### School Report.

To the Inhabitan's of the town of Litchfield:

We respectfully submit the following report, as required by law, of the condition, progress and expenditure of our schools for the year ending Feb. 3, 1917,

Our schools have run smoothly and made good progress under the supervision of our new superintendent, Mr. C. M. Kendrick. There has been some difficulty in getting teachers as the salary we pay is small compared with other towns. You will notice that the appropriation for repairs and supplies has been overdrawn, but that was unavoidable, if we met the requirements of the law. The sanitary conditions of the outbuildings is deplorable and during the coming year something must be done to eliminate this evil. We earnestly recommend the following appropriations.

#### Gentlemen:

It is with pleasure that I submit my second annual report for your consideration.

The work of both teachers and pupils has been very gratifying to me as in most of the schools an unusual amount of interest has been shown. In every case where a vacancy has occurred experienced teachers or those who have had previous training have been secured.

The Course of Study has been a great help to the teachers as they know the definite work prescribed therein must be done during the school year to keep the pupils up to grade. The conventions have also proved a valuable assistant in stimulating the teachers to greater efficiency. Many of the teachers attended the State Convention held at Portland last Cctober and returned with a feeling of greater interest in their work. It is my carnest wish that as many as possible will attend the Kennebec County Convention at Waterville as I find that the county conventions are a source of great inspiration especially for the rural teacher. This is true because the majority of the speakers deal with rural problems.

The attendance for the spring and fall terms has been very good, there being an enrollment of 139 pupils and a general average of 111.7 thus making the attendance per cent 87. In the winter term we have been less fortunate as the prevailing contagious diseases and the severe storms have tended to lower the average considerably. In looking over the school registers, I find many instances of tardiness, most of them occurring without excuses from the pupil's parents or quardian. This of course makes it difficult for the teacher and the pupil as often times it necessitates the making up of lessons at recess or after school thus depriving them of their rightful recreation hours besides losing the benefit of regular class recitation work. Therefore I wish the parents would make special effort to see that their children are at school on time. During the past year truancy hás existed to a slight degree as it has been necessary to

send the truant officer to only two homes where the children were absent without cause.

Of the ten pupils who took the high school entrance examinations, only a few passed. Those failing to pass were allowed to enter on conditions and during the fall term they worked off their conditions.

### LITCHFIELD ACADEMY

Litchfield Academy opened last September with twenty-five students registered. We were very fortunate to secure Mr. Frank B. Richardson of Bates as principal and Miss Enna W. Fowler as assistant. Excellent work is being done. The following is the report of the principal:

### REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE ACADEMY

To the Supt. of Schools:

I think that this year of work at the Academy has been a successful one from all points of view. Late in the summer Mr. Kendrick and myself canvassed the town of Litchfield and those towns that border, in search of students. We seemed to find a feeling of antipathy among the people against the academy, however, we have a larger enrollment than last year.

We offer at the academy two courses, an English and a Latin, which cover the work as laid out by the state for any class A high school filling the requirements of the New England College Association Board.

There is at Bates College a scholarship especially for the graduates of the Academy, which offers a good opportunity for anyone desiring to attend that institution.

I ask for the better co-operation of the people of this

town in helping to build up the school, by speaking a good word for, rather than one against it.

### REPAIRS

During the past year the high winds and heavy rains have done much damage to the school buildings, not only causing the roofs to leak, but also defacing the ceilings, walls and desks. This has called for unforeseen expenses for repairs. The Steventown school building has been shingled, while shingles have been purchased for the North school house. A new out-building has been built for the Ferrin school and the old one repaired at the Waterman. The South Oak Hill school house and the Berry school have been painted both inside and out. Before this could be done, large holes in the ceilings and walls had to be patched, but the buildings are now in very good condition. The ceiling of the North school has been tinted. Some extra new desks have been purchased for the Lincoln school, new blackboards have been put up at the Ferrin and Steventown school houses, and the doors have been repaired at the Earle.

The following repairs are needed for next year:

The Pine Tree school house needs to be painted on the outside, the Steventown needs to be white washed and papered and the Earle, Ferrin and Waterman ought to be plastered and tinted. The North school must be shingled.

