We respectfully submit to the town the following report of the condition and progress of the schools and expenditure for the same during the fiscal year ending February 6, 1909.

The law requires the Superintendent of the town to canvass the town during the month of April, and make a list of all children between the ages of 5 and 21 years. In compliance with this law the enumeration was made and the number was found to be 253.

The whole number registered in the town schools during the year was 163.

The average attendance was about 123.

We have had twenty-five (25) weeks of school during the year, three (3) weeks less than last year. The reason for this is, that we had to pay the teachers more wages than last year in order to

get good teachers, and, certainly we did not pay as much as some of the towns near by, nor did we have as many weeks of school; we believe that the town should maintain, at least, thirty (30) weeks school, and that is the general opinion of many of our citizens.

We have had a good corps of teachers in our employ during the year.

The law requires two (2) visits by the Superintendent each term; we have made several extra visits to young teachers and have found the schools, with one or two exceptions, in good working condition, teachers and pupils working faithfully, and manifesting much interest in their work. Many of the teachers were employed for the year and their work was exceedingly satisfactory; it is better to keep the same teachers providing they do good work. It is conceded by our best educators, that a change of teachers is injurious to a school.

We have employed several young teachers who have taken a deep interest and who have done excellent work.

We can truthfully report to the citizens of the town that good progress has been made in our schools during the past year.

ACADEMY.

The Academy is under the same instruction as last year, Mr. Charles Rush as principal and Miss Katherine Kindrick, assistant. Under the instruction of these competent and conscientious teachers the school is prospering.

The Corner school house was painted; at the Waterman school house the underpinning was repaired, and long needed repairs were made on the buildings at the Mills.

I wish to call attention to the Stevenstown school house; the bricks which were over the door have been broken out so that one may look over the door-frame into the entry, and there is a large hole in the gable end of the building. The South Oak Hill building needs a new chimney, and it also needs to be plastered. The West Litchfield, Waterman and Mills school houses need painting and more or less repairing is needed on all the school buildings in town. It does not pay to let our school property run down, nor does it speak well for the town. The school board has taken deep interest in the schools, and especially in the school property, which they wish to see put in condition which will be a credit and

not a discredit to the town.

The new school house which was built to accommodate the scholars in the Plains, Grant and "Brick" districts is completed and ready for use when the spring term opens. It is commodious, neat and up-to-date school building.

In conclusion we wish to express our gratitude to the members of the school board for their hearty cooperation in our work and to the parents and citizens for their courtesy and help.

Town Warrant 1909.

To O. A. True, Constable of the Town of Litchfield:

GREETING.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said Town of Litchfield qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday the first day of March A. D. 1909, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To attend to the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseer of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Town Agent, Auditor of Accounts, Superintendent of Schools and School Committee.

ART. 4. To choose three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, a Town Treasurer, Town Agent, a Committee or Auditor of Accounts, a Collector of Taxes, one or more members of the School Committee, one or more Truant Officers, one or more Constables, Surveyors of wood and lumber, Fence Viewers and Field Drivers, a Pound Keeper, Sealer of Weights and Measures, and all other necessary Officers, Agents and Committees.

ART. 5. To choose one or more Road Commissioners.

ART. 6. To vote a sum of money for the support of schools.

ART. 7. To vote a sum of money for the purchase of school books.

ART. 8. To vote a sum of money for school supplies.

ART. 9. To vote a sum of money for repairs of school houses.

ART. 10. To vote a sum of money for Incidental Town Expenses.

ART. 11. To vote a sum of money for Support of Poor.

ART. 12. To vote a sum of money for repairs of Roads and Bridges.

Arr. 13. To vote a sum of money to pay Snow Bills for the present winter.

Arr. 14. To vote a sum of money for removing Stone Walls and Bushes, which cause the Roads to be drifted or act any thing in relation thereto.

Arr. 15. To see if the Town will vote 'yes' or 'no' upon the Adoption of the Provision of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, relating to the Appropriation of money necessary to entitle the Town to State aid for highways for the year 1909.

Arr. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise appropriate and set apart for permanent improvement of the main highways within the Town such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of \$59.50.

Arr. 17. To vote a sum of money for the observance of Memorial day, and act anything in relation thereto.

Arr. 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to contract with the Trustees of Litchfield Academy for the tuition of the High School scholars for the ensuing year in that Institution and raise a sum of money for that purpose or act anything relating thereto.

Arr. 19. To see if the Town will vote how many schools shall be maintained the coming year and where they shall be located.

Arr. 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to hire money, if it should become necessary to pay the Town's indebtedness.

Arr. 21. To see if the Town will establish a price for labor on the Highway or act anything in relation thereto.

Arr. 22. To see what action the Town will take for running the Hearses.

Arr. 23. To see what action the Town will take in reference to building a safe depository, and act anything necessary to carry the same into effect.

Arr. 24. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Superintending School Committee the same amount as in the past two years.

Arr. 25. To see what action the Town will take in reference to caring for the Town's Poor and act anything necessary thereon.

Arr. 26. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new road machine and if so raise a sum of money for the same, and act anything necessary thereon.

Arr. 27. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Road leading from the County road by the house of Isaac Gayton, and the Old Maxwell Place on Oak Hill, or so much of it as has not been discontinued.

Arr. 28. To see what action the Town will take in reference to the management or sale of the Town Farm and act anything necessary thereon.

Arr. 29. To direct how future Town Meetings shall be called and at what time in March 1910, the next annual Town Meeting shall be held.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session on the day at the place above named from nine till ten o'clock in the forenoon to receive evidence of the qualification of voters.
