He goes to each recitation thoroughly prepared; he requires his pupils to be industrious and orderly in school and quiet and peaceable around the building. A teacher to be depended upon wherever he is placed; work satisfactory.

#### Remarks.

There was no money raised by the town for repairing school property this year. The house at the Mills is very much out of repair; it needs plastering, new floors and new seats and desks. The house in the Waterman district is not large enough, and new seats and desks are needed there. The house in the Berry district needs painting and underpinning and the house in the Grant district needs painting. The floors of the brick house bave settled, and if they are not repaired, and the plastering mended before another winter, it will not be a safe place to send children to school. It will be economy for the town to attend to these repairs the coming year.

Our scholars have had the privilege of twenty-five weeks of schooling the past year; we decided to have three terms; the summer term was nine weeks and the fall and winter terms eight weeks each. We know by experience that, when the terms are too long, teachers and scholars get tired, and fail to accomplish as much satisfactory work, also, the attendance is not as regular.

We find by the registers that twenty-four (24) scholars have not missed a half day for the year. The Farrin school leads in this respect, having five; the average attendance in town has been much better than we have ever known it to be. Our teachers have given general satisfaction; in many cases we have been requested by parents to send the same teacher back, and we have done so when we consistently could. It has been our steady aim to raise the standard of our schools, and, aided by the sympathy and co-operation of the parents, we believe we have not entirely failed to do so. We earnestly thank the citizens of the town for their confidence, and help. All of which is respectfully submitted,
