Litchfield Academy faces a new year with glowing prospects. It is true that the attendance has not been large, but it is not necessary for me to state that your principal faced some handicaps in coming, a perfect stranger, to a run-down school and attempting in a couple of months to restore its prestige (for no school in Maine can justly be prouder of its past). I have never had a more enthusiastic school of boys and girls, and we have the names of twenty-nine new pupils for next year, most of whom we hope to get. The academy should normally draw sixty pupils from the towns of Litchfield, Bowdoin and Wales, and we are planning an aggressive canvass for twenty more out-of-town pupils. In five years we should have an attendance of 100 pupils from this state and elsewhere. We are, this spring, making an exhaustive canvass for \$50,000 endowment, a new auditorium and steam heating plant. a girls' dormitory, and a new ell on the boys' dormitory, also a new academy. The latter we do not expect for five years, but we

are practically sure of the donor of a \$15,000 building as the result of the aggressive work of Dr. Smith Baker. We also need much new equipment at the academy, of such nature that it can be transferred to the new building when it is given. We must have the equipment to attract out-of-town pupils.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank Messrs. II. L. Starbird and George Earle for the hearty support given in this financial campaign. There are others we would mention, but at their own request we can not. The trustees have already purchased the Starbird farm, and will convert the house into a comfortable dormitory, where the boys will be under the personal supervision of the principal. We may be able to announce the name of the donor of the new auditorium and steam-beating plant at your annual meeting.

We want to have teachers for the Commercial, Manual Training, Domestic Science, Agriculture, and Music Departments in addition to the present corps of teachers, also a teacher for the grammar school department, but it will first be necessary to raise the endowment fund. A plan for raising it will be presented in our annual bulletin, which will soon be out. Meanwhile, we are forced to ask you to be as liberal as you can in providing funds for the salaries of teachers. If it is possible, I wish that a fund of \$700 might be provided by appropriation. If you manifest your confidence in the worth of this school in this way, it will make much easier the outside financial canvass.

We shall add a Commercial Department to the courses now being taught, beginning next year, and the others will be added as fast as funds permit. Our aim is to provide a girl or boy with a practical education as well as give her or him the necessary culture to meet the demands of the times. If we are permitted to develop these plans for five years, we hope to have a school second to none in the state and a school of which the town may be justly proud.

Eight schools have been maintained throughout the past year of thirty-two weeks. Under the efficient and persistent training of the teachers, the year has been a profitable one for the scholars. Transportation has been necessary for pupils to one school only.

The school property is in good condition; the painting of two of the schoolhouses next year is the only thing necessary to put the buildings in excellent repair.

At the beginning of the year, we commenced placing new books in the schools to take the place of those unfit to use, and at the present time our schools are well supplied with books, with a few on hand for next year.

The teachers employed during the year have each strived to do the best possible work. During the winter, an association of teachers of Litchfield and Bowdoin was formed for the advancement of their work in the school, and much interest has been taken in these meetings. Several of our teachers attended the state and county conventions and undoubtedly gained inspiration from contact with others in their profession.

The attendance this year has not been up to the standard that we hoped for, and in a great many instances of absence the parent and not the pupil was at fault. Regular attendance of a scholar is necessary to regular advancement in his studies, and we want to urge all parents to see to it that their children go to school every day school is in session.

We wish to repeat the request made last year that the parents themselves take more personal interest in the schools, visiting them during school hours, encouraging the teacher, criticising, if need be, in a manner just to all concerned, and uniting with scholars, teacher, and school authorities in their endeavors for better and still better schools. We thank the citizens, teachers and superintending school committee for their valued assistance during the year.