The estimate for the total repairs needed is one hundred and fifty dollars.

#### TEXT BOOKS

For the most part, books have been purchased to replace those now out, and to supply new scholars. Last year a few Stone-Willis arithmetics were introduced and they gave such good satisfaction that more were bought this year. The New World speller is being given a trial in some of the schools and is arousing a new interest in spelling. For suppiementary reading, the Story Hour readers and Carpenter's Geographical readers have been purchased. Believing that the physiologies in use were too elementary for the eighth and ninth grade work, I secured new Academic physiologies which have created a new interest in the subject.

The books needed most for next year are New Supplementary Histories for the eighth and ninth grades. A great deal more work would be accomplished if materials for busy work were furnished for the lower grades.

Although thirty weeks were maintained this year, the appropriation was considerably overdrawn. In order to obtain efficient teachers higher salaries must be paid to meet the increased cost of expenses.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to all who have in any way helped to make this year a successful one.

# Town Warrant

To O. A. True, Constable of the Town of Litchfield:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Litchfield qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the fifth day of March A. D. 1917 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1 To chose a moderator to preside at said meeting
  - Art. 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year
- Art. 3 To attend to the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, TownAgent, Auditor of Accounts, Superintendent of schools and School Committee
- Art. 4 To choose three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor, Town Treasurer, Town Agent, Auditor of Accounts, a collector of Taxes, one or more members of the School Committee, one or more Constables, Surveyors of wood and lumber, Fence Viewers and Field Drivers, a Pound Keeper, Sealer of Weights

and Measures and all other necessary Officers, Agents and Committees and one or more Fire Wardens

- Art. 5 To see if the town will vote to have one or more Road Commissioners
- Art. 6 To vote a sum of money for the support of schools
- Art. 7 To vote a sum of money for the purchase of school books
  - Art. 8 To vote a sum of money for school supplies
- Art. 9 To vote a sum of money for repairs of school houses
- Art. 10 To vote a sum of money for Incidental Town Expenses
  - Art. 11 To vote a sum of money for support of Poor
- Art. 12 To vote a sum of money for repairs of Roads and Bridges
- Art. 13 To vote a sum of money to pay snow bills for the present winter
- Art. 14 To vote a sum of money for removing stone walls and bushes which cause the roads to be drifted, or act anything in relation thereto
- Art. 15 To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid, as provided in section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 16 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvements of the section of

State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19, of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

- Art. 17 To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of section 18 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 18 To vote a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day and act anything in relation thereto.
- Art. 19 To see if the town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to contract with the Trustees of Litchfield Academy for the tuition of the High School scholars for the ensuing year, in that institution and raise a sum of money for that purpose or act anything relating thereto.
- Art 20 To see if the town will vote how many schools shall be maintained the coming year and where they shall be located.
- Art. 21 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to hire money, if it should become necessary to pay the town's indebtedness.
- Art. 22 To see if the town will establish a price for labor on the highway or act anything in relation thereto.
- Art. 23 To see what action the town will take for caring and running a hearse.

- Art. 24 To see what action the town will take as to pay for the Superintending School Committee for the year 1917 and act anything in relation thereto.
- Art. 25 'To see what action the town will take in reference to caring for the town's poor and act anything necessary thereon.
- Art. 26 To see if the town will raise a sum of money to repair the Fair House or any other purpose and act anything in relation thereto.
- Art. 27 To see what action the town will take in regard to gathering brown tail moth nests and raise a sum of money for that purpose.
- Art. 28 To see if the town will raise a sum of money to repair the road from Wilber Tarr's Cor. going West to the Old Patten Woods Road.
- Art. 29 To see if the town will vote to continue for the ensuing year the Berry school, now closed by law.
- Art. 30 To see if the town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to repair one or more school buildings in compliance with the plans submitted by the State Superintendent of Schools, and raise a sum of money for that purpose.
- Art. 31 To see if the town will vote to accept the money that was left the town by Oramandal Smith when tendered them.
- Art. 32 To direct how future town meetings shall be called and at what time in March, 1918 the annual town meeting shall be held.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session on the day named above from nine until ten o'clock in the forenoon to receive evidence of qualification of voters.
