth.

Again, I thank you for your hearty co-operation with me in my work.
